### X-Ray Unit Will Visit O'Donnell

Mrs. Lillian McCord, nurse of O'Donnell school, has encouraged citizens of O'Donnell in an all out campaign against tuberculosis. TB went down hill for a while but is definitely on the upswing again, according to Mrs. McCord.

Civic organizations in O'Donnell are joining hands to bring the mobile unit for X-rays to the city November 3. O'Donnell Young Homemakers have volunteered to help at the mobile unit all that day as a community service.

The Lions Club is the sponsoring organization and is assisted by the Rotary Club, O'Donnell Young Farmers, O'Donnell Young Homemakers, Entre Nous Study Club, 1929 Study Club, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and ministers of the different churches in the advertising campaign.

Mrs. McCord urges all farmers to encourage their Latin laborers to come and be X-rayed November 3. Tuberculosis can be cured and it can be treated at home with pills. People no longer have to be taken away from their homes and families to be cured of TB.

O'Donnell Young Homemakers asks all to remember November 3 and everyone over 12 come have their X-ray. Donations of at least \$1 will be greatly appreciated from those who can afford it since civic organizations have had to guarantee \$200 to the Tuberculosis Association to get the mobile unit to come here.

O'Donnell Ladies Work At TB Center

Three members of the O'Donnell Young Homemakers gave 12 member-hours Friday, October 21, to the West Texas Tuberculosis Association Christmas Seal campaign.

The O'Donnell Young Homemakers worked at WTTA headquarters, 916 Avenue N in Lubbock. The Christmas seals they prepared for mailing will be distributed in the 23-county WTTA area and contribute to the voluntary worldwide effort to eradicate tuberculosis and fight other chest diseases, particularly emphysema, asthma and bronchitis.

Registration Now

No longer will Texas citizens pay poll taxes as a qualification for voting in national, state, or local elections.

But, all citizens eligible must now register between October 1, 1966, and no later than January 31, 1967, in order to vote in any election during the coming year.

Registration is free and may be done by mail on securing a prescribed form at the office of the County Tax Assessor and Collector, George McCracken. Registrant must sign his name to the blank, together with necessary information as to age, residence, etc.

Other qualifications for voting remain the same as under the old poll tax system. A voter must have lived in the state at least one year, in the county at least six months.

In Lynn county, a county not having a city of 10,000 or more people, overage citizens do not have to register. This means a person over 60 years of age on January 1, 1965, does not have to register to vote next year.

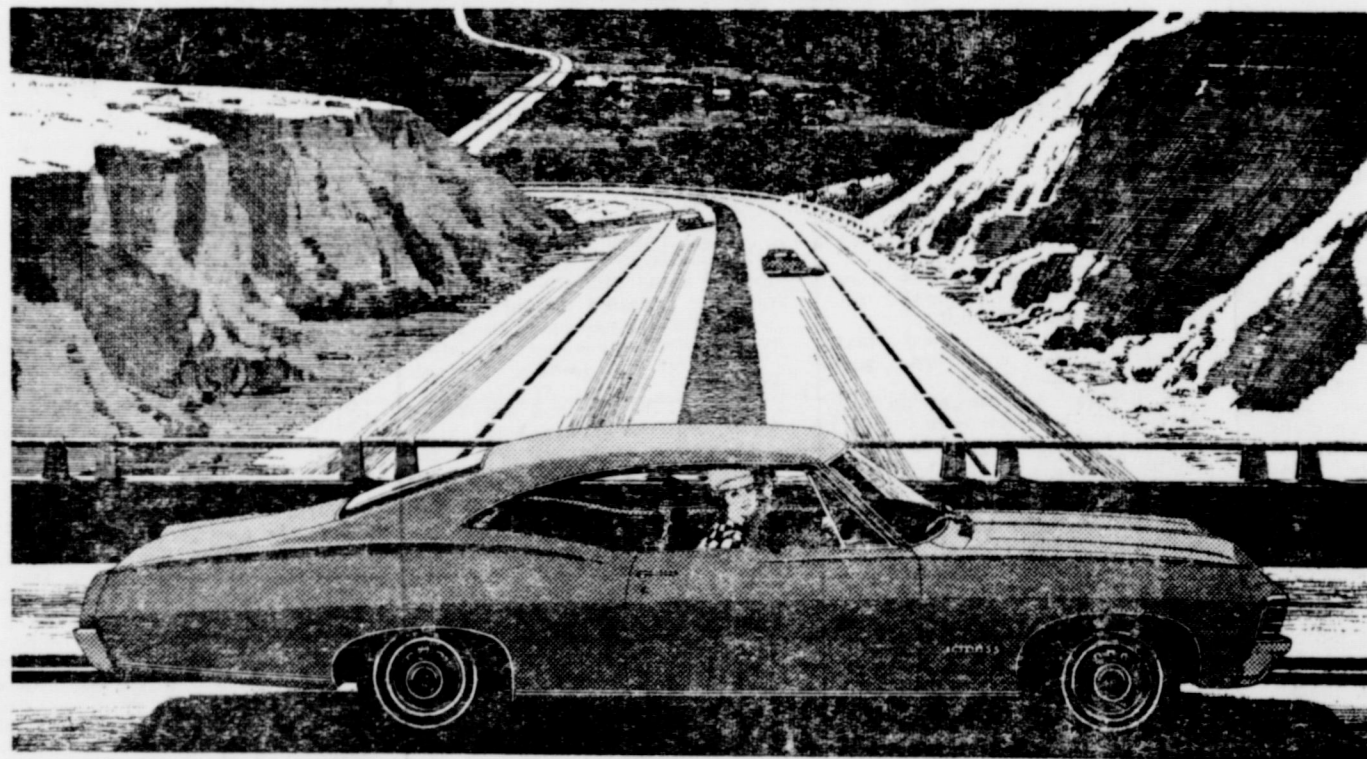

### O'Donnell Ladies Work At TB Center

Three members of the O'Donnell Young Homemakers gave 12 member-hours Friday, October 21, to the West Texas Tuberculosis Association Christmas Seal campaign.

The O'Donnell Young Homemakers worked at WTTA headquarters, 916 Avenue N in Lubbock. The Christmas seals they prepared for mailing will be distributed in the 23-county WTTA area and contribute to the voluntary worldwide effort to eradicate tuberculosis and fight other chest diseases, particularly emphysema, asthma and bronchitis.

### Registration Now

No longer will Texas citizens pay poll taxes as a qualification for voting in national, state, or local elections.

But, all citizens eligible must now register between October 1, 1966, and no later than January 31, 1967, in order to vote in any election during the coming year.

Registration is free and may be done by mail on securing a prescribed form at the office of the County Tax Assessor and Collector, George McCracken. Registrant must sign his name to the blank, together with necessary information as to age, residence, etc.

Other qualifications for voting remain the same as under the old poll tax system. A voter must have lived in the state at least one year, in the county at least six months.

In Lynn county, a county not having a city of 10,000 or more people, overage citizens do not have to register. This means a person over 60 years of age on January 1, 1965, does not have to

register to vote next year.

Mr. McCracken suggests that citizens register to vote when they begin paying property taxes during the coming year.
