AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE MAXIMUM RATE OF SPEED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES; ALLOWING FOR SPEED ZONES: PROVIDING

FOR SPEED ZONES: PROVIDING
FOR PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY
WEREAS, the City Council of the
City of O'Donnell, Texas, upon the
basis of engineering and traffic investigation, find it necessary to
establish maximum speed limits. vestigation. find it necessary to establish maximum speed limits, and create speed zones in certain areas, all within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas. WHERAS, the City Council of the City of O'Donnell also finds it necessary to immediate preservation of the public health and safety to provide for the immediate en-

to provide for the immediate en-actment of such measures, constit-uting an emergency. NOW THERE-

ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Speed limits of thirty (30) miles per hour: It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle upon any street, roadway or highway in the City Limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, at a greater rate of speed than Thirty miles per hour except where speed zone signs are erected indicating a higher or lower rate of speed, which case the speed indicated by the speed zone signs shall be the maximum speed permitted. And it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle in excess to the speed limits indicated on any

official speed zone sign, SECTION 2. The speed zones established by the Ordinance shall include all of Loop 76 (9th street and Doak Street) within the Corporate Limits of O'Donnell, Texas; the maximum legal speed limits shall

Beginning at the west limit near the south end of Loop 76 the maximum legal limit for both eastbound westbound traffic shall be '30 m.p.h along said Loop 76 for a distance of 0.789 miles to 5th Street; thence 40 m.p.h for a distance of 0.318 miles to the north city limit.

And all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of F. M. 2370 within the Corporate Limits of O'Donnell, Texas; the maximum legal speed limit shall be as follows:

Cotton Showers ---

A gentle "cotton shower" Monday afternoon netted 1-10in. of rain here and registered 8-10ths in the Draw area and half inch in Wells area with fall lighter to the south. Cotton and feed are growing off normally and there is a good possiblity that the crop will be above average. Weather continues to be ideal for plant growth but is also ideal for insect growth.

Cotton chopping is picking up with about 50 Nationals here and domestic labor coming in daily. Business has increased greatly.

Shorter Work Days

Texas farmers and ranchers had an average workday of 10 hours, 6 minutes on June 1, according to the S. Deuartment of Agriculture. That's a half-hour less than the average for farmers in all states of the nation, more than two hours less than the Wisconsin farm work-day, but a full hour more than Nevada and Florida farmers put

This was brought out in the farm labor report issued by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, based on reports from federal-state Crop Reporting Service offices in each

The national average was 10.6 hours Wisconsin led with 12.2 hours, while Nevada and Florida were lowest with 7.1 hours. Colorado farmers averaged 11.2 hours Kansas, 10.9; New Mexico, 11.7 Oklahoma, 10.2; Texas, 10.1; Ar-kansas, 9.8; and Louisiana, 9.3

Farm operators in the nation averaged about an hour more each day than their hired hands. Seasonal length of the farm

workday has changed very little in this area during the last three years, although a slowness in the crop season was evident in some locations when the June 1 survey was made. The June 1 average for Texas in 1950 was 11.6 hours. In the war year of 1943, it was 12.8 to hours

have little effect on the amount of tim the farm operator works, even when he can't be in the fields The number of seasonal hired lorkers is more sharply influenced by weather conditions, but the worklength for regular hired help is more consistent, even in undesirable weather.

Anyone who has a pond or tank on his land should observe, and en-force, the following safety precautions. These measures could save a lot of grief, reminds the Safety Council.

Post safety instructions for boating, swimming and Skating, Mark safe swimming areas Place lifesaving devices such as ring buoys, ropes and long poles

around swimming areas.

Do not allow anyone who cannot swim into the water Know accepted methods of artificial respiration. Fence pond so that children cannot play around pond without su-

Make sure that an adult supervises all recreation around pond.

Insects Continue Light

EVANGELIST

Rainfall during July, which ranged from six to near fifteen inches, has caused some shedding of forms in many fields of cotton. weather conditions have delayed cultivation as well as the application of insectcides i nareas where insect infestations were sufficient to re quire control.

Thrips have ceased to be a prob e min counties reporting, since all reports were of light populations ex-cept Mason County, which had medinfestations of cotton in some

Fleahopper infestations increased increased in many fields in some lo calities, with rather heavy hatching following the heavy rains. Heav-iest infestations were reported in the eastern half of Lubbock County, Glasscock, Hockly and Lamb counties. Other counties reported light to medium infestations. Populations were heaviest on the earlier planted

Bollworms were reported in light infestations in Collingsworth, Glass cock, Lubbock, Midlan dand Terry counties. In most instances the populations were of recently posited eggs, with occasional fields showing hatching. With favorable weather conditions for activity of this insect, fields should be closely watched for both eggs and damaging numbers of small worms

Boll weevil infestations were reported sufficiently heavy to warrant control in some fields in Fish-

er, Jones and Mason counties.

Cabbage loopers were reported in light infestations in occasional fields. Garden webworms required control, along with grasshoppers, in Hale County. Grasshoppers damaged some small cotton in Graza, Mason and Throckmorton counties.






