



Spoon into four No. 2 greased tin cans filling 1/3 full, or into one bread pan, 5x9x3 inches. Cover and let rise until dough is within 1 inch of top of cans. Bake 30 to 40 minutes in quick, moderate oven (375°F.). Remove from cans or pan and cool on racks. Brush tops with confectioners' sugar frosting (1 cup confectioners' sugar mixed with 2 to 3 tablespoons warm milk) allowing icing to dribble down the sides.

Pennsylvania Dutch Coffee Cake

- 1 package compresser or fast granular yeast
- 14 cup warm yeast 34 cup milk
- 14 cup sugar 4 cup soft shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg, unbeaten
- 1/3 cup seedless raisins 1/3 cup finely chopped citron

31/2 to 33/4 cups flour, sifted Add yeast to warm water and le stand. Scald milk and pour into bowl with sugar, soft shortening and salt; blend together and cool to lukewarm. Stir yeast mixture well and pour into bowl with milk mixture. Add egg, seedless raisins, chopped citron and enough of the flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board and knead until smooth. Place in greased bowl, turning once. Cover bowl with damp cloth and let rise in warm place 11/2 to 2 hours or



until impression remains when finger is pressed deep into side of dough. Punch down dough. Place in lightly greased ob ong pan, 9x13x2 inches or in two 8-inch square pans. Pat dough evenly into pans. Let rise in warm

place about 30 minutes, covered. While cakes are rising, mix together 1 cup brown sugar packed in cup, 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Measure out 11/2 cups thick sour cream. After coffee cake has risen, make little dents in the top with fingers. Pour sour cream on top and spread evenly. Sprinkle with the sugar-cinnamon mixture. Bake 35 to 45 minutes quick-moderate oven (375°F.).

Cinnamon Rolls 1 package hot roll mix

- 6 tablespoons melted butter 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Make dough according to direcions on package. On well-floured board pat dough into rectangle about 12x18 inches. Brush with butter, sprinkle with brown sugar, cinnamon and chopped nuts. Roll as for jelly roll, cut in 12 slices. Put slices cut side down, on grased baking sheet about 1-inch apart. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 20 minutes. Glaze rolls if desired.

Eggs are not always beaten separately before adding to yeast bat-ters because the final beating after mixing, 100 strokes, blends it per-

fectly into the batter. When you're beating yeast dough, beat "from the shoulder." This not only exercises the dough more easi-

ly, but it's also less tiring A good way to handle dough which is rising is to place in a closed cupboard alongside a bowl of warm water. This gives the desired high temperature and also keeps the dough away from a draft.

FIRST AID TO THE AILING HOUSE BY ROGER C. WHITMAN

Refinishing Woodwork

QUESTION: Our home has fir woodwork. This was painted with white enamel when we purchased it twelve years ago. With two small children, the woodwork was left with their hand and finger prints. Several years ago I used an undercoat and finished it with light oak and stain varnish. The last few times I washed it, it cracked and peeled, leaving the old finish showing. Would it be possible for me to finish my woodwork myself?

ANSWER: When you varnished over the old finish you evidently did not prepare the surfaces sufficiently to take the new finish; therefore the finish failed. Before doing anything more, all the old finishes should be well scraped off down to the bare wood. If you can get hold of an electric portable sander, this would save time and work in removing the old finishes. Or you can use a varnish remover to soften the finish, and follow by scraping with scrapers. steel wool and rough cloths. Then clean the surfaces very thoroughly with turpentine, for every trace of remover must come off; if any is left on, it will work on the new finish. (Liquids are inflammablebe careful of fire.) For the finish that you like so well, bleach out the wood with a prepared wood bleach. Next, coat the surfaces with a liberal coat of white paste wood filler tinted with color-inoil thinned with turpentine to the consistency of thick paint. (Or you may be able to buy a special 'pickled" wood stain.) After fifteen minutes wipe off most of the coating across the grain with a coarse cloth. The remaining filler should be allowed to dry hard Then smooth the wood with very fine sandpaper. Wipe off dust thor oughly and finish with white shellac or varnish.





And when housing pullets, it is generally wise to keep together those of the same age and stage of development. Smaller birds have a better chance this way.

Gasoline on the Farm Is 'Liquid Dynamite'

on July 1.

Gasoline on a farm is 'liquid dynamite" and must be handled with extreme care to prevent explosions and fires. It is estimated that annual farm losses from gasoline fires amount to more than \$7,000,000.

Here are eight safety rules the farmer should follow:

1. Gasoline should be stored in steel drums in underground tanks at least 75 feet from any building. 2. Gasoline or kerosene should never be left in open containers in any building.

