Music to be presented will be by the three numbers that will play for the interscholastic competition April 26th in Brownfield. In addition the band will play several other numbers.

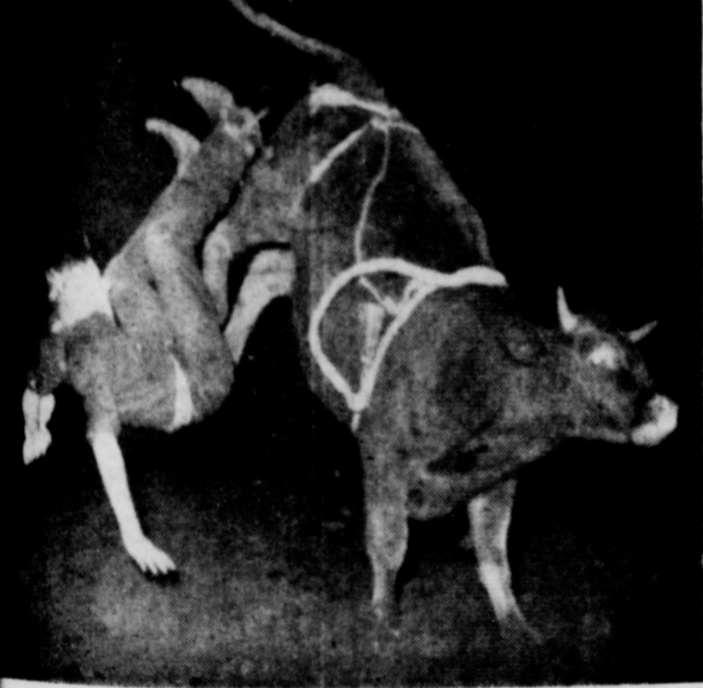
There will be no charge for admission and the band would like to see the auditorium filled for this concert of the school year.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

How does the Governor react to recent scandals in state government?

He thinks there will be more shocks and disappointments on the part of all Texans before the current "cleanup activities" are finished.

He has publicly warned the state that more is coming but did not give any idea about what to look for in the way of new scandals.

"There will be some convictions and punishments meted out when some of these cases reach court," he said.

The Governor's recommendations for progress and good government include:

1. A lobby registration law
2. A code of conduct for state officials, legislators and employees
3. A law requiring registration of all persons who practice for pay before state agencies.
4. A complete reorganization of the Texas Insurance Commission.
5. Establishment of a State Law Enforcement Commission.

There are other recommendations, including establishment of a paid parole and probation system; revision of narcotics law; expansion of the Youth Development Council in an effort to curb juvenile delinquency.

The Governor's attitude toward recent scandals seems to indicate there's going to be more house cleaning. But he also points out that of the 46,000 persons on the state payroll, scandal or the hint of dishonesty has touched only a few.

All around the capitol a new desire seems to be growing. Legislators and employees alike are seeking ways to help restore the public's confidence in state government and some think that Governor's proposals may offer the answer.

FACTS GIVEN ON DIABETES

Austin — Various educated guesses as to the number of "undiscovered" diabetics in the nation place the figure somewhere between one and two million. Undoubtedly a fair proportion of them are Texans.

Diabetes is a general systemic disease in which the body loses its ability to burn and store sugar normally. All starches in foods are converted in the stomach and intestines into sugar. As sugar they are absorbed into the blood and pass thru the liver into general circulation to all parts of the body.

Normally the gland called the pancreas produces a secretion called insulin which is also poured into the blood. In the presence of insulin the sugar of the blood is burned, especially by muscular activity. Any excess of sugar in the presence of a normal amount of insulin is temporarily stored, mostly in the liver, and released as needed into the blood. This is the normal pattern. But in a person suffering with diabetes the pancreas fails to produce sufficient insulin. And when starches are eaten and absorbed as sugar, the body is unable to control the sugar normally by storing it in the liver or to burn it efficiently in muscle exercise. Result: the sugar content of the blood increases to abnormal levels.

Because the diabetic is unable to burn the sugar efficiently for energy he becomes weak and tired. His body needs nourishment and he therefore develops great hunger. But because he cannot utilize the starches, he uses up his own tissues and continues to lose weight.

When the blood sugar gets too high, the kidneys, in an effort to lower it, remove some of the sugar by excreting it in urine. This, in turn makes the body dry and creates a thirst.

Proof of the hereditary nature of diabetes is the fact that surveys of diabetic children show that 80 percent of families in which there is or has been diabetes. Also 20 fat persons develop the disease for every thin one who does.
