

G.O.P. VICTORY:

The Battle Is Underway

The echo of the G.O.P. victory in the November national election had not subsided before another voice was heard on the national scene. It astonishing election victory. On one occasion he said, "Only an idiot was a Republican chorus of "fire Acheson" and a hint of congressional reorganization. The battle began for greater G.O.P. power in the coming session of congress.

On the domestic scene, Republican leaders opened fire on what they called the "grave inflationary situation." This was not believed to of Soviet aggression. But the facts ought to be clearly brought before mean price controls for the benefit of the American housewife, however.

Senator Wiley of Wisconsin, fresh from a re-election victory, said: "It is a national tragedy the way prices of military items have been allowed to leap since the Korean conflict started." Controls were expected to be along this line.

There were indications also that a new investigation of Communist influences in government would be launched by Republicans when the next congress convened.

Notice was also served on the Democrats that Republicans will insist upon advance consultation on foreign policy steps.

And Sen. Robert A. Taft, now the acknowledged "big-wig" of the Republican party, made it clear he would like to hang Acheson's scalp to his belt when he stated: haven't the slightest confidence in Acheson's judgment."

To most observers it was clear the Republican party had launched an all-out campaign for control of the U.S. government. The final battle will be fought with the ballot box in 1952.

While the world speculated about China's ultimate aims in Korea, the battle continued.

Reports from the scene were confused. Military observers estimated as many as 90,000 Chinese Communists fighting in North Korea, but said United Nations forces continued slow advances behind smashing air attacks.

Meanwhile, a Chinese delegation was invited to the United Nations to hear the charge of aggression in North Korea lodged against them by the United States.



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

Korean power plants along the Manchurian-Korean Yalu river boundary.

The Chinese Reds apparently were willing to fight to protect them. The reason being that the mighty hydroelectric plants strung across the neck of North Korea produced 2.-681,180 of Korea's 3,132,727 kilowatt hours. An undetermined amount of that power going into Manchuria, the great center of China's heavy industry.

With this in mind, Chinese forces plunged into North Korea and forced United Nations troops to withdraw from the area. Since the Chinese have constructed a "Maginot Line" below the vital plants and will put up a determined defense when U.N. forces reach the area again.

Mao Tze-tung does not want that power shut off. Although the Russians looted much Manchurian productive equipment during their postwar occupation, what is left is China's chief hope for industrialization. And the Communist party line says industrialization is the answer to China's historic poverty.

CORN BELT: **Rural Vote Counts**

Leaders of both major parties have spent considerable time since the election trying to read the future from the election results. One obvious conclusion was drawn. The major battle ground for the 1952 election will be in the midwest corn belt.

As most voters remember, Tru-man won the 1948 election because three Midwest states jumped from their traditional G.O.P. column to the Democrat side. They were Ohio, Illinois and Iowa. Had any two of these states voted for Dewey in 1948, he would have been elected.

In the recent election, however, the rural vote returned to the Republican ledger. Two factors may have influenced the switch in the farm voting: a tendency for farmers to return to their traditional Republicanism when times are good and to vote Democratic only when their prices and incomes are declining. and, apparent dissatisfaction with foreign policies of the administration.

For these reasons the farmers of the Midwest will find themselves the target of both Republican and Democratic candidates in 1952. The Republicans will attempt to increase their gains and the Democrats can be expected to launch a full-scale attack to retake command. It might even be said that the farmers of the midwest will elect the next president of the United States.

LYNN SAYS: Know Cookery Terms To Follow Recipes

When recipes call for parboiling, this means that the food is cooked briefly in water or stock, and then prepared in another manner to complete. The term applies usually to meat and vegetables. To sear means to brown rapidly with a quick application of heat. The term is used with meats. To poach means to cook very briefly in hot liquid just below the boiling point.


Combine crumbs, salt, spices, milk and sugar. Mix well and cool. Stir in eggs, fruits, fruit peels, suet and orange juice. Mix thoroughly. Pour into two greased quaft molds; cover with lids or double thickness of waxed paper and steam four hours.

To lard means to draw narrow strips of salt pork through lean meat with a larding needle just for that purpose. Meats which are larded are those which are lean and need extra fat so they'll be juicy after cooking.

Marinating refers to the process of letting foods stand in sauce or seasoning to give them flavor. It's used for fruits and vegetables in salads, and meats before cooking. Pan broiling? Grease a heavy skillet very lightly and cook food in it on top of the range.

Some observers saw Taft's victory as a plain indication that the people were not happy with the administration's foreign policy.

The administration took another blow in Connecticut. Republican John Davis Lodge ousted Fair Deal Democrat Chester Bowles in the governor's contest. Democrat Sen. Brien McMahon, however, was reelected.

In New York, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, twice-defeated Republican nominee for president, won a third term as governor of that state. The governor's running mate, Lt. Gov. Joe R. Hanley, was defeated by Sen. Herbert Lehman. Here again was evidence of that trend where neither Republicans or Democrats were able to sweep all offices. This split across party Inesswas evident in many sections of the country.

In California, Republican Gov. Earl Warren, seeking a third term, won re-election over James Roosevelt, son of the late President. Rep. Richard M. Nixon also defeated Democrat Helen Gahagan Douglas in a senatorial battle

KOREA: Situation Serious

The war in Korea which seemed on the verge of complete victory for the United Nations forces took a dangerous turn with the invasion of Chinese Communists. Political observers termed the situation serious, including Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the U. N. commander. According to available reports,

between three and six Chinese divisions crossed the boundary between Manchuria and Korea and went into battle beside the North Koreans. The immediate military result was a withdrawal of U. N. troops south, in some instances as much as 50 miles.

MacArthur summed up the situation by reporting that the North Korean army was finished as a fighting force in October by the inflicting of 335,000 casualties. This included 135,000 Reds who were captured.

His communique on the situation said: "In the face of this victory of U.N. arms, the Communists committed one of the most offensive acts of international lawlessness of historic record .

There are available in Manchuria about 300,000 troops- veterans of the Chinese civil war-which could be thrown into the battle immediately. Another 300,000 are believed to be either in Manchuria or North China.

The dangerous question now facing the free nations is what attitude the Chinese will take to Mac-Arthur's charge that "alien Communists" have entered the war.




