Public Warned Against Spread of Typhoid

The doctors claim that there is not an epidemic of typhoid in town at this time but that there are a few cases and advises the public to use every possible precaution to prevent the spread of this disease. It is not necessary to have typhoid fever and if the people would cooperate with the medical profession the disease would be wiped out of the United States.

Typhoid germs enter the body in nearly every instance through water, milk or uncooked food which has been contaminated by flies, dirty hands or by direct contact with drainage from filthy places. These facts about typhoid have been conclusively demonstrated, yet we continue to have the disease and every year many precious lives are lost that could have been saved.

Mayor McDaniel, who is a retired member of the medical profession, saw the danger confronting the people more than a month ago and issued a proclamation designating a clean-up day and since has issued warnings to the public of the danger of allowing filth to accumulate affording breeding places for flies, and advised the use disinfectants freely. Some have complied but others have paid no attention to the order and flies are still breeding by the thousands.

In order to educate the people to the fact that the fly does spread not only typhoid but tuberculosis, cholera, summer complaints and other intestinal diseases as well, a free stereopticon lecture will be given at the State Theatre Saturday at 2 p. m., using slides sent here by the State Health Department. It will be to the advantage of every person in the community to attend this lecture.

The Board of Trustees of the O'Donnell Independent School District held a meeting Saturday and elected a principal and high school teacher for the coming term which filled the vacancies existing. Following is the personnel of the faculty:

This gives the school an exceptionally strong faculty and the school is destined to continue on the up-grade and soon take its rank as one of the best on the Southplains.

Plans are being formulated by the board for the construction of another building to take care of the increased attendance promised for the coming term. At this time it is not known the character or size of building contemplated but they will be made public soon. The last school census showed above 600 pupils in the district, but a steady stream of people have been pouring in and it is likely that the school will open with above 700.

Bricks Under Construction

Work on the excavation for the foundation of the Lynn County Motor Company's two story brick on the corner of Doak and Ninth streets was started Monday morning. The material for the building is rapidly being placed on the ground and as soon as the foundation sets, work on the walls will start. The building will have a frontage of 52 feet on Ninth Street and extend back 100 feet on Doak street and will have the largest floor space of any building in town.

The foundation for the Carlisle building on Doak street in Block A has been laid and as soon as the bricklayers arrive, work on the walls will start. It is planned to have the building ready for occupancy by the first of September.

The Sanderson building is receiving the finishing touches this week and will be ready for occupancy in a few days. H. G. McCarroll will occupy the store room facing Doak street, Joe Sikes and W. D. Guye will occupy the rooms facing the north on Eighth street with their grocery and dry goods business, and the northwest corner will be occupied by the Sanderson brothers with their filling station and accessory store.

The brick for the construction of J. W. Brinson's building is being placed on the ground, the foundation having already been laid. It is not known what character of business will be conducted in this building when completed.

R. P. Boyd Passes Away

The suffering of R. P. Boyd ended Sunday at 3:25, when he passed into the great beyond. Mr. Boyd had not been in good health for several months and came here a short time ago from his home at Panhandle with the hope that the change would be beneficial and to visit with his son, B. J. Boyd and family. For a time he seemed to improve and often visited the Corner Drug Store of which his son is the manager. A little more than a week ago Mr. Boyd suffered a stroke of paralysis. For a few days his life was despaired of, but he rallied and partially regained the use of his limbs, but his condition became worse Saturday and Sunday peacefully breathed his last.

The body was prepared for burial by the Rix Undertaking company of Lamesa and Monday was taken to Big Spring and shipped to Boyd, Texas, the place where deceased was born, and interred Tuesday.

At the time of his death, Mr. Boyd was 59 years of age and had lived in West Texas about eight years. Besides a widow, deceased leaves five children, four sons and one daughter, to mourn his passing. The sons, are, B. J. Boyd of this place, W. S. and George Boyd of Panhandle and A. J. Boyd of Amarillo, and Miss Ala Ruth Boyd of Panhandle, all of whom were present at the death of their father. On another page will be found the order by the city council calling for an election to be held August 5th to vote bonds to the amount of \$90,000, \$65,000 of which is for a water supply system and \$25,000 for drainage of the town.

