

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Vinegar in the water used to boil or poach eggs will keep the eggs firm. Also, in the case of an aluminum pot, the vinegar will help to prevent the pot from turning color.

Light, high, fluffy omelettes can be managed if you beat the whites and the yolks separately. Mix them together just before you put the eggs in the skillet, and the large amount of air in the mixture will bring about the desired result.

If you have trouble getting the shell to separate from hard-boiled eggs, run cold water over the eggs as soon as you take them out of the boiling water.

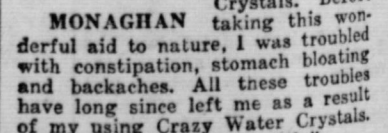

Broken Cables On Sea Bottom Quarry of Ship

NEW YORK — Chasing down breaks in telephone and telegraph cable, at times as much as three miles below the surface of the sea, is the job of the steamship All America which pulled in to New York recently for supplies.

Capt. Frederick Hack, the skipper, reports all kinds of things can happen when the ship is looking for a break.

One time, for instance, they sighted a big sperm whale thrashing on the surface, with three turns of weighty cable coiled around his body.

"He apparently had been feeding along the bottom at 400 fathoms and run into our cable," Capt. Hack said. "A whale can't reverse and he kept pushing ahead and finally choked himself and drowned."

Locates Break

Communication stations detect a mishap to the cable and start a series of intricate electrical tests to determine whether it is a break or a flaw. They run down its location with uncanny accuracy.

Then the All America heads for the spot and usually hits it within a half mile. The ship then begins a series of right angle dragging runs with various types of grapples.

"Sometimes it's pretty deep," the captain said. "The deepest I've worked is about three miles. You can rarely pull it up without a break as you'd be lifting cable for 20 miles along the line. It breaks 90 per cent of the time."

The repair experts pay out cable at four to six knots, pick it up, or drag at a mile an hour with the almost rigid wire rope by using a series of "sheaves" which are really heavy pulleys strung in tandem along the foredeck. A six foot drum hauls or pays out the lines which style. In a storm, work ceases after the broken ends are attached to buoys.

Capt. Hack said that "you never know when a cable will go." Some lines lie on the bottom for 50 to 60 years without needing attention, while others develop repair needs a month after laying, due to damage or flaws.

Carries Miles of Cable

Corrosion, teredos that bore like sea going termites, chafing, imperfect manufacture—all are contributing causes.

The ship carries red leaded marker buoys, 20 miles of wire rope of 18 ton strength, miles of heavy armored cable of three dimensions for different water depths, and a wide assortment of grapples.

Under the main deck are wells into which the cable is coiled—300 miles of it when the vessel is fully loaded.

Marine Warrant Officer Wins Annual Pistol Meet

QUANTICO, Va.—Mark W. Billings, marine warrant officer, recently set a national record in the .45 caliber national match course during the annual pistol tourney held at Harrisburg, Pa.

Billings scored a 295 out of a possible 300 without scoring any out of the nine ring to take the record established by Major Harry Reeves, a Detroit policeman. Reeves allowed two hits in the eight ring in his firing for the record.

In addition to the record, Billings took first in the .38 caliber timed fire with a possible 200 and the .22 caliber rapid fire match. He also took second place in the .38 caliber aggregate, scoring 856.

Billings is the present holder of the Lauchheimer trophy that is annually fired for in all-Marine Corps rifle and pistol competition. The trophy goes to the marine who fires the highest aggregate score of rifle and pistol.

Americans Neglect Their Teeth, Survey Reveals

PRINCETON, N. J.—Americans are neglecting their teeth, a national survey has revealed.

According to the survey almost one adult in every two, or more than 45 million people, have not been to a dentist within the past two years, and some 30 million of these have not been in over four years.

And believe it or not, about 4,000,000 of these adults have never been to the dentist, the survey reports.

