

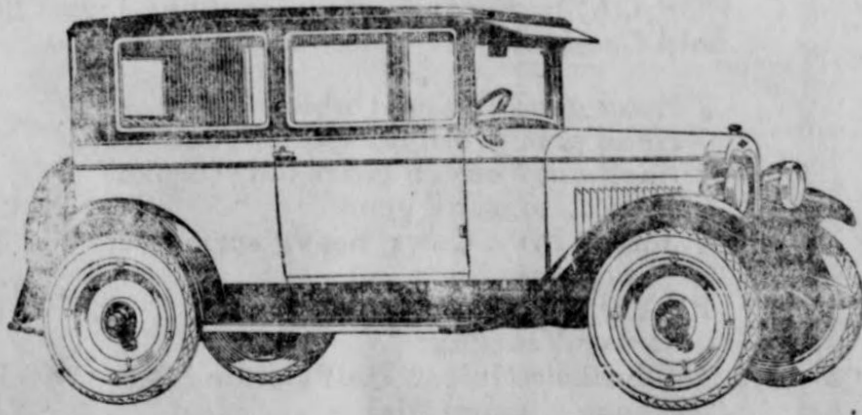

Sweetwater—Westerners from all parts of Central Texas will convene here Novmbr 30 to see and hear Governor "Dan" take part in a district West Texas Chamber of Commerce gathering. Moody's attendance will mark his first appearance at a sectional convention of the West Texas regional organization and the entire occasion is planned as a gala event for the West.

Vernon—Friendship and good feelings of trade territory towns of this section have been cemented by a unique plan inaugurated by the Vernon Chamber of Commerce under the direction of Grady S. Shipp, secretary. The plan involves holding banquets at various points, the Vernon Chamber members paying for their tickets and for tickets for the guests invited in the town where the event is staged. Programs with Vernon and local town talent are held

at each place. A series of similarly planned rural acquaintance trips are scheduled for school communities of the county during the winter months

suance of the Bonds of said City for the amount of \$40,000.00 Water Works Bonds, such election to be held on the 19th day of December, 1927. The Motion was carried by the following vote: Aldermen G. A. Haney, J. H. Hardberger, W. E. Singleton, C. L. Davis and R. C. Carroll voting "aye", and no one voting "no". Thereupon the following election order was adopted:

It appearing that the City is in need of water-works, and that the City Council deems it advisable to issue the Bonds of said City for said purpose, in the amount hereinafter set out;

Therefore be it ordered by the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, that an election be held on the 19th day of December, A. D. 1927, at which election, the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of said City, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas be authorized to issue the Bonds of said City of O'Donnell, Texas in the amount of \$40,000.00, maturing serially with in 40 years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of 5 1-2 per cent per annum and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and provide a sinking fund with which to pay the principal at maturity, for the purpose of construction of Water-works for said City as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter 1, and 7, of Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925."

Said election shall be held at the City Hall building in said City of O'Donnell, and the following named persons, are hereby appointed Judges and Clerks respectively: W. R. Sanderson, Presiding Judge, J. M. Christopher, Judge; J. E. McClung, Clerk; and E. T. Wells, Clerk.

Said Election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter one and seven, Title twenty-two, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and the manner of holding the same shall be governed by the laws regulating General Elections so far as applicable and only qualified voters who are property tax payers, in the said City, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

All voters who favor the foregoing proposition, to issue the Bonds for Water-works, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words "For the Issuance Of Bonds For The Purpose of Water-works;" and those opposed thereto, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words "Against the Issuance of Bonds For The Purpose of Water-works."

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor, and the City Secretary of the City of O'Donnell, shall serve as a proper notice of said Election; And the Mayor and City Secretary are hereby authorized, and directed to cause such notice of election to be posted at the hereinbefore named Polling Place in said City of O'Donnell, for 30 whole days prior to the date of such election, and also, to cause such notice to be published in some newspaper of general circulation, which has been regularly published in said City, for at least one year before this date, which notice shall be published once each week, for 30 full days, before the date of said election, the date of the first publication thereof, to be not less than 30 full days prior to the date of such election.
