## Business Men's Club Entertains Boy Scout Executives

The Business Mens Luncheon Club had the honor of entertaining the chief executives of the South Plains Scout Area Tuesday night when they met in annual session to elect officers for the coming year. An elaborate banquet was spread before the visitors in the Everett building and for an hour previous to the business session, the time was given to feasting and making merry.

The meeting opened with a pep song by the luncheon club members followed by prayer by Rev. Eldridge of Tahoka. S. O'Neal of Lamesa, presided as toastmaster. Mayor Kibbe in his usual hospitable manner gave an address of welcome to the visitors and turned over the keys of the city to them. Prof. Woodward of Lubbock responded and in his address threw many bouquets at the citizenship of O'Donnell, among other things saying the town was known all over the country as being one of the most progressive of all the South Plains towns. Frank White of Lubbock spoke on the merits of Boy Scout work. A poem by Edgar E. Guest, that had been placed at each plate, was read by Mr. White. L. S. Harkey of Lubbock, gave a report of the work accomplished during 1925 and outlined the plans for this year. A financial report was made by Treasurer F. A. Norman of Lubbock. Scout Executive Palmer announced the plans for 1926 and spoke of the good work accomplished since the organization of the South Plains Area.

## South Plains Country Covered With Blanket of Snow

The first real snow storm of the winter was ushered in Wednesday night at about 10 o'clock with thunder and lightning. The beautiful white continued to fall until Thursday noon, the precipitation amounting to around three inches in town, while more was reported in some of the country districts.

It is thought by the farmers that when the snow melts there will be sufficient moisture in the ground to commence breaking land for another crop. The snow was of the "wet" variety and is going into the ground as it melts.

Prospects for more snow or rain are good and the farmers are hopeful of 1926 being a good crop year. It has been raining east of the Cap Rock and heavy snows are reported from the New Mexico country to the west and the gap between remains only to be closed with a big bunch of sky juice when conditions will be ripe for spring plowing and planting.

## O'Donnell to Have City Hall

O'Donnell is to have a real city hall. This was decided at a meeting of the city council held Monday night. Architect Mrs. A. A. House has completed the plans and the matter of asking for bids from contractors is now under way.

The building will be of stucco and will be built on the Mission style of architecture and will be two-stories in height. The Fire fighting equipment and sleeping quarters for the firemen will be on the ground floor in front, the jail in the rear and the court room and mayor's office will be up stairs.

A large flag pole will be placed above the building and the electric siren will also be placed on the roof. At the front of the second story the words, "O'Donnell City Hall" will stand out in bold relief and an arch over the entrance to the fire department will bear the inscription "O'Donnell Fire Department."

The building will be on the site of the present city jail and the work of construction will be under way within ten days.

## Proper Care of Poultry Will Net Large Profits

The poultry industry in Texas is increasing rapidly, both in magnitude and value. However it is too often looked upon as being unprofitable, and therefore is a very much neglected phase of farming. Despite the fact, poultry raising is fast proving itself a reliable source of income; and quite naturally the interest develops as the value of the poultry industry increases.

Our first impulse, under present conditions, is to sell our poultry, thinking only of high priced feed and the ready market for all kinds of poultry. We forget or fail to consider the egg market of thirty to fifty cents per dozen, and that a two pound fryer is the cheapest meat raised on the farm. Where is the profit in selling young poultry and buying beef, mutton or pork?

If your poultry yard is overstocked sell off the old birds keep your pullets for fall and winter laying.

Among the most frequently asked questions is, "What shall I feed my hens to make them lay?" This is a very pertinent question, and its solution plays an important part in profitable poultry raising.

We are peculiarly blessed in this section of the country with conditions that are conducive to the growth of grain sorghums, which is an excellent poultry feed, when properly balanced with protein feeds. Practically all the required feeds can be produced on our farms. If there is but one grain to be fed some of the grain sorghums, either whole or ground, can be safely and profitably substituted for corn, which stands at the top as poultry food. Wheat bran, cotton seed meal, and oats are excellent dry or mash feeds. If green sprouted oats, wheat or barley, turnips or piemellons is very satisfactory, if maximum profits are obtained. The keeping of a flock of poultry on each farm should receive encouragement, and should be carefully considered by each farmer. There should be an exact record kept of all feed fed and returns obtained before it is concluded that poultry is unprofitable.

Mrs. H. E. Spinks, who lives on

R. F. D. No. 1, out of Lamesa submits the following as a part of the farm income during 1925.

From 100 white Leghorn hens she realized \$231.18, not considering the value of eggs and chickens used for her own table. From two Jersey cows she realized \$207.60, a total of \$438.78, a sufficient sum with which to buy both groceries and dry goods for the year.

Mrs. Spinks keeps an accurate record of all receipts from both her cows and poultry, this is practical practice that should be carried out on every farm.

