This is the second of a series of questions that the people of Texas are asking. Orville S. Carpenter, state pension director, answers them frankly and to the point:

Q. How many people are there in Texas past the age of 65 years?

A. Over 300,000.

Q. Definitely, if Texas gave each one of these \$30 a month, would the Federal government pay half of it?

A. No.

Q. If each of the 300,000 received assistance, where would the money come from to pay the bill?

A. It could come only from the taxpayers of Texas.

Q. Could we pay everyone past 65 years of age \$30 per month if we desired and were willing to do so without the millions that the Federal government will contribute?

A. No, we could not because the Old Age Assistance Amendment to the Texas Constitution provides for payments not to exceed \$15 per month per person.

Q. The \$15 per month would be all that we could pay if we gave everyone past 65 years of age assistance without the help of the Federal government?

A. Yes.

**Funds of Texas
Relief Commission
To Be Curtailed**

Operation of the Texas Relief Commission's state wide program for the care of unemployables will end with the receipt of checks for the second half of June.

This definitely means that beginning with July 1st there will be left within each county a group of people who will have no means of sustaining themselves, that is, those persons who are ineligible for old age assistance. These will constitute a responsibility which will have to be assumed by the community, its welfare organizations, or other sources of local aid.

Added to the first group may be persons who, though employable, are, for one reason or another, out of work. Certification of employables to the Works Progress Administration was discontinued early in May. Since that time the only relief available to employable persons has been through application to local agencies. With the

coming of July and the discontinuance of checks to unemployables who have been carried on the rolls of the Texas Relief Commission, they too will have no recourse but to ask assistance of the communities in which they reside.

motion from Mr. Johnson's attorneys was granted without discussion or delay in district court at Big Spring Tuesday of this week after a jury had remained deadlocked for more than forty eight hours. This was the fifth trial for the officer on this charge. The first three were held in this district, and when the third resulted in a hung jury, the state asked for a change of venue, and it was transferred to Big Spring. Two trials there also resulted in hung juries.

Thus closes one of the most expensive and most long-drawn-out trials in the annals of West Texas justice, with the result that the yearling that started the whole affair may be considered the most expensive beef known to man.

Local Schools Receive Additional Funds

Working through G. D. Holbrook, district state supervisor of schools, the board of education of the O'Donnell Public Schools has been able to secure additional state funds and will thus be able to close out the 1935 school term by paying the teachers in full.

This announcement was made Tuesday morning by T. J. Yandell, president of the board, after a communication from Mr. Holbrook. The plan whereby this additional \$941 has been obtained was laid before the board when Mr. Holbrook was here Wednesday of last week, and was definitely accepted on Friday. The funds will be received immediately, Mr. Yandell stated.

This additional money has been allowed over and above the outstanding still unpaid taxes for the year 1935, already collected. As most of our readers are aware, the state board of education ruled last year that in order to maintain affiliation, a certain salary schedule must be maintained, this schedule being somewhat higher in every department than the local board could meet. However, this problem was solved by issuing separate warrants for the difference between the state schedule and the local schedule. These warrants being issued against the uncollected taxes the L & M funds for 1935, that amount being approxi-
