60 PERCENT POLIO VICTIMS OF PRESCHOOL AGE

Well over half of Texas' paralytic polio victims last year were less than five years of age, a final tabulation of the 1957 polio incidence shows. The record shows that of the 365 paralytic cases reported last year, 218 were pre-schoolers under five. That figures out to be 60 percent for Texas compared to 45 percent for the nation.

Of the remaining Texas cases, 44 were between ages 5 and 9, 23 in the 10 to 14 age group, 19 from ages 15 to 19 and 61 were over 20.

Clearly revealed is the need of emphasis on immunization of preschool children, while at the same time keeping in mind that everyone up to 40 years of age should take the series of three shots. Parents must take the initiative in seeing that their children are properly immunized.

ACCIDENTS ON INCREASE

23 persons have died in sixteen traffic accidents during January and February in the Texas Highway Patrol District. There were 135 accidents injuring 237 persons plus 263 property damage accidents amounting to \$294,470 damage.

Speed was the number one contributing factor in the 414 accidents investigated.

15 of the accidents occurred in Lynn county with the following breakdown: property damage 8, personal injury 6, and fatal accidents 1. This is a 26 percent increase in accidents over the same period last year.

DEADLINE CAR INSPECTION IS APRIL 15TH

Texas motorists may be lined up for blocks before neighborhood automobile service centers as the April 15th deadline nears for obtaining safety inspection stickers for cars and trucks. Of the half million vehicles in this district only 125,000 have received state inspection stickers. Only a few weeks remain in which to obtain the 1958 stickers. O'Donnell has a number of vehicle inspection stations and motorists can now get quick service.

A zero tolerance for methoxychlor in milk has been set by the Food and Drug Administration. This means, says Extension Entomologist F. M. Fuller, that the pesticide cannot be used as a dip or spray for controlling horn flies on milking dairy cows.

A properly carried out fertilization program for the farm fish pond or tank is also one of the best practices for controlling submerged mosses in the pond, says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. The first application of fertilizer should be made immediately. For detailed information, he suggests a visit with the local county agent.

L-218, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects" (1958) and L-219, "Ways to Fight the Pink Bollworm in Texas" are now available at the offices of local county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station. They were prepared by entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Texas farmers are now using approximately 300,000 tractors and more than 2,500,000 allied farm implements in order to gain the advantages of efficient mechanized farm production. In addition to this investment, W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer, says farmers of Texas spent about \$95,000,000 for petroleum products and \$75,000,000 for farm equipment repairs last year.

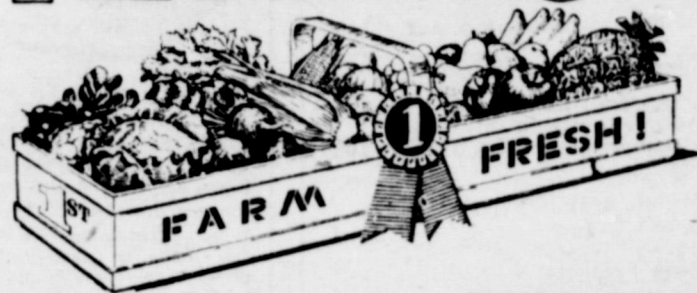
