Infestations of most of the cotton insects did not increase to a marked degree over those of a week ago.
While some increases were reported
only scattered plantings required
control measures in most localities.
Aphids continued to damage late
planted cotton n some fields although infestations were generally reported lighter than during the

previous week. Fleahoppers were present in all fields and were reported in heavy infestations in some plantings in Hale, Hockley, and Howard Coun-

Hale, Hockley, and Howard Counties. Heaviest populations were generally found on older cotton.

Bollworms were reported in somewhat larger numbers than a week ago. The worms were present in light infestations in a majority of the fields. Light to medium infestations were reported in Cochran, Bailey, Dawson, Lynn, Mitchell, Scurry, and Yoakum Counties, Light populations were reported elsewhere. Since boiltworm moths generally prefer tenreported elsewhere. Since boll-worm moths generally prefer ten-der growth for egg laying, cotton which has been recently irrigated (cont. on back page)

In addition one baby suffocated from a plastic bib, and just the other day a fifth 1959 victim died -- suf-

focated by a crib sheet.

Already the total has almost equalled last year's toll. Plastic bags have an important and useful place in modern life. IF they are used correctly.

FOOT INJURIES IN SUMMER

-0-Summertime is barefoot time! Think back Mom and Dad to the summers when you dragged your feet through the dust, let mud ooze up between your toes, or if you were a city dweller, maybe you

splashed in the gutters after a light But along with this great childhood pleasure of going barefoot goes a danger of possibly contracting

tetanus -- but not necessarily! Lockjaw, or tetanus, cases jump in summertime because exposure in the form of cuts, or puncture wounds are more frequent in warm

when people are out-ofdoors. The germs of lockjaw are com found in soil --- especially manured soil. They enter through a break in the skin and emit a readly toxin which cause jaw and

neck muscles to contract so severely that jaws involuntarily close. vice-like. Slowly the muscle contraction spreads to other body muscles, until the victim is bent like a bow.

Lockjaw germs are spore-formers which means they can live years outside an animal body. Its life processes lie dormant in a tiny seed-like pod, sifting about on the ground until finally, perhaps through a nail puncture, it gets back into live tissue. back into live tissue.