As for going to a medical doctor, 28 per cent of adults, or about 28,000,000 people, have not done that in the past two years. The survey showed a higher proportion of women than of men visiting a doctor or dentist within recent months.

A higher proportion of men than of women have stayed away from doctors for four years or more.

Cab Driver Rewarded \$1 For Returning \$1,000

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn.—Honesty may be its own reward—so believes James Young, a cab driver.

Young found a purse containing more than \$1,000 a woman passenger left in the back seat of his cab.

How reward?

One dollar, less the sixty cents it cost him to drive out to return the purse.

Market Is Glutted — 80-Room Castles For Sale Cheap

BRAUBACH, Germany—Have you ever dreamed of living in a castle? Well, if you have, there are several thousand for sale—and most of them cheaper than a suburban cottage.

In fact, some of the tax-harried owners of German castles would gladly give them away if they had somewhere else to live.

Many owners have been hanging out the "Castle for Sale" signs for a long time. It's tough, owning an 80-room stone house and not being able to support it.

There are 10,000 castles in East and West Germany. Of these, 6,000 are uninhabited ruins. About 2,000 of the remainder are residences while the rest are partly ruined. Most of the "residence castles" are in the Western zones.

Fritz Ebbardt, president of the association for the conservation of German castles, owns one. Perched on a steep hill, it was built in 990 A. D. and its present occupants refer to a portion added in 1701 as "the new wing."

Ebbardt said his association now advises castle owners on ways they might follow to keep their homes. "We advise them on insurance and things of that nature. But we need money to save them."

He explained this doesn't mean that when taxes go into arrears that a state takes over the castle. The administrations are too canny. They know that saddling themselves with a castle can be financially embarrassing.

There have been recent cases, however, where ancient furnishings have been claimed by the state in lieu of taxes.

Ebbardt says descendants of old German families often prefer to live in poverty in their ancestral castles rather than walk out. Some, not so proud, have turned parts of their castles into inns or hotels. This has not always been a success because of the general inconvenience of bedding down with history in a pile of stone.

Ebbardt wishes Americans of German descent would take interest in helping to preserve the castles. The West German Republic has not.

He points out that the Nazi regime first took over all the castles, but speedily found out they were a losing proposition to maintain.

"They handed them back in a hurry," he says.

Young Mother Testifies Of Selling Baby for \$100

NEW YORK—A young Brooklyn mother testified in a baby "black market" trial that she sold her baby for \$100 to a lawyer who in turn offered it to a childless wife.

The wife testified that the lawyer offered her the child for \$2,000. When she said she could not afford that price, he marked the infant down to \$1,750—which she said she and her husband paid.

The two women testified in the trial of a woman and two lawyers accused of operating the black market. The court ordered that none of the witnesses' names be disclosed.

Richmond Woman Develops New Way to Shoo Flies

WASHINGTON—Whether by accident or not, Mrs. C. S. Gilbert of Richmond, Va., has developed a new way to shoo flies. And the department of agriculture is very interested.

One day Mrs. Gilbert called in a man to fix the hot water heater and mentioned something about her battle with the flies. The man said not to worry about a thing, just put a few wads of cotton on the screen door and all would be well.

Mrs. Gilbert finally did stick a wad of cotton on the back and front door. The flies disappeared.

Word got around. Pretty soon every cottage in town was packed with cotton dotted screens.

Scientists came to Mrs. Gilbert's door and they found no flies. But they were unable to explain it.

An aide in the department of agriculture said maybe: (1) The flies may think cotton is their dreaded enemy, the moth; (2) The flies think the cotton in the screen doors is a spider web.

Science Develops Plastic Eye That Matches Real Ones

SOUTHBRIDGE, Mass.—Science has developed artificial eyes made to grow old in appearance at the same rate as real eyes they match.

The eye really stays young ever in old age, except when a white ring forms around the iris, the colored part of the eye. The ring is deposits of fat. It usually starts in two crescent moon shaped things, one below and the other above the iris. The crescents expand into a ring.