3. Gasoline or kerosene should never be handled in the presence of an open flame or other source of possible ignition.

4. In pouring gasoline, make sure the pouring and receiving receptacles are grounded, to avoid static sparks.

5. Never use gasoline, benzene, or other flammable material for dry cleaning.

6. Never use gasoline or kerosene to start a fire in a stove or elsewhere. 7. Make sure cans or tanks used

in storage of gasoline or kerosene are painted red, marked plainly and in large letters.

8. Never forget that gasoline or related petroleum products are the most potentially dangerous things you have on your farm. Observance of these rules will cut down farm fire losses.

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
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
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Stuff the Turkey with Goodness (See Recipes Below)

Hail Thanksgiving!

THANKEGIVING is one time of the year when traditions and tradi-tional foods take the spotlight. Dinner on this big day wouldn't be complete without

turkey and the trimmings, like a favorite or succulent stuffing, cranberries in a relish, pumpkin pie and of course, the edible centerpiece of nuts and fruits!

Most of us have a favorite stuffing recipe, one handed down in the family or one of our own variations to please the family. It may be sausage, cornbread, strong on the sage, celery or onion. No matter what the source, however, Thanks-giving is the time to stuff the turkey, and with a good stuffing.

AS WITH MOST very old recipes with such definite character, sooner or later the old recipes are modernized and given changes which make them more typical of today's food preferances. Here is the recipe in its modern form which is unusually fluffy and richly moist:

*Fluffy Poultry Dressing (For 10-12 pound turkey) 21/2 quarts fine bread crumbs 1 cup butter, chicken fat or

substitute 21/2 cups quick, rolled oats, un-

cooked 1 cup raisins

1 cup chopped nutmeats 1 tablespoon poultry season-

ing 2 teaspoons salt

½ teaspoon pepper 1 teaspoon baking powder 3/3 to 1 cup water

Rub butter or chicken fat into bread crumbs and toast in broiler or hot (425°F.) oven until golden brown. Add rolled oats, raisins, nutmeats, seasonings and baking powder, mixing thoroughly. Sprinkle water over surface, stirring lightly until dressing is of desired moist-ness. Stuff lightly into neck region and body cavity of the bird. Note: Many delicious variations can be made by adding any of the following: sliced, cooked chestnuts, oysters, mushrooms or cooked sausage.

become famous throughout the country. This too, is a fluff. crisp texture from the celery and green pep-per. The sau-

sage is optional but it, too, adds its own distinctive flavor. The cornbread may be made in advance. Sausage Cornbread Dressing

(For 12 pound turkey) 1 pound pork sausage meat

1 cup diced celery 1/2 cup minced enion 1/2 cup chopped green pepper 2 teaspoons salt

½ teaspoon pepper 5 or 6 cups corn bread, crumbled

6 cups soft bread crumbs 2 eggs, beaten 1 to 11/2 cups water

Pan-fry pork sausage meat. Drain. Cook celery and onion in 1/2 cup sausage drippings for 5 min-

When you can move the drumstick easily up and down, the turkey is cooked as necessary. Or, press the fleshy part of the drumstick, protecting the fingers with a cloth. If done, the meat feels soft.

Those with Scotch ancestry are probably familiar with a Scotch Oatmeal dressing, truly an heirloom recipe. This old-fashioned recipe is still used in the "old country" as well as many homes where traditions are cherished and carried over from generation to generation.

Here is the unusual recipe with its main ingredients, rolled oats, onions and sage. Scotch Oatmeal Dressing

(For 10-12 pound turkey) 4 cups quick, rolled oats, uncooked

11/2 cups butter or substitute 2 small onions, finely chopped 2 teaspoons salt

½ teaspoon pepper 1½ teaspoons sage

Rub butter or substitute into rolled oats until they just hold together. Mix in onions, salt, pepper and sage. Stuff lightly into neck region and body cavity of the bird.

HERE AS ONE interesting way of preparing sweet potatoes for the big dinner:

*Toasted Croquettes (Makes 6) 2 cups mashed sweet potatoes

1 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper 1 teaspoon brown sugar 1 teaspoon lemon juice

6 marshmallows 34 cup cereal flake crumbs Blend mashed sweet potatoes with

salt, pepper, brown sugar and lemon juice. Shape in balls around the marshmallows. Roll in crumbs and brown in a moderate (350°F.) oven for 15 minutes. Or, dip in slightly beaten egg, then in crumbs and deep-fat fry.

