

AID TO AGRICULTURE

Farmers Find Lime Effective Agent for Soil Improvement

WASHINGTON .- With increasing emphasis on soil improvement, the manufacture of farm lime has become one of the most essential agricultural enterprises in the nation, according to the

soil conservation service of the department of agriculture.

The marked spurt in sales of lime to American farmers is revealed in soil conservation service figures which show total sales of less than 2 million tons in

1932 while sales for the current year are expected to exceed 25 million In Pennsylvania, West Vir-

ginia and Ohio lime is as necessary for farm land as salt is in the every-day diet, SCS officials point out. If farmers of these three states did not have lime to counteract excessive soil acidity, some of them would have to close shop, they add.

To assure enough lime for their fields, farmers of the West Fork soil conservation district, which embraces Doddridge, Harrison, Gilmer and Lewis counties in West Virginia, now are operating their own processing plant at historic Rich mountain in Randolph county, West Vir-

The \$30,000 plant was built with state funds by the West Virginia soil conservation committee and then turned over to the district supervisors for operation. The plant has a production capacity of 50 tons of burnt lime a day. Production costs range from \$8 to \$10 a ton, which covers operating costs and a small return to the state conservation committee. The surplus returned to the state group will be utilized to help finance other worthwhile district enterprises in West Virginia.

'As soon as we get into full production, we hope to cut the price to \$5 a ton," declared G. Manley Curry, chairman of the district board. Members of the board are elected by farmers belonging to the soil conservation district.

Application of lime is one of many soil and water conservation practices used in the West Fork district and some 1,700 other soil conservation districts in the country to keep the land permanently productive, stabilize agriculture and increase

Wassail Bowl For Auld Lang Syne

The Wassail bowl goes around in Scotland—and elsewhere—at New Year's time.

The origin of the custom is really lost in antiquity: Saxon ancestors probably quaffed their ale from the polished skulls of defeated enemies, and the Rowena legend must be classified as "presumably fiction."

Rowena is reported to have offered her father's guest-Prince Vortigren-a bowl of wine with the salutation "Lord King, wass-hael," literally, "To Your Health." Draining the bowl with one draught, Vortigren fell in love with Rowens and they lived happily ever after.

Anyway, in time the bowl itself became an ornament of graceful design-decorated with branches of greenery which formed a canopy over the bowl. The mixture within was warm and included ale, sugar, spices, sweetened wine was added by hosts who could afford it, apples floated on top of the decoction, some-times called "lamb's wool" or the "old man's beard." The poorer classes carried a bowl decorated with ribbons around the neighborhood, begging that it be filled, so they, too, might enjoy the Wassail.



The custom of making short calls on New Year's Day was in full swing throughout America about Newspapers carried columns of "at home" notices specifying the hours during which visitors would be received. A succession of "open houses" and punch bowls sometimes minimized the courtesy accorded to hostesses - receptions were often "crashed" by bibulous strangers; hence, the publicly announced "open house" custom has fallen into decline and, New Year's calls now being exchanged only by intimates, the Wassail bowl goes 'round in

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





I met a young economist in England. His thinking revealed that he would like to see the complete crum bling of the present order and the ultimate nationalization of all England. His discussion showed too that he would thoroughly relish failure of 'the capitalistic order' in America, which he boldly predicted would surely come within a few

Notable thing about this young man is that he is very influential in the Labor government. He talked freely and with spirit, and the enthusiasm he exhibited shows conclusively which school of thought in England is on the defensive. It is unfortunate when Truth and Right are no longer on the crusade, but instead must be called to the defen-

I asked this young economist the secret of the growth of the Socialist party in the United Kingdom. Displaying political acumen which is engendered only from a thorough understanding of reality and a knowledge of facts, this economist said that victory in the last election in close districts came because of the vote of the young people.

'In fact, the percentage of young people who voted the Socialist ticket was greater than the percentage of older people in the ranks of Labor. he told me, adding a fact I knew already: that the growth of Socialism has been more rapid among young people and among skilled workers. The influence of higher education, he stoutly affirmed, was a definite factor in the spread of Socialism throughout the Kingdom.

