## Lynxgar Extensions Cover Six Counties

Extensions of Lynxgar Rural Electric Co-operative lines are still in the formative stage, but extensions are practically assured in Borden, Dawson, Lynn, Garza, Terry, and Hockley counties that will increase the distribution system from the approved 330 miles to 500 miles of lines.

Garland Pennington, manager of the Co-operatives, states that 100 miles of new lines in Dawson county are already almost assured, a 12 mile extension in Borden county has been signed up and only a few signers, lacking to run the lines into Gail, the county seat, where 30 customers have signed for service.

About 15 miles of extensions are expected in Lynn, 10 or 12 in Garza, 6 or 7 in Terry, and at least 25 in Hockley.

The original project called for 330 miles, and workmen are still busy stringing lines on this project. As soon as Project A is completed, work is expected to start on Project B, the extensions.

Power was turned into the lines at Meadow 100, two weeks ago, and about 250 customers are now receiving electric energy over 120 miles of line.

This week general offices of Lynxgar were moved to the Larkin building on the southwest corner of the square, which has been remodeled, redecorated, and is being fully furnished for business.

The building occupied is 25x80 feet in size, contains display space, office space for secretaries, manager and engineer. On the balcony will be offices for the engineering department, and the rear, lower floor will be used for storage of supplies.

When complete, Lynxgar will be one of the most extensive co-operatives in the state.

## GENERAL RAINS BENEFIT SOUTH PLAINS CROPS

Slow, gentle rains which fell over most of West Texas Thursday night and Friday were of untold benefit to cotton and grain crops. From one to two inches rainfall were reported in our immediate territory. While cotton had not begun to suffer greatly, much of the grain was beginning to show effects of the spotted rains which seem to have been the order of the season this year.

## Funeral Rites Held For Accident Victim

Funeral rites were conducted from the First Baptist Church here Monday afternoon for Herman Eaker, who was instantly killed shortly before noon Sunday when he fell from a platform at the Brownfield plant of the Arizona Chemical Company. Rev. J. A. Lunsford, pastor of the church, was assisted by Rev. J. H. Crawford of the Methodist church. Incompleteness under the direction of Brownfield Funeral Home.

## Neck Broken

Mr. Eaker, who had been employed by the company for more than a year, was engaged in his duties Sunday, with no other employe near him. A stifled cry followed by the sound of a heavy fall attracted attention to him, and when assistance reached the scene, he lay unconscious on the floor at the foot of a platform some five feet in height. It was first supposed that he had been killed by falling in contact with an exposed electric wire, but the autopsy revealed that his neck had been broken by the fall.

Company officials who were in the plant at the time immediately called medical aid, and to them fell the melancholy duty of taking the news to the family.

## First Death in Family

This tragedy was the first death in the Eaker family of fourteen children, all of whom are grown and have families of their own, a fact which was mentioned Monday by Rev. Lunsford in his message of consolation.

Mr. Eaker was born at Brady February 27, 1908. While still a child he made a profession of faith and throughout the remainder of his life had followed the path of a Christian.

## 3 New Teachers Are Need in O'Donnell

### SCHOLASTIC ROLL LARGER

At a special meeting of the Board of Education of the local public schools Monday evening, it was definitely decided to add three more teachers to the faculty, which will bring the number of faculty members up to nineteen. This was made necessary by the great number of transfers from other districts.

Two of these teachers will be in high school, in the commercial and home economics departments. The third will be necessary for grade school.

The home economics department has been inactive for some five years, but all equipment and quarters have been kept in excellent condition pending time when the board felt that the district could again afford it.

### Scholastic Roll Increased

With transfers recorded as of August 1st, total number of students for the coming term will probably reach the 500 mark, 496 already having been reported. This is the largest enrollment in a number of years, according to records in the office of the secretary, Miss Beverly Wells.

### To Have Negro School

For the first time in the history of the town, O'Donnell will have a negro school this year. The negro church building will be repaired and otherwise put in shape suitable for a school, and a teacher will be employed in the immediate future. Thirty-six children have already been enrolled for this school, and the number may possibly be greater by the time school opens.

### Buildings Repaired

During the summer months considerable repair and remodeling work has been done on buildings and grounds. Desks have been refinished, walls repainted, and other improvements made on the interior of the two buildings.

## JOE EAKER UNDERGOES APPENDICETOMY MONDAY

As funeral arrangements were being completed for his brother, Herman, Joe Eaker was undergoing an operation for the removal of his appendix Monday morning. He was taken to a Lubbock hospital Sunday morning just a few hours before his brother was instantly killed in a fall at the Cyanamide plant at Brownfield.

The one ray of light in the clouds which surrounded the family Sunday was the birth of a daughter to Mr. and Mrs. John Eaker, another brother and sister-in-law.

Last reports received from the hospital are that Mr. Eaker is doing as well as could be expected.

## ROAD JOBS GET THEIR FINAL APPROVAL

Final approval of two paving projects on U. S. Highway 380 in Lynn county, east of Taboka, was given the first of the week.

Contracts were let on the two jobs a few days ago, and the WPA has passed on the application for aid. On the \$23 miles of paving, federal funds will be furnished in the sum of \$16,696, and the state will furnish \$58,497.

The project calls for the use of 148 workers.

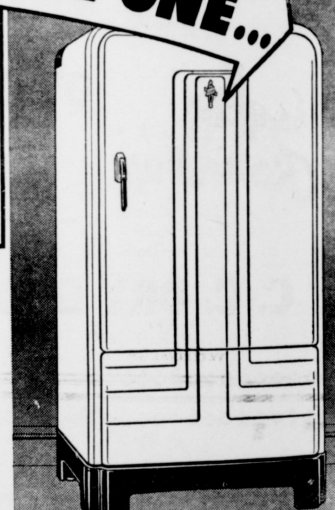

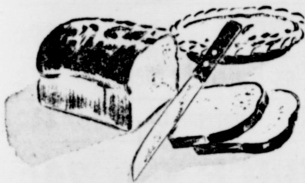
