**SILENT KILLER FEATURES WINTER SEASON**

Austin—Each winter brings its toll of deaths from carbon monoxide, the killer gas loosed wherever fuel is used to power cars, cook meals or to dial the chill edge of weather. It claimed the lives of 42 Texans last year, and will undoubtedly strike again and again at the unwary this winter just as it did recently in the small North Texas garage.

The temperature was in the high 20's and a brisk north wind was blowing when the head mechanic reported for work that morning. Chill had permeated every corner of the open shop and had seeped into the concrete floor. No wonder the mechanic's helper pulled closed the sliding door when he came in a few minutes later. That single act was the instrument of one death and one near-death from carbon monoxide that built up in the unventilated garage.

The State Health Department engineers report that carbon monoxide is a very real occupational hazard among garagemen this time of year. Why was not the North Texas garage equipped with a vent pipe leading to the outside to which the exhaust of idling cars could be attached? The question can't be answered. It is a fact that this very sensible practice is common in northern garages, but rare in Texas despite the extremes in weather.

Carbon monoxide does its damage with lightning speed. A car running for five minutes in a garage 20x30x10 will release enough carbon dioxide to cause serious physical effects. Any fuel containing carbon can produce carbon dioxide. This is true of solid fuels such as coal or charcoal or wood. It is true of liquid fuels as oil, gasoline and kerosene. It is true of gaseous fuels as natural and manufactured gas. Unvented space heaters in homes are particularly hazardous. They work well when the room is properly ventilated but in closed rooms they quickly burn up the oxygen which in turn permits a build up of the lethal gas.

Sunday, Dec. 2nd, has been set as the day for the Sabin Oral Vaccine Type 2 to be offered all residents of Lynn county, according to Dr. Noble Rumbo of here. The school cafeteria here will again be the location of the program here. Beginning at 1 p. m. all Lynn county residents will be urged to take part in the Sabin Oral Sunday project by taking the Type 2 dose.

About 9,000 persons took advantage of the Type 1 polio oral vaccine in late summer and it is hoped that as many will take the Type 2.

Type 2 Sabin Oral Vaccine should be taken by all people from age 3 months on up.

On Friday night, Nov. 30 all persons working on the SOS project will attend a practice session at the school cafeteria at 7 p. m.

An abstract is merely a record of every document which has ever been filed of record at the courthouse affecting the title to a particular piece of property. It may show good title or bad title, or no title at all. It is only a bundle of papers, as John and Mary discovered, which summarizes the state of the title. Its possession does not in any way assure good title.

This while, one may be able to get possession and peacefully occupy a property with an unsalable title, difficulties will arise when the property is to be sold or mortgaged. To do so is only to postpone and perhaps incur the trouble and expense of clearing the title. It makes good sense to correct any title defects when you buy property.

They inquired about title and the owner assured them that he would give them an "abstract." They took the abstract which was a flat book of papers and the used, used the word at the courthouse and thought no more about it, assuming as many people do, that an "abstract" is an assurance of good title.

Some years they went to sell to a buyer who was better informed. He insisted that either the abstract be examined and an opinion given by an attorney that the title was good or that sellers must provide title insurance. When they sought an opinion as to whether the abstract showed good title, they were dismayed to find the title was not in good order, and that there would have to be a quiet-title lawsuit to dispose of some flaws in the title before the buyer would accept it. Neither would a title insurance company write a policy of insurance for them without legal action to clear up the title.

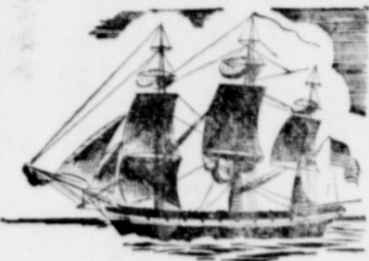
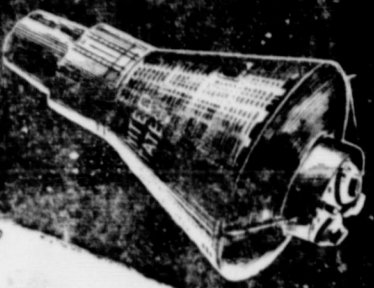