. I did not encourage him in this regard about America, but the parallel was clear. I found myself wishing that our own high schools and colleges were doing a better job of building into the very fiber of American youth a deep appreciation for the fundamental principles of our American way of life, lest our youth some day lead this nation down that same unfortunate road. Strange irony it is, that wealth created by honest work is used in the form of taxes and in grants as means to destroy the philosophy which begot our freedom and our wealth.

A MESSAGE OF LOVE (CHRISTMAS LESSON)

LESSON TEXT - John 3:16; Ephesians MEMORY SELECTION—Thanks be unto God for his unspeakable gift.—II Corinthians 9.15.

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem there were only a few men and women of faith who could see in the Pabe of the manger the glory and the power of Christ. It was a dark and unbelieving age into which he was born-and who will say that it is different in the day in which we celebrate Christmas, 1946.

Indifferent, ignorant and sinful people are glad to try to capitalize on the spirit of Christmas, but they still despise and turn away from the Son of God, Jesus the Saviour.

It behooves us, therefore, to present once more the message of the Saviour who came at Christmas, that all men may hear of him. Our lesson speaks of God's great

gift of love and tells what manner of men and women we should be because he did give his Son for us. I. God's Christmas Gift to Us

(John 3:16). God loved-so God gave. Love prompts the heart to give. One may give without loving, it is true, but one cannot love without giving.

God's love for man existed from all eternity. It provided a way of redemption for man and in due season the Saviour came, to live, to love, to die for all mankind.

It was no chance event, no accident in history; it was the heart of God speaking in his "unspeakable gift" (II Cor. 9:15) of his only be-

That leads us to our second Scripture and our second point. We who receive gifts try to express our appreciation in a polite and proper way.

II. Our "Thank You" to God (Eph. 3:14-21).

Paul's prayer for the Ephesian church (and for us also who are in the "family," v. 15) tells us how we may live our lives as Christians and express our gratitude to God.

The church of Christ, made up of those who are believers in him. should show its relationship to God, and its appreciation of his grace by

1. Strength (v. 16). It does not honor God nor is he properly represented in the world by those who are spiritually weak and ineffective. It is the privilege of the believer

to be "strengthened with might" (v. 16) and this takes place as the Holy Spirit has liberty "with power penetrating to your inmost being," as Weymouth translates it. No part of man's inner being is then left weak or without the light and grace of the Holy Spirit.

2. Love (v. 17). This is the strong foundation of all spiritual development and usefulness. Roots are put down deep (as we change the figure of speech) to hold the life steady, and to provide the nourishment for spiritual living.

This is all possible because Christ makes his home in the heart. Think of the privilege of making such a guest feel at home in our hearts! Let us be grateful, and let us recognize him and honor his presence.

3. Knowledge (vv. 18, 19). The believer has to know not only the knowable, but also that which passes knowledge, namely, the love of

Christ. We shall grow in grace as we grow in the knowledge of the love of Christ (II. Pet. 3:18). We with all of God's people-what a great and delightful company-are to comprehend, to really grasp, the length and breadth and height and depth of his love.

We say with the psalmist, "Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high, I cannot attain to it' (Ps. 139:6). But then we remember that it is as Christ dwells "in our hearts by faith" (v. 17) that we are able to comprehend such truth.

Most Christians live on a very low plane, going along with a limited and unsatisfactory Christian experience when all this is available to them by faith.

4. Faith (v. 20). Here we see why it is possible to do the impossible, to know that which passes knowledge, to see the unseen. It is by faith in him who "is able to do infinitely beyond all our highest prayers and thoughts" (Weymouth, v. 20) that we attain unto this blessed place of blessing.

So this is the "Thank you" that God wants this Christmas. He wants the unbeliever to turn to him in faith, and the believer to really be what he ought to be and can be in Christ. Then a man's whole life will say, "Thank you, Lord, for saving my soul."

For the tenth successive year the writer of these notes expresses to his readers everywhere his good wish for a most blessed Christmas both in heart and home. May the Lord give us all special grace this year to thank him for his great Christmas Gift by a life wholly dedicated to him.