According to a contract, the Devlin Engineering Company of Amarillo, will have supervision of the work, provided the bond issues carry. In return for the services the engineering company is to be recompensed two and a half per cent of the total amount of money expended for the improvements for preparing the plans, specifications and estimates, and \$200 per month for supervision during the time of construction, the total cost to the city not to exceed the amount equal to five per cent of the total amount expended. In case the bond issue should be defeated, then the city will pay the engineering company the sum of \$1 for the services already rendered.

It is possible that the contemplated improvements will cost much less than the amount called for in the election order.

Rising Young Star Fond of Cooking

Claiborne Foster, that clever little lady who makes Barry Connors' play, "Applesauce," the outstanding comedy success of the year, is an extraordinary young woman. She is generally recognized as one of the rising young stars of the American stage and her services and company are always in demand but such is her nature that she shuns the "bright lights" and leads a simple and unostentatious life wherever she may be. She is essentially a home girl, being passionately fond of cooking, an art at which she is very adept, and much of her leisure time is spent in the modest little kitchenette of her apartment. When not playing in some production, Miss Foster may be found at her home a short distance from New York city, where she revels in the joys of cooking for the whole family and her friends and spends her vacations doing the work of the ordinary housewife.

There are two dishes which are regarded with more favor by Miss Foster, than are any others. These are Bronk shrimps and chicken en casserole. She uses the simplest of formulas but insists upon the purest of ingredients, using pure butter, and evaporated milk. The recipes that she uses are:

Bronk Shrimps.
2 cups shrimps, Tails 2 eggs
canned or fresh 1/2 cup evaporated
4 tbsp. fat milk
1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 cup water
Few grains cay- 1 tbsp. flour
enne 2 tsp. lemon juice
Clean the shrimps, and cook in half the fat for 2 minutes; add seasoning and lemon; cook 2 minutes longer. Remove shrimps and make a white sauce of the remaining fat, flour and milk; when thickened add yolks of eggs slightly beaten, stirring in quickly and cooking two minutes; add the shrimps.

Chicken en Casserole.
1 tender chicken 1 cup evaporated
for roasting milk
2 tbsp. butter 1 tbsp. chopped
2 tbsp. lard parsley
Salt and pepper 2 cups chopped
1 pint hot water mushrooms
Clean chicken, split down back, and lay breast upward in casserole. Spread fat over breast, dust with salt and pepper, add hot water, cover closely and cook in hot oven one hour. When nearly tender put in evaporated milk, mushrooms and parsley. Cover again, and cook 20 minutes longer. Serve hot in casserole.

Notice of Election

"ELECTION ORDER"

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 5th day of August, 1925, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the city of O'Donnell, Texas, in the sum of \$25,000.00, payable \$3,000 in 11 years, \$3,000 in sixteen years, \$3,000 in 21 years, \$4,000 in 26 years, \$4,000 in 31 years, \$4,000 in 36 years, \$4,000 in 40 years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of Six (6 per cent) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, as authorized by the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas with reference to Cities and Towns.

The said election shall be held at The City Hall in the City of O'Donnell, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:—

- A. B. Fortner, Presiding officer.
- W. R. Sanderson
- C. M. Cox, Judges.
- Sam Pfrimmer,
- T. C. Brown, Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the Levy of Tax Therefor."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of O'Donnell, attested by the City Secretary of the said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of O'Donnell for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City, to-wit, The O'Donnell Index, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

**Trainer of Boxers
Gives Diet Hints**

To Kid Howard of Chicago and his new system of training and conditioning. Sammy Mandell, the present lightweight boxing champion of the world, gives a great deal of the credit for his meteoric rise to stardom in the world of pugilism. When Mandell first started fighting, he was small, weak and undeveloped, but after turning himself over to Howard it was only a short time before he took the decision from Sid Terris of New York that resulted in him being recognized as the boss of the lightweights.