The new plastic eyes are formed so that they can be used either for the rings of age or of youth. To age a plastic eye it is removed and repigmented by hand in the places which need change. The eye is specially designed for this job.

Pleasing Colors in Kitchen Help Brighten Woman's Daily Work

DID YOU KNOW that the ten busiest years of a homemaker's life are spent in the kitchen? Minute by minute, hour by hour, that is the accumulation of time needed over the years for the tasks of preparing food, cooking, baking and washing dishes.

Is it any wonder, then, that women try to keep their kitchens bright and attractive? Modern equipment lightens many of the chores, but whether the time spent on unending work is pleasant or not, depends to a great extent on one factor. That is color.

Colors of the kitchen walls, the light reflected from the ceiling, the surface of drainboards and counters and flooring materials, all these play a subtle but definite part in your outlook and in family relations.

Fortunately, color is one of the most inexpensive of all components of the kitchen. Colors that please and stimulate cost no more than drab and cheerless ones. It depends entirely on you and not your pocket-book, whether your kitchen is a success colorwise.

You can add color and cheer to the kitchen in many ways. There are not only paint and wallpaper, but floor coverings, curtain materials, utensils, but counter tops, drainboards and accessories. A kitchen, coordinated in color by all of these, is bound to be pleasing and joyful in which to work.

There's so much available in a colorful way, that you can actually choose a favorite color scheme in place of the few which were once popular. Thoughtful and intelligent

selection will give you much satisfaction and will improve your disposition as well as your influence on family life.

Apply Basic Principles To Kitchen Decoration

Follow a few simple rules when selecting colors for the kitchen. For example, the various shades of yellow and red are stimulating and spirit lifting. If you tend to get in the doldrums, you might try using one or the other of these with some other color.

Light hues reflect more color than dark ones and thereby tend to make work easier. The use of a few colors rather than many prevents a feeling of "busy-ness," especially if your kitchen is small. Colors which contrast too greatly will break up a room and are to be avoided. Plan the color to create a balance, just as you plan furniture arrangements.

The simplest plan to use in selecting a color scheme for the kitchen is to use a favorite shade as a basic one and combine it with which are present. Yellow-orange, yellow-brown, yellow-green and green-yellow are harmonious because they all contain yellow. In the same way, red-brown, red-orange and watermelon shades harmonize.



as well as hobbies.

One of the nicest ways of choosing a color scheme for the kitchen is to use the complexion as a clue. Blondes look most attractive in a setting of peach, soft blue, green or yellow. Brunettes appear best against background of tan, brown, yellows on the orange side and blue greens.

The kitchen ceiling should be a hue with good light reflecting qualities, but that does not necessarily mean white. In fact, white is usually too strong a contrast with other hues in the color scheme, so it's best to plan to mix a little of the wall color with white ceiling and wall together.

If your kitchen is primarily white, then use clear colors with it. Intense colors such as orange, pure green or violet should be avoided as they will soon prove irritating.

Select Materials Which Will Last

Since the kitchen gets such great use, it's wise to invest in quality materials which will not fade or be

injured by acids and grease. Walls, of course, will have to be refinished if they are painted or papered, but you can select colors which will show less dirt and grease than others. Papers, too, are specially finished for longer use.

Drainboards and counter tops should be durable. You might investigate clay tile as a possibility since this kind of material comes in many different colors and these are baked in so they cannot be damaged by sunlight, water or grease.

Areas which are subject to spotting and staining need to be carefully finished so they do not become too worn while the rest of the kitchen remains in good condition. The space behind the range and the splashback over the sink need careful finishing. Use a material which can be cleaned with a few seconds work with a damp cloth.

Woodwork and floors strike an important color note in the kitchen, but both are often overlooked or ignored when the room is decorated. If the woodwork is of a good quality with a pleasant grain, it might be kept in a natural finish and a color scheme chosen to set it off properly. Natural wood table and chairs, such as bamboo, are excellent with a watermelon pink color predominating.

