FARMING A REAL LIFE-SAVER TO HIM

he now has 900 hens that netted him \$1125 above feed cost and living expense to the first of October this year. According to L. L. Johnson, county agent, Mr. Hafford has grown into the business, re-investing his profits in better houses and equipment. He grinds his own feed, builds his own chicken houses, and keeps them painted. He markets everything locally except breeding stock and eggs.

CASHING IN ON CIRCLE BULL

Marlin—A \$350 registered Jersey bull has returned \$2000 to the West-halla community in Falls county in his first year of service there, according to D. T. Simmons of the Texas Jersey Cattle Club. He says that half brothers of this bull have increased the production of daughters over ordinary dams from 100 to 125 pounds of butterfat yearly, and Anton Fuchs keeper of the bull for the local bull circle, states that 79 cows were bred to this bull the first year. At present milk prices each daughter will add from \$50 to \$60 to the community production and 40 such heifers will bring the total up to \$200 or more.

GARDENING BEATS BANKING WHEN IT COMES TO EATING

Corsicana.—The number of farm gardens in Navarro county more than doubled in 1929 over 1928 if the record of home demonstration club members is indicative of the entire situation. In a summary just issued by Miss Mattie Wilroy, home agent it is shown that 236 women raised gardens this year as compared to 103 a year ago. The number of different varieties grown increased from an average of 11 in 1928 to 26 varieties the past season.

The economy of a garden is strikingly revealed in a comparison between the cost of vegetables to Mrs. W. A. Dobbins, farm woman who won the spring garden show, and a banker's wife who purchased her garden stuff. The latter averaged 1 1-2 varieties of vegetables daily in May, at a cost of 44 cents for family of five, while Mrs. Dobbins had twice as many varieties at a cost of 44 cents for family of five. The same ratio held throughout the entire season. Mrs. Dobbins kept daily garden records showing that her garden of one-fourth acre size was worth \$101.15 to her.

