



TEXAS CITIES ARE INCREASING WATER SUPPLIES

State Health Department engineers say water supplies in most Texas cities are in better shape today than they were three years ago, despite continuation of the parching

But they hasten to add that if the dry spell is prolonged it will bring serious hardships. The engineers say reports indicate that the major-ity of public water facilities have been expanded in such amounts as to prevent rationing. Cities facing water bankruptcy in 1953-54 have gotten busy and developed other sources of supply.

AND HE CANNOT SIN

"Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for his seed remaineth in him: and he cannot sin, because he is born of God"

(1 John 3:9.) This passage of Scrip‡ure is often misinterpreted because of a failure to interpret it in the light of other passages; some of which are by the same author. When one's interpretation of a passage of Scripture contradicts the plain teaching of ano‡her passage in the Bible, he may know that his interpretation is wrong. This is a very basic and essential rule of interpretation.

In an effort to prove the false doc4rine of the impossibility of apostasy, better known as "once saved always saved," many denominational preachers wrest such passages as I John 3:9. To nominational preachers wrest such passages as 1 John 3:9. To support their theory, these preachers insist that I John 3:9 teaches that it is impossible for a "born again mam" to sin at all. For example: Some preachers teach that only the "inward man" is born again, and that after this birth the "heart" or "inward man" cannot sin; and they mean by that that it is IMPOSSIBLE for him to sin. They teach that only the outward man can sin after the new birth. The Bible does not teach this, however. The Bible teaches that man is a twofold being, but it does not teach that only the inward man is born again, and that after the new birth all sins are inward man is born again, and that after the new birth all sins are committed by the outward man, Paul said, "Therefore, if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature" (2 Cor, 5:17.) Paul did not say, "Therefore if the inward man be in Christ he is a new creature;" He "If any MAN," and a man is both inward and outward man; both are in Christ, and both are born again. Jesus said. "Except a man be born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God (John 3:5.) This man, or this ONE (R V), includes all of a man, inward man and outward man. If it does not, then the inward man would be in the kingdom, or church, and the outward man would be out of Christ, or out of his kingdom, hence a child of the devil. If this were true, the inward man would have to employ a child of the devil to do everything he would do for the Lord. Such but shows how utterly ridiculous and absurd such a doctrine is, and yet millions profess to believe i.