> *Cranberry Conserve 1 quart cranberries 1 cup chopped raisins 2 oranges, ground

3 cups sugar

14 cup chopped walnuts Wash cranberries; cover with water, heat to boiling and simmer until tender. Put through sieve or food mill. Add chopped raisins and ground oranges. Cook over low heat

for 10 minutes. Add sugar and sim-

mer over low heat until thick. Stir

in walnuts. Chill before serving or seal in hot sterile glasses. When dinner is set for a certain time, start roasting the turkey a half an hour or so ahead of schedule to avoid delay at serving time. This allows time for longer cooking it necessary, time to make gravy, remove the trussing and arranging

the bird on the platter. Have some good, smooth gravy with your turkey. Use 6 tablespoons of drippings with an equal amount of flour blended into it until smooth. (water, milk or broth) and cook, stirring until thickened.

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
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Farm Scrap Harvest Reported a Success Farmers Can Sell All Scrap Iron and Steel

The national farm scrap harvest conducted between October 15 and November 15 has been termed a success by the steel industry, producing millions of tons of scrap iron and steel badly needed for making new steel.

Although the drive is over, farmers should continue to collect the scrapped machinery about their farms and sell it to dealers. It is a good way to keep the farm prem-



ises cleaned up and, although scrap does not sell for big prices, the financial return does mean some-

The steel industry continues to need the broken tractor parts, rusted and worn out implements, plow points, outdated horse drawn equipment, old cultivators, broken shovels and similar equipment that can be found on almost every American farm. There are about 25 tons of iron and steel on the average farm.

Farm scrap can be a major source of the 36,000,000 tons of scrap that are needed by the steel mills this year. It takes that much scrap to produce 110,000,000 tons of steel that mills in our country have as their goal for 1951.

G. A. Branaman, Michigan State College animal husbandry authority, reports that full feeding grain nd, can start a fire that may is the quickest way to get a steer to market, but it isn't necessarily the cheapest or the most profitable.

be fed longer and more cheaply than well-bred steers of good type. "Corn silage full-fed along with protein supplement may replace all the grain for plain steers when fed a longer time," he comments. "Yearling steers usually are fed from 4 to 7 months, depending on their grade and quality, and the amount of grain fed. Calves require a longer time to fatten and 2-year-

olds a shorter time. Wintering calves on roughage, then pasturing for part or all of the summer without grain results in cheap gains. Under present cattle and feed prices it is possible to pasture cattle for two summers, feeding roughage in winter. These animals may be grain fed for a short time or sold as grass-fat

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

Blank explained that lambs can see better without a heavy crop of wool around their eyes. After shearing they'll find the feed trough more quickly, will eat better and will gain much more rapidly, specialists report.



NATIONAL AQUARIUM

1,500 Species of Marine Life Maintained by National Aquarium

WNU Washington Bureau

The National Aquarium in Washington, although housed in the Department of Commerce building, has been operated by the Fish and Wildlife Service under the Department of Interior since 1940. In that year, the service was created by the consolidation of the Bureau of Fisheries of Commerce and the Bureau of Biological Survey of the Department of Agriculture.

The original aquarium, established in 1888 by the former U.S. Fish Commission, occupied an old pre-Civil War building in another part of the city. When the present Commerce building was built in 1932, the fish were moved to the new and larger aquarium under the main lobby, but operation continues by the Fish and Wildlife Serv-

The present aquarium occupies a floor space of about 14,000 square feet, and has 50 tanks which hold about 30,000 gallons of water. The water is changed on an average of three times a day. Since the aquarium is situated below the sewer level, the water is drained into underground reservoirs which must, in turn be pumped out, an expensive operation.

The heavily chlorinated city water supply, which the aquarium uses, is a constant problem because chlorine would mean overnight death to the fish. All the water used must therefore pass through carbon filters. Temperature control must also be watched carefully. The hot Washington summers require complete refrigeration of the tanks of northern fishes, and the warm water of the tropics must be duplicated in those tanks which have fish accustomed to that cli-

The aquarium now houses 1500 ndividual kinds of fish of which the rarest is a collection of albino catfish - the only such collection now in this country. Another great attraction to the 250,000 visitors each year is Siamese Sue, a tiny with one body but two heads. Sue is a perfect example of turtle frustration. Each brain controls the set of legs on its side so that indecision as to whether she's going to move or stay still major factor in Sue's life. Each head must be fed simultaneously or the other one will try to grab the food. Sue has grown from the size of a quarter to about the size of a silver dollar in the two years that she's been at the aquarium. A two-headed turtle usually lives only a few months.