For the past four or five years the good price paid for cotton, the good yields and the high prices of feed has diverted our attention from the "Safety First" in our farming program. The farmers who are spending one hour in the morning and the same time in the afternoon, before and after field hours caring for the cow, sow or hen are in reality living under their own "Vine and Fig Tree." He exchanges dairy and poultry products for groceries, takes his surplus and pays cash for dry goods, hardware, etc. With this program he cannot raise so many bales of cotton but will have his meat and feed besides from a cash income through the year: The farmer who plants all cotton and harvests it for low prices generally decides that all feed next year should pay but too frequently is again disappointed at harvest time. He is generally in the predicament of the old colored man who ran in a "zig-zag" course when being shot at by his pursuing enemy, after being painfully wounded decided that he must have zigged when he should have zagged.

The time spent in the proper care of the cow, sow or hen will declare dividend surprisingly large.

Before going too far with our 1926 program let us consider the keeping of a full record of feed fed and eggs produced, then it will not be necessary to guess as to whether it is profitable to keep poultry or not, we will be in a position to KNOW.

**BANKERS HELP**

Minnesota bankers played a constructive part in boosting the attendance at the Northwest Dairy Exposition held in connection with the State Fair in September. Five hundred members of the Minnesota Bankers Association received letters from the chairman of the agricultural committee, asking them to assist in forming delegations from their respective communities to attend the show.

The Atlanta, Ga., Clearing House gives the boll weevil no rest. In an effort to effect a concerted and statewide poison war on the boll weevil, this institution sent letters recently to all the bankers in the state asking that they assist in emphasizing the need for a wholesale war on the pest. According to a recent survey poisoning is being done on the larger farms, but not to any appreciable extent on the small farms. According to reports by the Department of Agriculture, the boll weevil infestation is heavier this year than ever before, and if allowed to go unchallenged the crop will be destroyed. Immediate and extensive action is urged.

Over two hundred bankers in Iowa recently made an arrangement to attend the Iowa State University for a two-day period and study farming and farm problems. The bankers will sit as students under the professors in the agricultural department, and will dig right down to the bottom of the many subjects which are of mutual concern to themselves and the farmers. This action on the part of the bankers of Iowa shows a real spirit of interest and a determined intention to understand.

Clark County (S. D.) Bankers, have appointed an agricultural committee of five to aid the county agent in putting across the latter's program of work, with especial emphasis on a ten-acre corn contest and eradication of tuberculosis in the county.

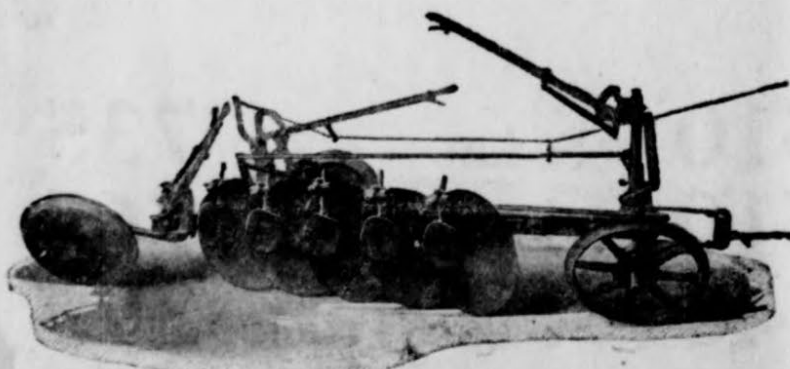

## FORD INCREASES DESPITE MANY CHANGES

The Ford Motor Company, in all its divisions, produced a total of 2,103,588 cars, trucks, tractors and airplanes during 1925, according to figures just given out at the general offices of the Ford Motor Company. Exclusive of airplanes, which is a new industry with the company, this is an increase of 20,033 automotive units over 1924.

In the production of Ford cars and trucks during the year, domestic plants in the United States assembled 1,775,245. Foreign plants of the company produced 136,461 cars and trucks and the output of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Ltd., totalled 79,298. Fordson tractor production was 104,168 and the Lincoln division of the company produced during the year a total of 8,415 Lincoln cars. In the newest division of the company, the airplane factory, the output was ten all-metal planes since the factory was acquired by the Company on August 1, 1925.

The remarkable output of Ford cars and trucks was reached in spite of the fact that for a period of more than thirty days during August and September domestic production was almost negligible due to the introduction of improved types. The same conditions prevailed in the foreign assembly plants as the change to the improved cars were made in these places, some of which are just now getting into appreciable production with the improved types.

The said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of O'Donnell, Texas and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to wit:

J. M. Christopher, Presiding officer

W. R. Sanderson,  
J. E. Mayo, Judges.  
M. K. Sheppard, Clerk.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns, and only qualified voters, who are property tax-payers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"For the Issuance of Bonds."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Bonds."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, attested by the City Secretary of the said city shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall and at one public place in each of the voting places of the City of O'Donnell for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, to-wit, the O'Donnell Index, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.
