Know Your Law ---

At this time of year, many landlords and tenants are thinking a-bout farm rental arrangements for 1960. While some operate from year to year on the basis of verbal agreements regulated largely by local customs, written leases are better and may save disagreement and hard feelings between the parties. Farming is a business and should be conducted in a businesslike manner for best sucess. Rental con-tracts involve a full year's work by the tenant and possibly thousands of dollars for both parties. A few dollars spent on a properly drawn ease is good buiness economy.

A farm lease is not a simple paper. Printed lease forms often turn if not properly executed. A farmer-tenant contract is intricate and of such importance to both parties concerned that amateur draftsmanship is risky.

Fixing of cash rent or designating the length of term are relatively simple. Yet, even in these matters, ambiguity or incompleteness can cause bitter disputes and expensive lawsuits.

A loosely drawn property des-cription may have consequences entirely unintended by either landlord or tenant. Where rent is to be based on acreage, an accurate description is doubly important.

Inspects Food, Drugs

The recent outcry over a seasonal food item points up to the neessity of keeping a sharp eye on the world's biggest enterprise -- the food business.

In Texas, the champion of the consumer is the Food and Drug Division of the Texas State Department of Health. Its Federal count-erpart is the Food and Drug Administration of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The division was set up in 1925

by Texas Leislative action permit-ting the establishment of food standards and the authority to enforce them

Significant improvements in some food industries show the effectiveness of the various inspection programs.

Since the enactment of the Texas Milk Grading and Labeling Law in 1937, Texas milk quality has imuntil today approximately proved 95 per cent of all consumed milk is Grade A pasteurized. More im-

portant, there has not been a food poisoning outbreak traceable to milk in the last 20 years.

In 1946-48, over 700 cases were filed on food and drug law violabut in 1957-59 less than a hundred needed to be brought to

There's a big three-dimentional outline map of Texas hanging prominently in an office at the State Department of Health in Austin. Bright orange blotches, neatly conforming to county lines, pock the face of the map from Texarkana

The legend underneath reads "Rabies cases by counties, 1959."

The map is the Division of Vet-erinary Public Health's way of visualizing the extent of the State's rabies problem, both in wild and domestic animals. It is consistently one of the most acute in the nation the record shows.

Says Dr. A. B. Rich, the depart-ment's veterinary specialist: "It indicates a dangerous undercurrent of rables exists thoughout the whole range of Texas wildlfe. In an unguarded moment it could erupt in-to a full-blown epidemic."

Preventing that grim eventuality falls to Dr. Rich and his staff of two other veterinarians. Working an area the size of Texas, advising and assisting local health depart-ments and county officials in rabies control means spreading them-selves very, very thin.

Farm Census In Progress--

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, now under way in Lynn County, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1954, when the farm census revealed the following

The value of products sold in 1954 by farm operators was \$20, 203.265.

The value of all crops sold was \$19,570,388 and included \$19,567, 325 for field crops, \$625 for vegetables, \$238 for fruits and nuts, and \$2,200 for horticultural specialties.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$632, 877 and included \$83,820 for dairy products, \$92,903 for poultry and poultry products, and \$456,154 for livestock and livestock products.