The NATIONAL Aquarium seeks primarily to maintain an attractive display of the principal fresh-water game fishes which are propagated and distributed throughout interior waters of the country, John C. Pearson, director of the aquarium,

Reactions of aquarium spectators are watched as carefully as the behavior of the fishes themselves. It has been noticed that women like the fancy Oriental goldfish, the black Chinese Moors and the multi-colored Shubunkins. Men seem to prefer the rainbow and brook trout while Siamese Sue remains the favorite of most children. The most generally liked attraction, however, is the shallow pool filled with turtles of all vari-

Future improvements to the aquarium call for better lighting effects in the display tanks. They the displays. More naturalistic often. backgrounds for the exhibits is "For another aim. Real moss grows in the tanks, but most of the greenery used is bamboo because it retains its color under water for a longer period than most other types of greens. Aquarium officials also hope for a more complete dis-play of native food and game fish so well appreciated by many millions of American fishermen.



The Bible lesson for the week is a failure-story, not a success-story. It is the story of some

persons who contracted the grasshopper complex, a mental disease that still attacks people today. The story is from the wild days when the Israelites, now two years out from Egypt, were first knocking at the doors of the Promised Land.

The Israelites were land-hungry, but the only land they wanted was what we now call Palestine and it was not theirs for the asking. They would have to fight for it, every foot of it. They all knew this, Moses knew it. There was no going back to Egypt and slavery. Nobody wanted to stay in the desert. The obvious thing was to go ahead into Palestine. But there were two questions filling the people's minds: (1) What kind of country is it, really? and (2) can we fight our way into

Investigating Committee

SO a committee of investigation was formed, of one man from each of the twelve tribes,-grown men, trusted leaders, by no means 'boy scouts."

Don't think of these men as sneaking through Palestine from bush to bush; peeping out Indian fashion to see what they could see. They walked into Palestine, not unobserved but unmolested. They spoke Egyptian, of course, and could easily pass as Egyptian traveling salesmen. They spent around six weeks in that country, visiting the cities, no doubt talking with the people

In late summer they went back to the encampment on the edge of the desert, carrying some of the fruits of the land. (Incidentally, those pictures showing bunches of grapes six feet long are a funny misunderstanding. Palestine has good grapes, but not quite that good! They carried the grapes on poles because that was the best way to keep them from being crushed.)

At the big mass-meeting at the desert camp, the twelve made their report. On the facts, they were all unanimous. It was a wonderful country, "flowing with milk and honey," a great country for cattle and bees. Palestine did look marvelous to their desert-burned eyes. But on question number two there was a serious division: Can we fight our way in? Yes, said the minority of two. No, said the majority of ten.

Grasshopper Complex

THE majority put their reasons in a single revealing sentence: We were as grasshoppers in their sight, they said, and so we were in our sight. Nowadays we call this state of

mind the "inferiority complex"; our name is a new one for an old trouble. Think of yourself as a grasshopper, and grasshopper is what you shall be. Take yourself at other people's lowest estimate, and that is all you will be worth.

The trouble with the grasshopper complex is that it is catching. The majority report was wrong, as majority reports so often are. But the people be-lieved them rather than the courageous pair who stood up to declare boldly, We can do it, with the help of God.

Well, what did God do about it? That is perhaps the saddest part of the story. He did nothing about it. He let the people impose their own sentence. Grasshoppers? Very well, so be it. Grasshoppers die, they never amount to anything, no one bothers to kill them, they just die. God was believed to strike men dead in anger, or command the earth to open and swallow up the wicked, or hurl lightning from the skies on his enemies. But he wasted no miracles on these self-elected grasshoppers. He only let them die. Ten, twenty, forty years . . . just drifting about in the wilderness, till they all died, and a new generation took their places.

Opportunity did not knock twice. There was a tide in those men's lives.

Federal Judge Issues Unusual CO Ruling

HUNTINGTON, W. Va. - It's not what a religious denomination teaches, but how the individual interprets that teaching which should decide whether a man is a valid conscientious objector.

That's the way Federal Judge Harry E. Watkins said he viewed the case of Howard Everngam, 23, now of Point Pleasant, formely of New York.

Everngam, a Roman Catholic, refused to be inducted in Charleston last August, claiming that by religious training he was a conscientious objector. He was subsequently charged with violating the Selective Service Act.

He told the court he is not opposed to bearing arms in a "just war, but that "such wars are only theoretical in the present scheme of things." After his refusal to be inducted he asked to be classified 1-AO (conscientious objector)

In New York, an examiner (a Catholic) heard his case and said that he (the examiner) held no such convictions as Everngam, and that the latter's convictions could not be based on his faith.

