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 Act of March 3, 1897.



Governor Moody vetoed that item of the general appropriation bill which sought to remunerate farmers in the "regulated cotton zones" for expenses incurred in fumigating and sterilizing their cotton and seed in compliance with the quarantine regulations imposed by the State. A number of West Texas counties, including our neighboring counties of Dawson, Howard, Martin and Midland, were included in this "regulated zone." The occasion for the quarantine was the alleged finding of a few dead pink-boll worms in this area. A great hullabaloo was raised by State and Federal departments of agriculture immediately after the discovery of the worms. Their warnings of danger were a lurid and vociferous as if an invading army were about to enter the State. Some of us dared to say that all this hue and cry was utterly foolishness. Farmers and business men protested vehemently, for they felt that a grave injustice was about to be done. The threat to declare a "non-cotton zone" was modified to the extent that only a "regulated zone" was fixed, within which all the cotton and seed were to be fumigated and sterilized; and to satisfy the people of this section, members and attaches of the State and Federal department of agriculture assured the people that they would be remunerated in due time for all expenses incurred. The people submitted and observed the regulations to the letter and in due time, in the only way open to them, they put in their claims for expenses. The legislature allowed a lump sum of \$150,000 to pay these expenses, but the Governor's blue pencil struck the item out on the grounds that

such an appropriation would be unconstitutional. It may be technically right. We are not attempting to pass on that phase of the matter. But it is not morally right for the State to require the farmers to incur these expenses, under a promise that they would be remunerated, and then refuse to pay off. Governor Moody has cooked his goose with these West Texas farmers who believe that the only way to be honest is to be honest.—Lynn County News.

small grain drill, or may be broadcast and then covered by use of a fine-tooth onecrow cultivator, harrow or other scarifier. Seeding should be thick, at the rate of about 90 pounds per acre, if grazing is desired.

When the crop is to be saved for grain or hay as well, it is advisable, Mr. Miller states, to spray out or bar- ley seed with a formaldehyde solution at the rate of one pint of for- maldehyde to ten gallons of water to prevent smut. This amount will be enough to treat 40 bushels of seed. After spraying, the seed should be shoveled over two or three times, placed in a pile and covered with a wagon sheet for several hours. It may be sowed without further drying.

What smut is controlled by the copper carbonate treatment. The seed is laced in a tight container so ar- ranged that it can be revolved on an axis. From two or three ounces of powdered copper carbonate should be sprinkled on every bushel of seed and thoroughly mixed by revolving the container.

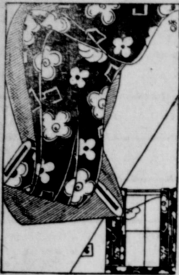