If the woodwork is not suitable, paint it the same color as the walls or somewhat lighter.

Light Floors Show Dirt Less than Dark

Kitchen floor coverings are important not only because they can tie the room together, but because they can make your kitchen show less dirt than you might think. If light in hue, the floor covering can make the kitchen cheerful and light-reflecting.

Light colors are a good choice for kitchen floors because they will show dirt less than such colors as dark brown, blue or red. Unglazed clay tiles in a wide range of colors might fit into the scheme, and they are durable as well as easily cleaned.

If the whole home is coordinated as to color, then the kitchen floor would be tied into that color scheme, and the flooring would take its cue from carpeting used in other rooms. Even though not carefully coordinated, it's wise to tie the kitchen together with the dining room or to whatever room it opens, and flooring is a good means by which the tie-in can be worked.

Let Kitchen Reflect Family Interests

Kitchens are popular with families because they can be so cozy. If you have a large family which likes to snack, it might be wise to use one wall or part of that for a snack bar which will also serve for breakfast and quick lunches.

Women who collect interesting platters, pot holders, molds or utensils would do well to place at least some of these on the walls to indicate their interests and lend a personal touch to the room that is so dramatically theirs.

If you collect pieces of copper, pewter or such items, use these around the window in the kitchen. Some containers may lend themselves to potted plants or vines which bring great cheer to the kitchen.

Interest in gardening may be reflected even in the kitchen. You might use decals or paint various vegetables or flowers on cabinet doors for color notes.

Sewing as a hobby can be reflected in the kitchen with interesting curtains. Careful pleating, stitching or intricate ruffles will put the stamp of individuality on them and mark the kitchen as a spot to which you have applied knowledge and personal interest.

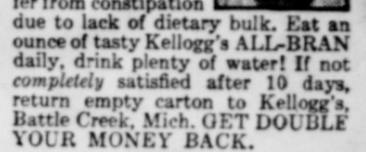

SECTION 2: Said election shall be held under the provisions of and in strict conformity with the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter 1, Title 22, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, and the provisions of the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, and all acts amendatory, complementary and supplemental thereto.

PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE: FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE WATERWORKS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS. AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE WATERWORKS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS.

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO: FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS. AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS.

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of the expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

SECTION 4: That all revenue bonds of the two series hereinabove mentioned are to be ratably secured in such a manner that no one bond shall have priority over the other bonds, it being the intention to provide for the creation of an indebtedness against the City's waterwork and sewer system revenues for the purpose hereinabove stated, and if the bonds set out in both propositions above mentioned are approved by the qualified voters voting at the election hereby ordered, they are to be issued as one series of bonds, to be known as "CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS, WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS," aggregating the principal sum of \$75,000.00, provided, however, that in event one proposition is sustained and the other is not, then the bonds authorized by that proposition shall be issued solely against the revenues of that particular system.

CLEANING VAPORS CAN BE DANGEROUS There's a lot of punch corked up in that little bottle of cleaning solvent out on the back porch. The State Department of Health called them "hazardous, when special precautions are not used." It seems that solvent vapors are heavier than air, which means that they will collect at floor level. The danger of using solvent for such household chores as taking spots off the linoleum or cleaning dirt or grease off the back steps is that you have to get on your knees to do the job. And when you are on your knees you are closer to the accumulation of solvent vapor. The state health officer proved his whole point with this story: A man attempted to remove the grease from the underside of his car by spraying it with a spray gun he had brought home from his construction job. He was found dead under the car, suffocated by the vapor of the cleaning agent. Proper use of the cleaning solvent, says the department, call for opening all the doors and windows when cleaning floors, the underside of household furniture or clothing. The idea is to get as much ventilation as possible. A fan blowing on the working area is helpful. When doing a job of this sort, work for a short time, avoiding inhaling the vapors as much as possible and then get into the fresh air for a minute or two. The first symptoms of vapor poisoning are nausea, dizziness, headache and fatigue. Shell color of eggs does not affect the flavor, the food value or the cooking performance. There is no advantage to the homemaker in paying more for brown or white eggs of the same quality and size. When corn or sorghum grain are fed to hogs, the gain produced is slow and costly but when the grain is supplemented with the correct protein and mineral supplements, the rate of gain is speeded up and the cost of gain is reduced. Grade B eggs are equal in food value to eggs of higher grade and at this season of the year, they are a few cents less per dozen than grade A eggs. Don't neglect summer orchard cultivation because the trees need all of the moisture and plant food that is available, particularly during the late summer.