Judge Watkins ruled that the question to be decided was not whether profession of the Catholic faith implied objection to military service, but whether the individual's own interpretation of its teachings led him to object to such service. The judge withheld his decision.

Church Council Hits University Gag Rule

COLUMBUS, O. - Opposition to Ohio State University's rule requiring the screening of outside speakers was expressed here by the assembly of the Ohio council of churches, although no reference was made to the university.

"We are strongly opposed to any attempt to throttle freedom of speech, whether it be in the name of either patriotism or religion, the church council said in a resolu-

"The important consideration is not whether any alleged doctrine or speaker is 'right' or 'left' or 'safe and sound.' The important thing is whether they voice the truth, and truth is too broad to be contained within a single point of view.

"We can arrive at truth only as every partisan, however radical has his chance for self-expression. This is not only historic Americanism, this is following in the footsteps of Him Who said: 'Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.'

Southern Fireworks

THE recent southern governors' conference at Hot Springs, Ark., developed some political fireworks which added fuel to the Dixiecrat movement. The conference also added impetus to the move for a southern convention which may nominate an independent candidate for the presidency in next year's turbulent campaign.

Despite this dark outlook for the candidacy of President Truman, some of the more astute politicians here do not seem to be worried over this eventuality. They likely are statistically minded and in going back over the years point to the fact that throughout the political history of the country when a Democrat presidential nominee has been returned a winner he won with sufficient electoral votes that he could have lost the solid south and still won, except in one instance. That was in the second Wilson campaign in 1916 which was so close that everyone thought Charles Evans Hughes had been elected until early morning returns from California turned the trick for President Wil-

For instance, in 1948 President Truman won with a plurality of 115 electoral votes which is the exact total of the ten southern states electoral count, loss of which would have placed him in a tie with Governor Dewey. Truman needed only one southern state to win. As it was he did not get the 38 votes from Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina which were cast for the Dixiecrat candidate, Gov. J. Stom Thurman of South Carolina. And in 1948 President Truman lost such important states as New York with 47 votes, Pennsylvania with 35, Maryland with 8, and Michigan with 19. He may not lose these states in 1952 according to the accurate and comprehensive poll recently taken

among nation's weekly editors.

If President Truman could win only one of these states, for instance Pennsylvania, he could lose the 10 southern states to an independent candidate and still win the election, even though he lost Ohio with 25 votes to Senator Taft.

The poll of the weekly newspaper editors, who are closer to the grassroots thinking of this country than any other group, predict the nominees of the two major parties will be Senator Taft and President Truman, although they indicate a preference themselves for General Eisenhower. They further predict that President Truman will win the election carrying 33 states, includ-ing Michigan, Pennsylvania, possibly New York, if Eisenhower does not run, and Maryland-all states lost by Truman in 1948.

Another Stake

Insofar as southern congressmen and senators are concerned, there is an even greater stake in their seniority rights as chairmen of the most important congressional committees which they would lose if they gave their support either to a Republican or an Independent.

President Truman was charitable to the four states which refused to cast their electoral votes for him in 1948 and made no attempt to "discipline" such recalcitrant Democrats as Senator Ellender of Louisiana and Senators Maybank and

Johnston of South Carolina. In any widespread defection from the official party line these southern senators would certainly lose following committee chairmanships: Ellender, agriculture and forestry; Russel of Georgia, armed services; Maybank, banking and currency; McClelland of Arkansas, expenditures in the executive department; George of Georgia, finance; Connally of Texas, foreign relations; and Johnston of South Carolina, post office and civil serv-

Convention Fight

Likely the dissident southerners will adopt a program of attempting to defeat President Truman at the Chicago convention, as they did at Philadelphia, and failing as they will if the President wants the nomination, will map their strategy from

It is almost a certainty, however, there will not be a solid south movement. Such governors as Sidney McMath of Arkansas, W. Kerr Scott of North Carolina, Fuller Warren of Florida, Gordon Browning of Tennessee, and Allan Shivers of Texas, all said to be friendly to the President, are expected to exert a leavening and deterrent influence at least on their own states.

Atrocities

The disclosure that the Communists have murdered American prisoners of war caused a wave of anger in the home towns of the nation. A number of investigations have been started to find out why the announcement was made at this particular time. One immediate result was greater tension at the already tense Korean cease-fire talks. It may, however, bring about a greater war effort within the Unit-



choice, he snows the people the alternatives: Life and Good on the one hand, Death and Evil on the other. Make up your mind, he says: Choose. The Law of God does not force you.

