DUCK DODGES SHOTGUN 16 YEARS, KILLED LAST YEAR

Some ducks are smarter than some duck hunters!

One of the smartest ducks that ever dodged a load of shotgun pellets finally met its fate in the vicinity of St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada.

The computers at the Migratory Bird Populations Center, Laurel, Maryland, have furnished Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife biologists with proof that this duck, a female redhead, had dodged the shotguns of Canadian and United States hunters for sixteen years before being downed last hunting season.

When young waterfowl biologist Cecil Williams leg-banded this duck at the Delta Research Station in Manitoba way back in 1948, World War II had only been over for three years, Harry Truman was in the White House, and manned space flights were only a gleam in the eyes of our scientists.

Now Cecil Williams is the Director of the Bureau's Denver Wildlife Research Center and human beings are taking a stroll through space at a speed of over 17,000 miles per hour.

It's a remarkable world we live in, and this duck's feat of dodging the hunters' guns on its southward migrations each fall for sixteen years has to rank as one of the marvels of the age.

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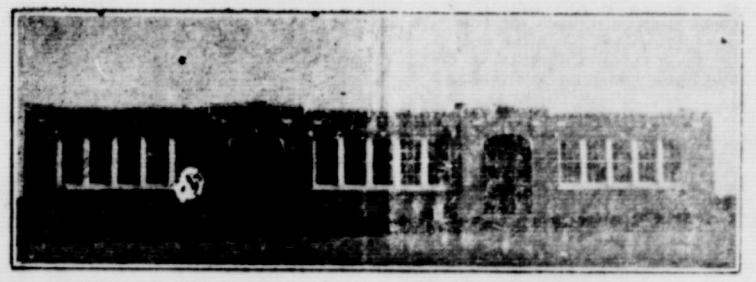

CELEBRATE JULY 4th AT LONGHORN CAVERN

Holiday visitors to the Highland Lakes area may shake off the Fourth of July heat amidst the chill 64 degree weather of Texas Longhorn Cavern, and one of the big drawing cards for this occasion is the Liberty Bell, a strange dome-like depression formed by nature.

PARKING LOT CAR THEFT

Mort Meansell owned a parking lot. It was enclosed by an eight foot fence and had one entrance and one exit. Mort kept at least one attendant on duty at all times to park and watch after his customers' cars. Patrons were requested to leave their keys in the car to enable the attendants to park the cars as well as move them when necessary.

Hotrod Harry parked his car in Mort's lot and was given a claim check. He promptly put it into his pocket without paying any attention to it. Upon the back of the claim check was written "The person accepting this ticket assumes all risk of accident, and expressly agrees that the management shall not be liable, under any circumstances, for any injury to person, loss or damage.

A couple of hours later Harry returned. His car had been stolen. Mort said he was sorry, but pointed to the statement on the back of the claim check. Mort refused to pay for the stolen car. Harry sued him.

Mort probably would have to pay. Most courts have held that a statement on the back of a parking claim check is only effective if called to the car owner's attention. Mort had not done this. Also, Harry had a right to believe from the fact that