Howard's system is unique in that it works no hardship on the athlete who is in training. Unlike the systems that have been used for years, this prominent and successful trainer of men makes conditioning more of a pleasure than a distasteful necessity. Instead of demanding that his men eat only certain things he advises them to eat what they want and when they want it as long as it is cooked in a proper manner. Mr. Howard, in a recent interview on the subject of diet and condition, said, in part: "Years ago it was a task, and an unpleasant one, for a boxer or a wrestler to train for a bout because he was forced to literally starve himself unless he wanted to eat steaks and chops at all times. I remember that when I was training for a match, I was so truly tired of steaks that I choked every time that I ate one but it was steak or nothing. I advise my men to diet at all times but it is perfectly possible for them to diet and, at the same time, to enjoy their food. My only 'don't' is the one regarding the eating of such combinations as fresh milk and cheese, and fruit with cream. In fact, I advocate the use of evaporated milk entirely. Vegetables are fine and the more that the athlete eats the better he will be for it. Pastry, of certain kinds, such as homemade pies, cakes and cookies, if made correctly, and with pure butter, evaporated milk and pure lard, are very beneficial. Stews and boils are ideal. Taken as a whole, any food, with a few exceptions, is all right if properly cooked and eaten without gorging."

And one has but to look at Howard, who is the most religious user of his own system, to realize that it is a success.

Those who desire to transfer their children from one school district to another must do so before the first of August, as no transfers will be made after that date. Where transfers are not made, tuition will be charged.

Heretofore some children have been sent to the O'Donnell school when the per capita money appropriated to pay their tuition remained in another district on account of not complying with the law in regard to transfers. If you intend to send your children to a school other than in the district in which they were enumerated, see the county superintendent at once and have them transferred.

Notice of Election "ELECTION ORDER"

WHEREAS: The city Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 5th day of August, 1925, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, in the sum of \$65,000.00, payable \$7,000 in 11 years, \$5,000 in 16 years, \$7,000 in 21 years; \$8,000 in 26 years, \$12,000 in 31 years; \$17,000 in 36 years; \$9,000 in 40 years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of Six (6 per cent) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing a Waterworks System in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, as authorized by the Constitution and general Laws of the State of Texas with reference to cities and towns.

The said election shall be held at The City Hall in the City of O'Donnell and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:—

- A. B. Fortner, Presiding Officer.
- W. R. Sanderson,
- C. M. Cox, Judges.
- Sam Pfrimmer,
- T. C. Brown, Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Waterworks Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Waterworks Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of O'Donnell, attested by the City Secretary of the said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of O'Donnell, for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, to-wit, The O'Donnell Index, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 26 ounces
Seven feedings in twenty-four hours, 4 to 5 ounces at three-hour intervals during the day and four-hour intervals at night.
- From Third Month to Fifth Month.**
Milk, evaporated 7 1/2 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 29 1/2 ounces
Six feedings in twenty-four hours, 5 to 6 ounces at three-hour intervals during the day and a feeding at 10 p. m.
- From Fifth to Seventh Month.**
Milk, evaporated 10 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 29 ounces
Five feedings in twenty-four hours, 6 to 7 ounces at four-hour intervals, the last feeding to be given at 10 p. m.
- From Seventh to Ninth Month.**
Milk, evaporated 11 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 35 ounces
7 to 9 ounces at four-hour intervals during the day. Last feeding at ten at night.
- From Ninth to Twelfth Month.**
Milk, evaporated 12 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Barley water 34 ounces
8 to 9 ounces at four-hour intervals during day. Last feeding at ten at night.

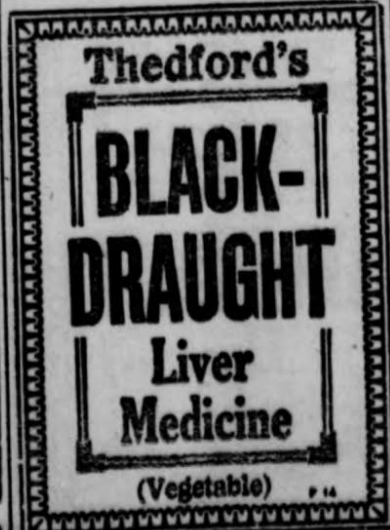