It is not an arbitrary thing. The reason for the Law is never "just because." The reason for the Law is that it is the way to live. You don't have to keep it, Moses says in effect; but if you choose to reject it, the end of the other road is Death.

This is true for individuals, it is true for nations. It is a terrific mistake to think of God as ordering us about for his own amusement, or to tie us down. He gives us orders for our own sakes.

A NOTHER legacy Moses leaves behind is a Song. We do not usually think of Moses as a poet, but Deut. 32 is ascribed to him. He knew people might forget the Law, but a Song they would not forget. "I care not who writes a nation's laws," said a philosopher, "if only I can write its songs."

What Moses gave his people was no mere tuneful trash, but a grand hymn of faith. What Moses most of all wants his people to do, is not to remember him but to remember God. So after all the law is on the books, and all the speeches have been made, at the last he gives his people a Song, to remember

Is it not so always? What are the parts of the Bible that mean most to all generations? Always the singing words of Psalm and prophet and gospel, the rhythm of Paul's chapter on Love, the majestic choruses of the Revelation. Though great men pass, though the mind forget the Law, the heart will not forget the Song.

NATIONAL AQUARIUM

1,500 Species of Marine Life Maintained by National Aquarium

The National Aquarium in Washington, although housed in the Department of Commerce building, has been operated by the Fish and Wildlife Service under the Department of Interior since 1940. In that year, the service was created by the consolidation of the Bureau of Fisheries of Commerce and the Bureau of Biological Survey of the Department of Agriculture.

The original aquarium, established in 1888 by the former U.S. Fish Commission, occupied an old pre-Civil War building in another part of the city. When the present Commerce building was built in 1932, the fish were moved to the new and larger aquarium under the main lobby, but operation continues by the Fish and Wildlife Serv-

The present aquarium occupies floor space of about 14,000 square feet, and has 50 tanks which hold about 30,000 gallons of water. The water is changed on an average of three times a day. Since the aquarium is situated below the sewer level, the water is drained into underground reservoirs which must, in turn be pumped out, an expensive operation.

The heavily chlorinated city water supply, which the aquarium uses, is a constant problem because chlorine would mean overnight death to the fish. All the water used must therefore pass through carfilters. Temperature control must also be watched carefully. The hot Washington summers require complete refrigeration of the tanks of northern fishes, and the warm water of the tropics must be duplicated in those tanks which have fish accustomed to that cli-

The aquarium now houses 1500 ndividual kinds of fish of which the rarest is a collection of albino catfish - the only such collection now in this country. Another great attraction to the 250,000 visitors each year is Siamese Sue, a tiny turtle with one body but two heads. Sue is a perfect example of turtle frustration. Each brain controls the set of legs on its side so that indecision as to whether she's going to move or stay still is a major factor in Sue's life. Each head must be fed simultane ously or the other one will try to grab the food. Sue has grown from the size of a quarter to about the size of a silver dollar in the two years that she's been at the aquarium. A two-headed turtle usually lives only a few months.

The NATIONAL Aquarium seeks primarily to maintain an attractive display of the principal fresh-water game fishes which are propagated and distributed throughout interior waters of the country, John C. Pearson, director of the aquarium,

Reactions of aquarium spectators are watched as carefully as the behavior of the fishes themselves. It has been noticed that women like the fancy Oriental goldfish, the black Chinese Moors and the multi-colored Shubunkins. Men seem to prefer the rainbow and brook trout while Siamese Sue re-mains the favorite of most children. The most generally liked attraction, however, is the shallow pool filled with turtles of all varieties.

Future improvements to the aquarium call for better lighting effects in the display tanks. They the surrounding area kept just a Gene Tierney, one of Hollywood's bit darker so as to better show off another aim. Real moss grows in the tanks, but most of the greenery used is bamboo because it retains its color under water for a longer period than most other types of greens. Aquarium officials also hope for a more complete dis-play of native food and game fish so well appreciated by many millions of American fishermen.

A 'gem collector" once offered \$5 for a pearl-bearing oyster from Hawaii. As Mr. Pearson says, a good motto for any aquarium management is: "If it fits into a pocket, keep it locked up."



Lesson for December 2, 1951

SO Shakespeare said, and he was at least half right. Opportunity sometimes knocks twice; but don't count on it.

The Bible lesson for the week is a failure-story, not a success-story. It

is the story of some persons who contracted the grasshopper complex, a mental disease that still attacks people today. The story is from the wild days when the Israelites, now two years out from Egypt, were first knocking at the doors of the Promised Land.



