Sports Park Tax Discussed

The House Business and Industry Committee discussed a proposal that would allow a city, county or group of counties to put a resolution before local voters to acquire, build or renovate a sports venue with specific taxes.

The state comptroller would review such resolutions to ensure they would not cost the state money.

Committee chairman Kim Brimer, R-Arlington, worked to defeat a a plan that would improve the hansimilar bill in the 1995 legislative session that would have allowed tax dollars to be used for professional sports facilities.

"Since I killed it, I thought I ought to come back and try to clean it up and see if I can do something with it," Brimer told the Associated Press.

Brimer called the 1995 bill "corporate welfare" and said sports facilities are regional projects and should be financed regionally, the AP reported.

The new proposal includes local taxing options that would raise sales and use taxes 0.5 percent, car rental taxes up to 5 percent, admission taxes up to \$2 per person, parking tax up to \$1 per vehicle and hotel occupancy tax up to 2 percent of the room price.

Brimer said the sports facility proposal is opposed by car rental companies and the Texas Hotel & Motel Association.

needs. If you're too polite to hang up, ask for a prospectus that you can study at your leisure. That at least will sort out the crooks from the legitimate salespeple.

Putting tax-exempt investments inside your 401 (k) or IRA. The big advantage of these retirement vehicles is that the earnings grow tax-deferred. So it's a waste to invest the funds in tax-exempt instruments such as municipal bonds. If you do, you're giving up a higher return for a tax advantage you can't use. Instead, invest in higher-yielding taxable investments, since the earnings inside your plan are tax-deferred anyway.

Chasing tax shelters. An obession with minimizing taxes can often lead to poor investment decisions. Tax-exempt investments may have a place in your portfolio, but often it makes financial sense to choose a taxable investment and pay tax on the earnings. Never buy an investment just because it's tax-exempt.

Taking premature distributions from your IRA. Taking money from your IRA before age 59 1/2 should be the last thing you do. If you do, you'll generally pay a 10% penalty tax plus the normal tax on the amount you withdraw. Make sure you've exhausted every other possibility before you tap into your IRA savings.

Psalm 31:9, 10 (My eye wastes away . with grief,

Yes my soul and my body! For my life is spent with grief, And my years with sighing; My strength fails because of my iniquity, And my bones waste away.)

David laments, "My life is spent with grief." For those of us who have contended with crippling dependencies. such lamentation is necessary if we are to fully surrender our broken lives to God.

Although we may associate brokenness, or or powerlessness, with defeat, in reality this admission is the first building block toward lasting victory over all of our addictions and dependencies. A paradox of our recovery is that we must give up to in order to win.

Usually the admission of powerlessness cannot be achieved unless we have first assessed the magnitude and gravity of our addiction has cost us. We may want to compile a list of the losses that have resulted from the practice of our dependencies. These losses may include such things as diminished vocational achievement, impaired intimacy in our most important relationships, and seven of ruptured spiritual relationship. with God.

Only as we appreci-

Psalm 38:1-9 David is called "the man after God's own heart" (see 1 Sam. 13:14, Acts 13:22). We would think that such a person would have a life of peace and serenity. Yet Psalm 38 shows us that David experienced periods in his life when he had to go back to Square One. In this psalm, he mourns over how unmanage-

able his life has become. He has strayed from allowing God to control his life; and because of this, he admits he has become foolish (v.5) and crushed by his

own behavior (v.4). David realizes his behavior has caused him great physical and emotional pain. He declares in verse 8, "I am feeble and severely broken." Neverthless, surrender to God does not come easily, for he still experiences groaning "because of the turmoil

of [his] heart"(v.8). An ironic aspect of addiction is that letting go of the things that cause us misery is extremely difficult. But

TEETH ARE TOUGH...BUT...

Teeth are tough! Did you know that • the outside layer of teeth (the enamel) is the second hardest naturally occur- ring substance. Only diamond is harder. That's one reason why more human teeth are found as prehistoric relics . than any other part of the body.

It seems paradoxical that such a · fabulously hard substance should be such easy prey to decay. It's amazing · how teeth can decay in short order from contact with sugar and its eventual · change into enamel-cating acid.

enamel and the dentin underneath it expand and contract at different rates as they react to temperature changes. Tooth enamel is not damaged by hot liquids, but if something cold is consumed immediately afterward, the enamel contracts and could crack. Hot . drinks are usually about 140 degrees Fahrenheit, ice cream is about 35 degrees. That much sudden change can be harmful to teeth.