REDUCTION IN TOOTH CAVITIES POSSIBLE City fathers in 3 Texas cities by artificially adding fluoride salts to their municipal water supplies, are making the dream of fewer tooth cavities come true. Corpus Christi and Marshall have fluoridation systems working now and Austin has one in the installation process. If things go according to plan, children in these towns will be spared easily half the visits they now have to make to their family dentists because they will have fewer cavities. The fluoridation process is a tremendous step forward in the fight against dental diseases. It is simple and inexpensive as well as effective. It won't give children complete protection against tooth decay but it will reduce decay from 23 to 47 percent. The addition of the chemical to drinking water in the ratio of 1 to 1.5 parts per million parts of water now has been recommended by the United States Public Health Service. Thorough cleaning of grain bins is necessary to prevent the infestation of the new crop with insects. Freedom from blood and meat spots in eggs is a factor which is governed mainly by breeding. On the farm grain storage space gives the farmer insurance that his crop can be taken care of and enables him to qualify for government loans. Pullets which retain their ability to produce eggs with a high percent of thick albumen are the ones to keep for breeding purposes. Low moisture content is necessary for long, safe storage of grain, especially of grain sorghum, which should not test over 12 percent. For spraying grain bins for insects before filling them with grain a water suspension of D D T can be prepared by mixing 10 1-2 lbs of 50 percent wettable D D T powder in 25 gallons of water. A government loan requires that grain be stored in bins or granaries where it will not be subject to damage from moisture, insects, rodents or other causes. If poison ivy or poison oak plants are grubbed and burned, avoid the smoke for it carries the toxic volatile oil of the plants and is extremely poisonous.

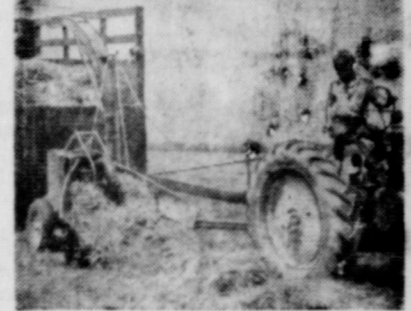

Grassland Farming Is Most Mechanized Farmers Find Meadows Cheapest Feed of All

Grassland farming continues to spread throughout the United States and has become an example of the mechanization of farm jobs. Farmers are switching to more and more grass because they have learned that grass is the cheapest of all feeds and that grass also conserves the soil, increases yields of intertilled crops and is the easiest

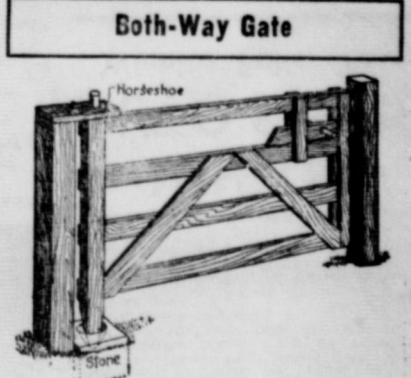


The New Holland field forage harvester can chop up to 15 tons of hay per hour in lengths ranging from 1/4 to 4 inches depending on how many knives are used.