The Israelites were land-hungry, but the only land they wanted was what we now call Palestine and it was not theirs for the asking. They would have to fight for it, every foot of it. They all knew this, Moses knew it. There was no going back to Egypt and slavery. Nobody wanted to stay in the desert. The obvious thing was to go ahead into Palestine. But there were two questions filling the people's minds: (1) What kind of country is it, really? and (2) can we fight our way into

Investigating Committee

SO a committee of investigation was formed, of one man from each of the twelve tribes,-grown men, trusted leaders, by no means boy scouts.

Don't think of these men as sneaking through Palestine from bush to bush; peeping out Indian fashion to see what they could see. They walked into Palestine, not unobserved but unmolested. They spoke Egyptian, of course, and could easily pass as Egyptian traveling salesmen. They spent around six weeks in that country, visiting the cities, no doubt talking with the people

In late summer they went back to the encampment on the edge of the desert, carrying with them some of the fruits of the land. (Incidentally, those pictures showing bunches of grapes six feet long are a funny misunderstanding. Palestine has good grapes, but not quite that good! They carried the grapes on poles because that was the best way to keep them from being crushed.)

At the big mass-meeting at the desert camp, the twelve made their report. On the facts, they were all unanimous. It was a wonderful country, "flowing with milk and honey," a great country for cattle honey, and bees. Palestine did look marvelous to their desert-burned eyes. But on question number two there was a serious division: Can we fight our way in? Yes, said the minority of two. No, said the majority of ten.

Grasshopper Complex

THE majority put their reasons in a single revealing sentence: We were as grasshoppers in their sight, they said, and so we were in our

Nowadays we call this state of mind the "inferiority complex"; our name is a new one for an old trouble. Think of yourself as a grasshopper, and grasshopper is what you shall be. Take yourself at other people's lowest estimate, and that is all you will be worth.

The trouble with the grasshopper complex is that it is catching. The majority report was wrong, as majority reports so often are. But the people believed them rather than the courageous pair who stood up to declare boldly, We can do it, with the help of God.

Well, what did God do about it? That is perhaps the saddest part of the story. He did nothing about it. He let the people impose their own sentence. Grasshoppers? Very well, so be it. Grasshoppers die, they never amount to anything, no one bothers to kill them, they just die. God was believed to strike men dead in anger, or command the earth to open and swallow up the wicked, or hurl lightning from the skies on his enemies. But he wasted no miracles on these self-elected grasshoppers. He only let them die. Ten, twenty, forty years . . . just drifting about in the wilderness, till they all died, and a new generation

took their places. Opportunity did not knock twice. There was a tide in those men's lives.

Federal Judge Issues Unusual CO Ruling

HUNTINGTON, W. Va. - It's not teaches, but how the individual interprets that teaching which should decide whether a man is a valid conscientious objector.

That's the way Federal Judge Harry E. Watkins said he viewed the case of Howard Everngam, 23. now of Point Pleasant, formely of

Everngam, a Roman Catholic, refused to be inducted in Charleston last August, claiming that by religlous training he was a conscientious objector. He was subsequently charged with violating the Selective Service Act. He told the court he is not op-

posed to bearing arms in a "just" war, but that "such wars are only theoretical in the present scheme of things." After his refusal to be inducted he asked to be classified 1-AO (conscientious objector). In New York, an examiner (a

Catholic) heard his case and sa that he (the examiner) held no such convictions as Everngam, and that the latter's convictions could not be based on his faith.

Judge Watkins ruled that the question to be decided was not whether profession of the Catholic faith implied objection to military service, but whether the individual's own interpretation of its teachings led him to object to such service. The judge withheld his decision.

Church Council Hits University Gag Rule

COLUMBUS, O. - Opposition to Ohio State University's rule requiring the screening of outside speakers was expressed here by the assembly of the Ohio council of churches, although no reference was made to the university.

"We are strongly opposed to any attempt to throttle freedom of speech, whether it be in the name of either patriotism or religion. the church council said in a resolu-

tion. "The important consideration is not whether any alleged doctrine or speaker is 'right' or 'left' or 'safe and sound.' The important thing is whether they voice the truth, and truth is too broad to be contained within a single point of view.

"We can arrive at truth only as every partisan, however radical has his chance for self-expression. This is not only historic Americanism, this is following in the footsteps of Him Who said: 'Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.'

Southern Fireworks

THE recent southern governors' conference at Hot Springs, Ark., developed some political fireworks which added fuel to the Dixiecrat movement. The conference also added impetus to the move for a southern convention which may nominate an independent candidate for the presidency in next year's turbulent campaign.

