## Army Worms In Grain Sorghum

Armyworms are reported to be attacking grain sorghum in several counties in the High Plains, according to Extension entomologist Don Rummel, of Lubbock.

Rummel says he has received reports of armyworm infestations in Bailey, Hale, Lubbock and Floyd Counties. In some cases armyworm populations are so large that they are completely stripping the leaves from the leaves from the grain sorghum.

A number of insecticides are available to control the worms he said, but at this stage of the season it is important that producers select only those labeled for use shortly before harvest.

The entomologist says recommendations for armyworm control in grain sorghum are the same as those listed for sorghum webworm and corn earworm control in the Texas Guide for Con-

trolling Insects on Grain and For County agents have the Extenage Crops. ion Service publication and can give further information on armyworm control, Rummel said.

## **Cotton Acreage** Is Close To 120,000

O'Donnell, Texas Index Presss

Lynn county possibly has less than 120,000 acres in cotton this year, based on figures from the local ASCS office.

Base cotton acreage for 1966 is about 176,000 acres. Farmers have bought about 12,000 acres in other counties for transfer to Lynn county farms, but this has been reduced to about 7,000 acres on a poundage production basis comparison.

But, in complying with the new Federal farm program, most farmers have taken the 35 percent reduction option, leaving about 119,000 acres eligible for planting.