Of all crops to harvest and handle. One of the major reasons grass is cutting dairy production costs as much as 25 percent is the sharp reduction in labor costs. With grassland machinery, today's farmers can make hay and grass silage in half the time it once took them. Since the 1930's, when farmers were urged to cut down on corn and small grain, the grasslands of the nation have increased tremendously. And with the increase manufacturers have produced farm machinery with which to cut, chop, bale and store this low cost farm feed. One of the newer machines in modern farming is the field forage harvester. This power take-off unit can chop up to 15 tons of hay per hour. Attachments let the farmer use the same basic unit for chopping corn at up to 20 tons per hour.

Avoid Fall Milk Drop By Good Management

Most of the drop in milk production in late summer and fall can be prevented by good planning and management. Good permanent pastures, supplemented by temporary pastures of sudan grass or some other hot-weather and drought resistant pasture suited to the land and climate conditions, will mean more milk at less cost. In many cases, failure to avoid the slump in milk production is because dairymen do not recognize that summer and fall pastures are not as nutritious as early, succulent high-protein pastures. Even though summer pastures may look good, it is necessary to feed a limited amount of the well-balanced grain ration if the summer and fall milk production slump is to be avoided. Enough feed in mid and late summer will hold production higher and allow cows to go into the fall and winter months producing well and carrying good flesh.



A convenient both-way gate does not require any hinges or any hardware material at all. It can be made any height or length desired. Have a 2x4 at each end which extends up about two inches higher than the gatepost and far enough below to go into a hole in stone at the foot of the gatepost. Nail a board at top of gatepost with a two-inch hole in it for the 2x4. On the other side have a hole one inch wide and three inches long chiseled in the post at the other side.

Pyreneone Is Effective Control of Horse Flies

Horse flies are troublesome pests during the hot months and difficult to kill. Extension entomologists suggest the use of pyreneone as an effective control of horse flies. Pyreneone, although expensive, will control horse flies on cattle for about one week. One part of pyreneone to nine parts of water is recommended. About two pints to each cow is needed. This should rid the cow of the bothersome pest. Most of us keep one eye on the temptation we pray not to be led into.

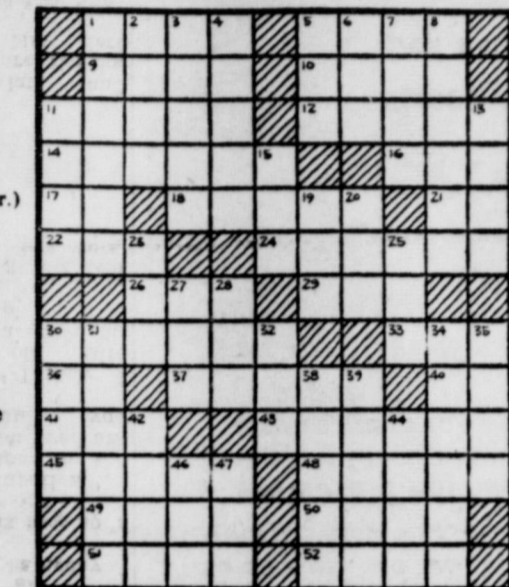

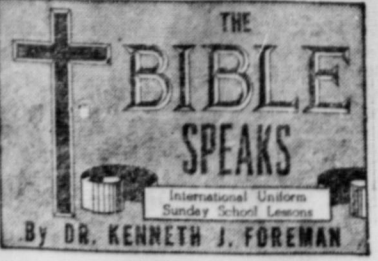

A Great Preacher?

Lesson for August 20, 1950

JESUS SAID of him that there had never been a greater man, than John, the Baptist. Certainly there has never been a greater preacher, to this day. He had none of the aids a modern preacher has. He had no song leader, no music of any kind; no church organization, no building, not even a tent. He was not even in a village but in a bandit-infested wilderness. There was little "dramatic" about him or his methods.

