come to either sex at any age at any time, althou it is more prevalent during summer months when feet are more apt to per-You'll know you've got it when

your feet begin itching and blistering and when you see the soggy dead skin between the toes or on the soles. Take action then, and you can usually get rid of it in a hurry. But neglect it and you are

Here are some suggestions which will prevent athle's foot or help you get rid of it if you have it now Dry carefully and thoroughly beween your toes after bathing and as often as practical during day. The disease is caused fungus which thrives on perspiring feet. Message your feet with a mild rubbing alcohol. This will help prevent spreading the in-

fection from one spot to another.

Dust a good fungicide powder or even an unscented talcum powder or powdered boric acid between the toes, in stockings and shoes. If at all practical, change stockings once during the day.

Swab all cracks or soggy areas between the toes with one part iodine diluted with 10 parts of alcohol. Wear absorbent socks and put a piece of cotton on areas tween the toes where cracks

sogginess are evident. Don't use remedies which have been sold for eczema. Consult your physician if the cracks and blisters and sogginess do not yield

these measures. And keep this in mind: if athlete's foot is neglected, it can spread readily beyond the feet. The lesions will go deeper and deeper and may cause critical damage.

Draft Law Explained

Any yound married man registered with a draft beard had better be on the alert about any expected additions to his family. If his wife is expecting their first child, it is to his interest to tell the board about it immediately.

If he does not take this highly necessary step and the draft board sends him an order to report for induction, then the draft board has no authority to defer him on the basis of the unbern child, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, points out.

Afterward, the law requires

man to report birth of children into his family, just as it requires him to provide the local board at all times with his latest change of ad-

As long as he has only a wife to support, he's as eligible for a hitch in the Army as a single man. When he has a child in his family, or one has been conceived and not as yet born, the law provides for his deferment, provided he tells board about it before he is ordered for induction. 
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

ume hay, such as alfalfa, is also high in calcium.

Wheat is a good strong feed and is next to cottonseed meal as a source of low cost protein. Oats is a good feed for young and growing stock and can be fed to them without grinding. Corn is the cheapest source of straight energy. livestock deficient in the source of vitamin A, carotene, alfalfa hay seems the best way out, because the alfalfa will furnish needed bulk and protein in addition to carotene. About 70 pounds of corn and 30 make about a 20 per cent feed. Derange to provide enough bulk hydrated alfalfa pellets also contain about 20 percent protein. It is important to watch energy content of the 20 percent feeds as a 700 to 900 pound cow will require 4.5 to 6 therms of net energy daily for proper maintenance. In case of 20 percent protein feeds, choose those which guarantee as much as 52 percent N. F. E. or Water content should not be over 12 percent moisture. Anything over 8 percent crude ash is pretty high Crude ash reflects sand and dirt.

Drouthy, idle livestock will take a lot of salt and mineral in case of deficiencies. Cottonseed meal pellets is a good source of phosphorus when fed at the rate of 2 lbs. daily per head. Also alfalfa hay is usually high in calcium.