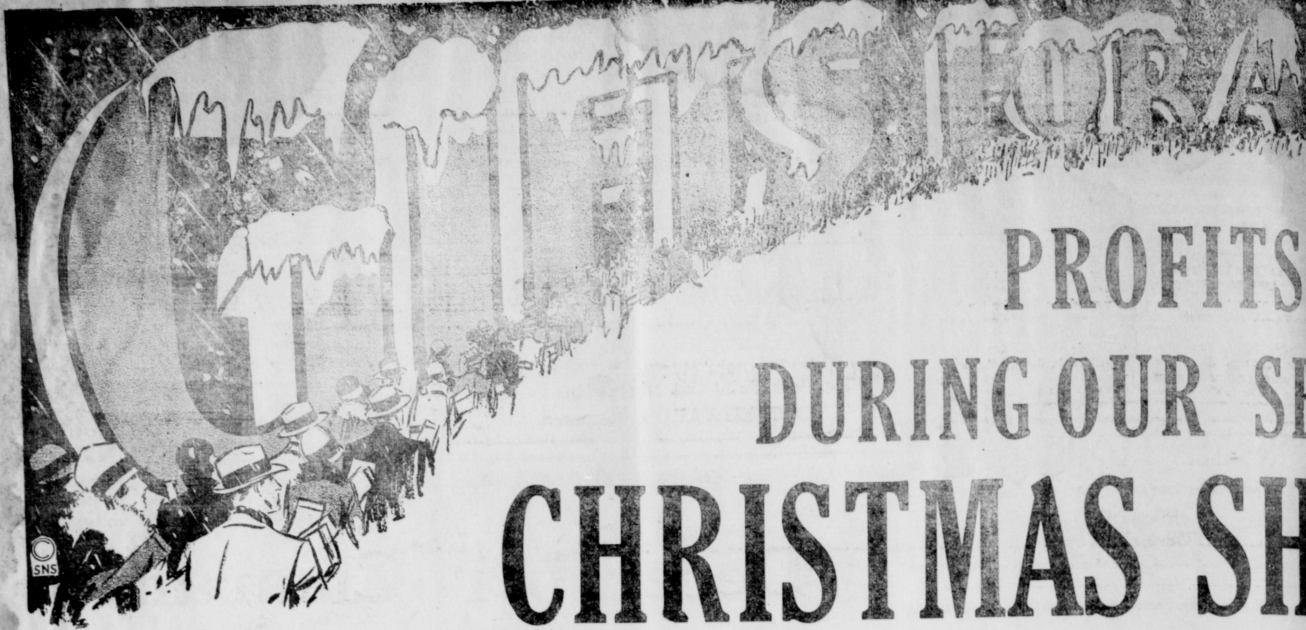

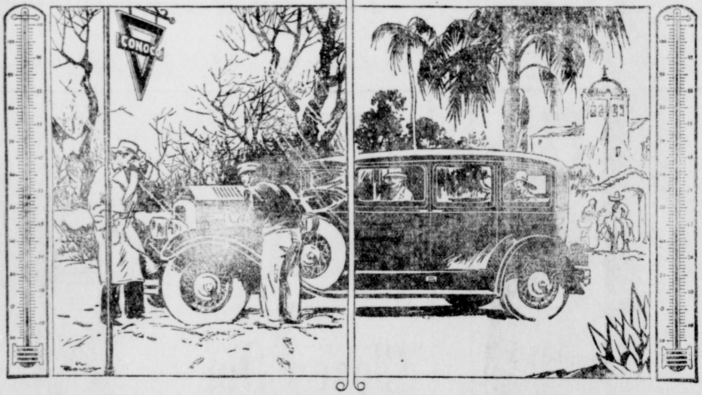

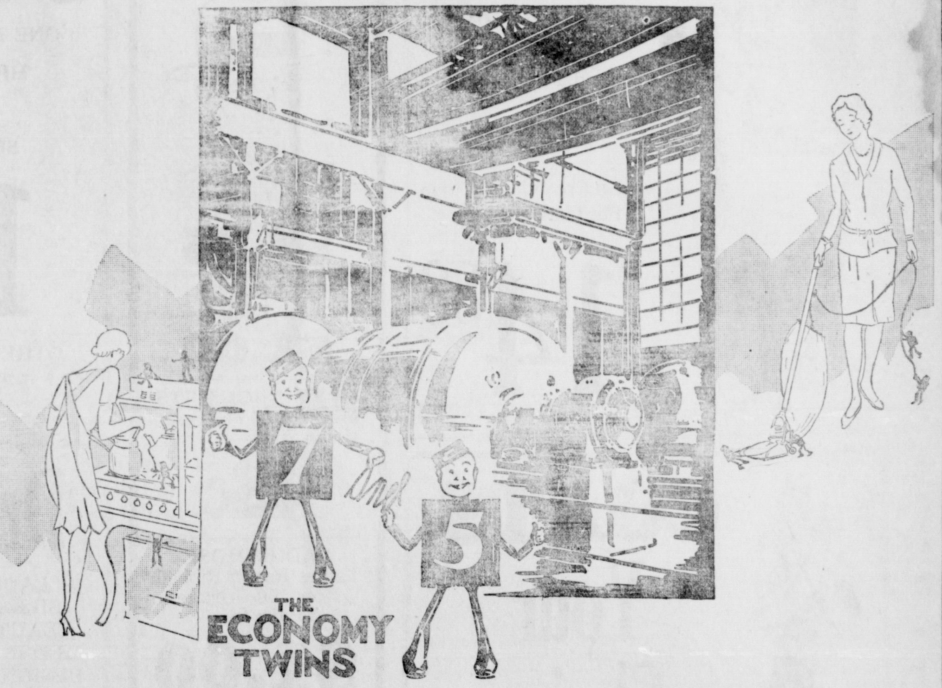