Yet he started a tremendous revival, and he won higher praise from Jesus than any other human being received from him.

Candor
CONSIDER SOME of the qualities of this famous man. One was candor, that is, he was not afraid to speak his mind. His opinions were not always popular; his verdicts were not always those of the masses. But he spoke his mind all the same.

He called his bearers "generation of vipers,"—snakes' babies, in modern words. He freely admitted he was no Messiah. When on a later occasion he had his doubts about Jesus, he did not conceal them, but told Jesus straight from the shoulder that he questioned him. And Jesus honored his honesty.

Candor is a rare article. Those few persons in public life who are willing to speak their minds may make more enemies but they make more admirers. The odd thing is that people cover up their minds for fear they will be unpopular; whereas you will generally find that the candid person does not lack for friends.

Courage
THAT BRINGS up another quality outstanding in this extraordinary man: his courage. He could stand up to the most prominent citizens and tell them they were sinners, and name their sins.

It doesn't take much courage to say you are a sinner, or to say that any one is. Aren't we all? It takes more nerve to speak out in plain language, as John did to the Pharisees and Herod for example. When he called on men to repent, he meant a specific repentance, not repentance-in-general.

In a southern state there was a prison chaplain at the penitentiary. One of the prisoners had been convicted of stealing funds from the state bank. But he never had admitted his guilt, in court or afterwards. He was stand-offish with the chaplain, though before his conviction he used to be a church officer and a praying man, the chaplain could hardly get next to him.

Finally one day he agreed to pray. As he and the chaplain knelt down together, the prisoner began: "Lord, thou knowest that we are all miserable sinners. . . . The chaplain stopped him. Leaning over he said to the prisoner: "What are you in here for?" The man was still a moment. Then in a quite different tone of voice he began again: "O God, forgive me for stealing from the State Bank." It was the first time he had ever admitted his guilt. But it took courage on the chaplain's part as well as his own.

Common Sense
ANOTHER QUALITY of John which deserves notice is his simple common-sense. Listen to what he tells the men who come with this question: What must we do? John's common-sense mind knew that repentance, just by itself, is not enough. Repentance is turning from something bad to something good, from wrong to right.

Let the man with two shirts share with the man who has none, he said. Let him who has food do likewise. Let the tax collector be honest. Let the soldier stop grumbling; even in an "occupied country" a soldier must not be unjust or cruel.

Pointing to Christ
WHAT MAKES John best remembered is that he preached Christ. He is known as the forerunner; he was the man who said of Jesus, "He must increase but I must decrease." The preacher who calls attention to himself is an egotist, a show-off; the preacher who draws men's eyes and hearts to Jesus Christ may himself be small, but his work will be great.

"Let's get goin'," said Fogarty. Stalling for time, Gimpy fogarty to the woman, "Wouldja min' if I took a look?"

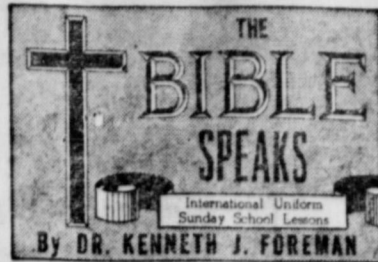
"Not at all," she said, and snapped open the locket. Inside was a picture of a mean-looking pike-pup.

A Great Preacher?

Lesson for August 20, 1950

JESUS SAID of him that there had never been a greater man, than John, the Baptist. Certainly there has never been a greater preacher, to this day. He had none of the aids a modern preacher has. He had no song leader, no music of any kind; no church organization, no building, not even a tent. He was not even in a village but in a hand-infested wilderness. There was little "dramatic" about him or his methods.

Yet he started a tremendous revival, and he won higher praise from Jesus than any other human being received from him.

CANDOR is a rare quality of this famous man. One was candor, that is, he was not afraid to speak his mind. His opinions were not always popular; his verdicts were not always those of the masses. But he spoke his mind all the same.