Despite this dark outlook for the candidacy of President Truman, some of the more astute politicians here do not seem to be worried over this eventuality. They likely are statistically minded and in going back over the years point to the fact that throughout the political history of the country when a Democrat presidential nominee has been returned a winner he won with sufficient electoral votes that he could have lost the solid south and still won, except in one instance. That was in the second Wilson campaign in 1916 which was so close that everyone thought Charles Evans Hughes had been elected until early morning returns from California turned the trick for President Wilson.

For instance, in 1948 President Truman won with a plurality of 115 electoral votes which is the exact total of the ten southern states electoral count, loss of which would have placed him in a tie with Governor Dewey. Truman needed only one southern state to win. As it was he did not get the 38 votes from Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina which were cast for the Dixiecrat candidate, Gov. J. Stom Thurman of South Carolina. And in 1948 President Truman lost such important states as New York with 47 votes, Pennsylvania with 35, Maryland with 8, and Michigan with 19. He may not lose these states in 1952 according to the accurate and comprehensive poll recently taken among nation's weekly editors.

If President Truman could win only one of these states, for instance Pennsylvania, he could lose the 10 southern states to an independent candidate and still win the election, even though he lost Ohio with 25 votes to Senator Taft.

The poll of the weekly newspaper editors, who are closer to the grassroots thinking of this country than any other group, predict the nominees of the two major parties will be Senator Taft and President Truman, although they indicate a preference themselves for General Eisenhower. They further predict that President Truman will win the election carrying 33 states, including Michigan, Pennsylvania, possi-New York, if Eisenhower does not run, and Maryland-all states lost by Truman in 1948.

Another Stake

Insofar as southern congressmen and senators are concerned, there is an even greater stake in their seniority rights as chairmen of the most important congressional committees which they would lose if they gave their support either to a Republican or an Independent.

President Truman was charitable to the four states which refused to cast their electoral votes for him in 1948 and made no attempt to "discipline" such recalcitrant Democrats as Senator Ellender of Louisiana and Senators Maybank and Johnston of South Carolina.

In any widespread defection from the official party line these southern senators would certainly lose the following committee chairmanships: Ellender, agriculture and forestry; Russel of Georgia, armed services; Maybank, banking and currency: McClelland of Arkansas, expenditures in the executive department; George of Georgia, finance; Connally of Texas, foreign relations; and Johnston of South Carolina, post office and civil serv-

Convention Fight

Likely the dissident southerners will adopt a program of attempting to defeat President Truman at the Chicago convention, as they did at Philadelphia, and failing as they will if the President wants the nomination, will map their strategy from

It is almost a certainty, however, there will not be a solid south movement. Such governors as Sidney McMath of Arkansas, W. Kerr Scott of North Carolina, Fuller Warren of Florida, Gordon Browning of Tennessee, and Allan Shivers of Texas, all said to be friendly to the President, are expected to exert a leavening and deterrent influence at least on their own states.

The disclosure that the Communists have murdered American prisoners of war caused a wave of anger in the home towns of the nation. A number of investigations have been started to find out why the announcement was made at this particular time. One immediate result was greater tension at the already tense Korean cease-fire talks. It may, however, bring about a greater war effort within the Unit-



alternatives: Life and Good on the one hand, Death and Evil on the other. Make up your mind, he says: Choose. The Law of God does not force you.

It is not an arbitrary thing. The reason for the Law is never because." The reason for the Law is that it is the way to live. You don't have to keep it, Moses says in effect: but if you choose to reject it, the end of the other road is Death.

This is true for individuals, it is true for nations. It is a terrific mistake to think of God as ordering us about for his own amusement, or to tie us down. He gives us orders for our own sakes.

A Song

A NOTHER legacy Moses leaves behind is a Song. We do not usually think of Moses as a poet, but Deut. 32 is ascribed to him. He knew people might forget the Law, but a Song they would not forget. "I care not who writes a nation's laws,' said a philosopher, "if only I can write its songs."

What Moses gave his people was no mere tuneful trash, but a grand hymn of faith. What Moses most of all wants his people to do, is not to remember him but to remember God, So after all the law is on the books, and all the speeches have been made, at the last he gives his people a Song, to remember God by.

Is it not so always? What are the parts of the Bible that mean most to all generations? Always the singing words of Psalm and prophet and gospel, the rhythm of Paul's chapter on Love, the majestic choruses of the Revelation. Though great men pass, though the mind forget the Law, the heart will not forget the Song.