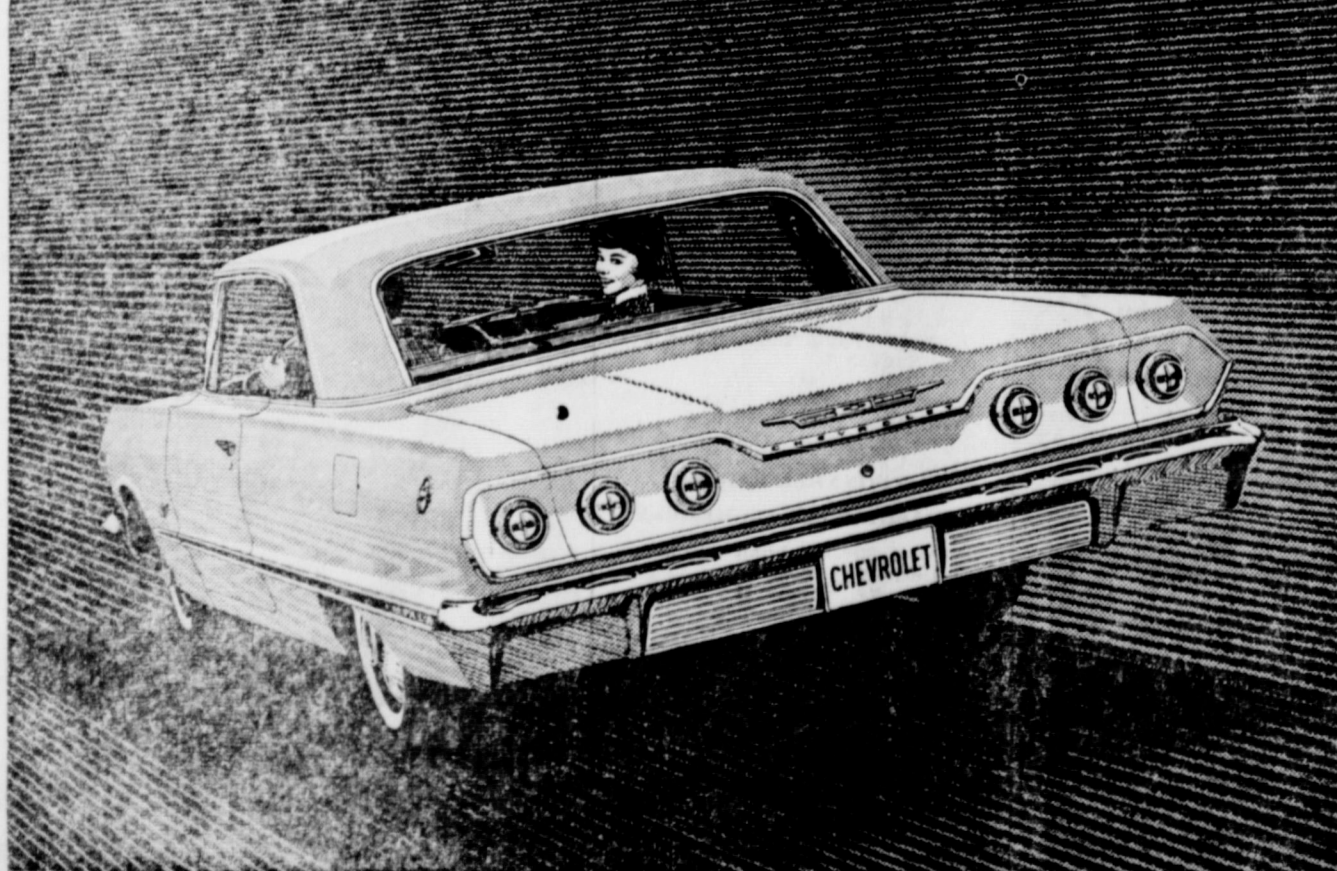

### Early Mailing Urged

The O'Donnell Post Office expressed its thanks to all for the fine cooperation during the year — especially last Christmas. The Office has several helpful hints about holiday mailing this year.

