THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN No. 11

By Sen. Preston Smith

Increased tuition for the state's colleges apparently will not be voted by this session of the Legislature.

The door was closed March 13th against introduction of any bills to raise the tuition as recommended by the Commission on Higher Education. From now on, the controversial tuition hike will require a four-fifths permissive vote for introduction.

It is substantive legislation and cannot be put in the appropriation bill. That was recognized two years ago in the hard fight for HB 265, which then increased tuition 100 percent in state colleges and universities.

In spite of some confusion in the issue, the truth is that the state's colleges and universities are opposed to any increase in tuition.

It has been reported erroneously from conclusions drawn prematurely, that apparently some colleges were aware of the possibility of increased tuition and were in favor of such increase.

A bill has been introduced to authorize colleges and universities to charge additional "student activities" fees, primarily to cover costs of intramural athletics. The bill did not deal with the different question of higher tuition charges and apparently could not be amended to include such charges.

A pending house bill would raise tuition of out of state students. Based on the extensive opposition to the 1957 tuition hike, it is highly improbable that a bill could be introduced now.

Rock Crusher Plant Is Improved

Work has been completed on about \$200,000.00 worth of improvements on the Lone Star Rock Crusher, 5 miles south of town. New heavy equipment added includes a yard and half shovel and four 50 yard bins with two triple cock screens in the bins. This new equipment is down in a new pit recently opened. The plant employs an average of 25 men thru the year and there is a possibility a second shift may be added since the improvement increases production. The plant is on a 200 acre site of high quality limestone.

The stone is crushed to various sizes and its use is varied being largely used in road construction but also used in commercial building, topping roofs, etc.

C. A. Lacy is the popular manager of the plant for the past 12 years and is a loyal friend of O'Donnell. Mrs. Lacy is also valued by the town work in civic projects from time to time.

The plant has a sizable influence on the economy of the town as the payroll runs about \$250.00 a day plus the running expense and many of the employees live here or in the area. The plant has a business area of 100 mile radius but at times rock is sold to distant points.

O'Donnell appreciates this industry and the good will of its employees.

MINISTERS UNDER S. S.

The Social Security Administration reminds clergymen that some of them will never be able to have their earnings from the ministry count toward old age, survivors, or disability benefits if they fail to take certain steps within the next few weeks. John Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock social security office, declares:

Clergymen may have their earnings from the ministry counted toward old age, survivors and disability insurance protection if they formally indicate within a specified time their desire to have these earnings counted. When a clergyman comes under social security he reports his earnings as self employed income even though these earnings may be salary paid to him by the congregation or religious order which he serves. He must pay the social security self employment tax on his earnings. The church he serves does not become involved in any way.

Any clergyman who has not yet filed to be covered under the social security law must file a waiver certificate with the District Director of Internal Revenue on or before the due date of his income tax return.

The total tonnage of fertilizer sold during the last half of 1958 in Texas was 4.2 percent over the same period in 1957 but 20 percent above the tonnage sold during the same period in 1953. The trend toward the use of higher analysis fertilizers continued its rapid pace.

Egg production in 1959 is expected to exceed that of last year. Indications point to a downward trend in egg prices during the next six months. Prices may improve during late 1959.
