It seems March just couldn't go on like a lamb... as the saying is... for the closing day proved to be the first major sandie of the year. However, the month as a whole proved to be very beautiful... only three days of less than normal visibility. Compared to the years of '52 and '53, 1955 has proven to be mild year.

In the late 30's we entered the oil conservation service. By that time the dust bowl of Panhandle, eastern Colorado, and Western Oklahoma had been largely revived due to the courage of the farmers and ranchers, the divine aid of providence in rains and the various aids of the Government, State and federal. But we heard many interesting stories of the years 1932 thru 1935. Dust storms were so severe that S.C.S. personnel would go to work in the spring and summer at 4 a. m. by noon the dust would be so severe that further field work would be impossible. We heard series of abandoned homes that appeared to have been suddenly... very suddenly... left to the wind and sand... as the farmers fled as before an invading army. The kitchen table would be spread, oft with dried food in the plates. The kitchen would have utensils on the stove filled with dried food and a generous coat of dust. In the closets the S.C.S. men would find clothing of the parents and that of the children. And much of the furniture would be in place as well as farm implements in the yard. One of America's great novels would be written along the theme of the Dust Bowl and Great Depression.

In our opinion the S.C.S. did a wonderful job... and are doing so today. It must be remembered that until 1930 soil conservation was almost unknown as a science. Early efforts met with uncertain success but today the practices are as certain in eventual results as a chemical or physical reaction in the lab. One of the most vital services offered by your Federal Government is that of the S.C.S. May their tribe grow.

The future of our town is looking brighter this year than ever before as indicated by the homes being built. Currently there are 8 houses being built or remodeled... more construction than at any time since 1949-50. If the ever-present problem of scarcity of water could be answered, this area would have a brighter future than any similar area in America.

The outlook for the city water this summer is much the same as last year however two good wells are ready to be tied in. But there is hardly a chance at all that there will be a surplus of water. So put pumps on your air conditioners if you are on city water. Every drop saved is that much.

One day last week Mrs. Tredway's 3rd grade and Mrs. Hardberger's 3rd grade class enjoyed a field trip to the Santa Fe Rail Station, the local phone office, the post office and the newspaper office. The classes are studying communications. Several of the mothers assisted the teachers in the tour conducted thru the noon hour.

For the past several days I have been working with a committee from Texas and with my colleagues here (in Washington) in a special effort to persuade officials to raise the support price on milo from the 70 per cent level, which has been announced, to the 85 per cent of parity level which we had last year. Many of us have been urging the Secretary of Agriculture over a period of weeks to raise the support level, pointing out that the 70 per cent support would mean disaster to many sorghum producing areas.

Yesterday we conferred with a representative of the President in regard to the matter. This morning at 8 o'clock we had a meeting of the committee with various Members of Congress from the grain sorghum producing states - Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona. VA Quiz

Q - I pay my GI insurance premiums once a year in advance. If I die, what will happen to the money that has not yet been applied to premiums?
A - The money, earmarked for premiums beyond the month during which death occurred, will be refunded to your beneficiary in lump sum.
Q - I understand that veterans disabled in service after January 31, 1955, may receive disability compensation at peacetime rates - 50 percent of the wartime scale. Are there any conditions under which these veterans may get the full wartime rate?
A - Yes. Disabilities resulting directly from armed conflict, or from extra hazardous service including service under conditions simulating war, may warrant compensation payments at the full wartime rate.



Home Sanitation Is Very Important

"Environmental sanitation is the public health term for clean, safe housekeeping whether it applies to a private home and its surroundings or to towns and cities. Among other things, it insures safe drinking water, proper garbage disposal, the safe service of wholesome food including milk, rat and insect control, and general cleanliness of the premises. However, for environmental sanitation to be effective, it is essential that not only public health officials but the citizens living in their respective homes or operating establishments serving the public cooperate wholeheartedly," declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

"Consider, for example, the seasonal housefly hazard. It has been determined that 120 eggs are laid by a single female at one time and that a generation is produced every ten days at summer temperature. Thus, the possibility of reproduction during the warm months of a single fly runs into many millions. While the housefly does not bite, it is dangerous because it breeds and feeds upon both filth and food.

"Again, rats are the source of several diseases of man including plague, typhus fever, infectious jaundice, and trichinosis; to mention some of the more important ones. Homes can be made comparatively ratproof by removing rubbish and garbage accumulations, and by closing avenues of access. Approved poisons and traps should be employed when a real problem presents itself.

"Removal of containers of stagnant water such as tin cans and barrels will do much to eliminate the mosquito for householders. The householder needs to devote more seasonal attention to mosquito eradication than he is today if this is to be properly controlled.

"In general, good and thorough housekeeping, inside and out, is the personal and civic duty of every home dweller. It not only adds to the pleasure of living and removes disease hazards, but increases the appearance of one's surroundings."

...Know Your Law

In all of his conduct which might result in harm to another player, or to a caddy, the golfer must exercise reasonable and ordinary care, according to the circumstances. It is well known that driven balls do not always travel in the straight course intended, but the player must reasonably foresee the likelihood of injury to others from his driven ball, and use the care necessary to prevent such injury.