From Nov. 1 to Nov. 20th overseas shipments to Armed Forces should be completed. These parcels should contain a list of contents plus the address and your return address. Parcels and cards for distant states should be mailed no later than Dec. 10th to be delivered on time.

The use of 4c postage stamp on Christmas cards may contain written matter plus the priority of forwarding without additional charges. The use of a special delivery stamp will effect delivery on Christmas Day. The Post Office has issued a new 4c Christmas stamp that you may wish to place on your Christmas cards. The importance of a legible address is important since there was a heavy volume of Christmas mail in 1961 undelivered.

Your Post Office has had a number of inquiries about the new postal rates which will not go into effect until Jan 7th.

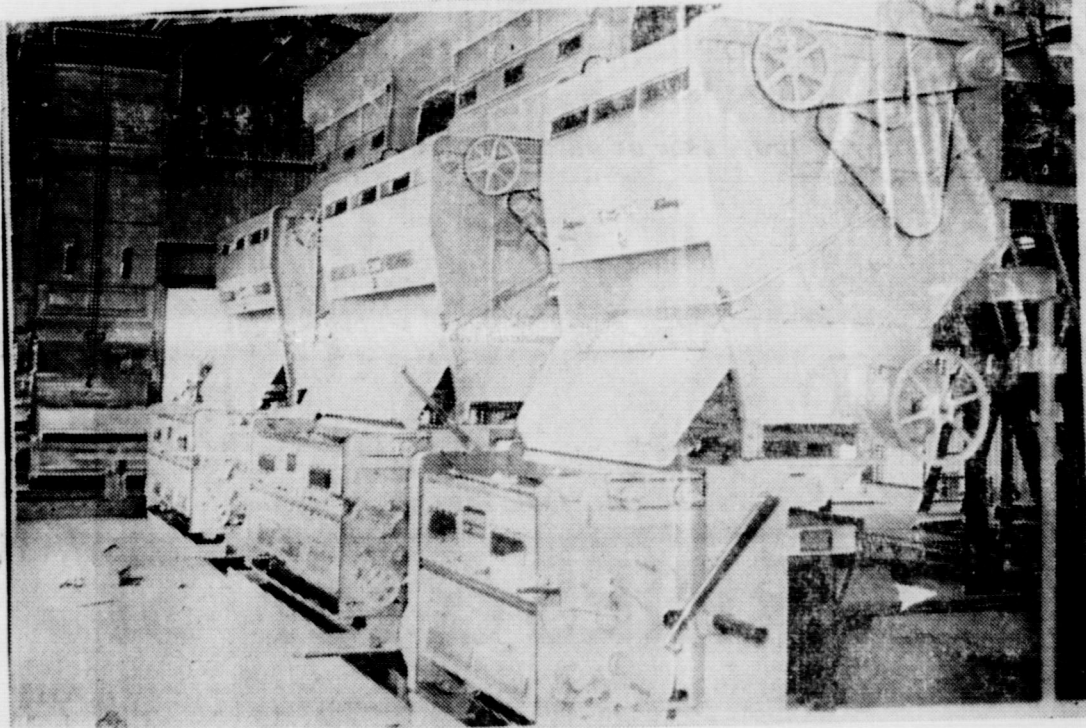

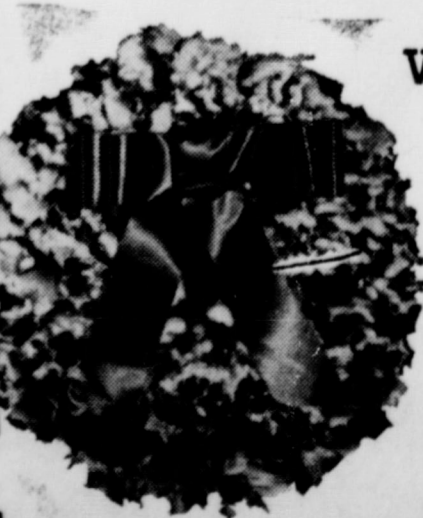