He called his hearers "generation of vipers,"—snakes' babies, in modern words. He freely admitted he was no Messiah. When on a later occasion he had his doubts about Jesus, he did not conceal them, but told Jesus straight from the shoulder that he questioned him. And Jesus honored his honesty.

Candor is a rare quality. Those few persons in public life who are willing to speak their minds may make some enemies but they make more admirers. The odd thing is that people cover up their minds for fear they will be unpopular; whereas you will generally find that the candid person does not lack for friends.

COURAGE THAT BRINGS up another quality of this extraordinary man: his courage. He could stand up to the most prominent citizens and tell them they were sinners, and name their sins.

It doesn't take much courage to say you are a sinner, or to say that any one is. Aren't we all? It takes more nerve to speak out in plain language, as John did to the Pharisees and Herod for example. When he called on men to repent, he meant a specific repentance, not repentance-in-general.

In a southern state there was a prison chaplain at the penitentiary. One of the prisoners had been convicted of stealing funds from the state bank. But he never had admitted his guilt, in court or afterwards. He was stand-offish with the chaplain, though before his conviction he used to be a church officer and a praying man, the chaplain could hardly get next to him.

Finally one day he agreed to pray. As he and the chaplain knelt down together, the prisoner began: "Lord, thou knowest that we are all miserable sinners..." The chaplain stopped him. Leaning over he said to the prisoner: "What are you in here for?" The man was silent a moment. Then in a quite different tone of voice he began again: "O God, forgive me for stealing from the State Bank." It was the first time he had ever admitted his guilt. But it took courage on the chaplain's part as well as his own.

Common Sense ANOTHER QUALITY of John which deserves notice is his simple common-sense. Listen to what he tells the men who come with this question: What must we do? John's common-sense mind knew that repentance, just by itself, is not enough. Repentance is turning from something bad to something good, from wrong to right.

Let the man with two shirts share with the man who has none, he said. Let him who has food do likewise. Let the tax-collector be honest. Let the soldier stop grumbling; even in an "occupied country" a soldier must not be unjust or cruel.

The judge said that, when a driver is asked what time it is, he shouldn't forget that he is still at the wheel!

A fisherman captured a sea lion, and decided to sell it for exhibition purposes. But one morning the sea lion slipped out of captivity and vanished into the ocean. 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DYSENTERY CAN BE SERIOUS

Commenting on the high incidence of dysentery in Texas at the present time, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, described dysentery as being an infectious disease characterized by diarrhea, pain in the abdomen and toxemia. It is caused by a specific bacteria or germ. These germs cause inflammation of the lining of the intestinal tract which produces pain throughout the abdomen and the discharge of many loose stools that frequently contain blood and mucus. Toxemia results from the absorption of the poisonous substances produced by the germs. "The germs gain entrance to the body thru the mouth. Then make their way to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the intestines they find conditions favorable to their growth and there they establish themselves at the expense of the person infected and produce their harmful effects," Dr. Cox said.

Dysentery affects young children more often and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally; however it may occur at any age. The germ is always expelled with the excreta of persons sick with dysentery and may continue to be expelled for some time after the patient recovers from the disease. These persons who still discharge the germs after they recover are called carriers and they occur more frequently in this disease than in the majority of other infectious diseases.

NO ENLISTING AFTER REPORT FOR DRAFT EXAM

Austin -- "Will I be able to enlist after I'm notified to report for physical examination by my draft board?"

This is a question which a lot of men are asking Selective Service local boards in Texas.

The answer is "no", General Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service, said this week. General Wakefield referred to Section 15 of the Selective Service Act of 1948 which prohibits acceptance of a registrant for enlistment after he has received orders to report for induction.

This does not prevent any registrant from joining an organized unit of a reserve component like the National Guard after he has received an order to report for physical exam but he cannot enlist for a tour of active duty in army, Air Force, Navy, etc after he receives a call for a physical.
