Cancer is often spoken of as the 'silent' disease. This is because in many cases cancer grows without giving any symptom. And pain which is most often thought of as accompanying disease, is not generally present until cancer is far advanced. Most cancer can be cured when detected and treated in the early stages. The difficulty in cancer control, then, lies with the detection of the disease.

Only a physician can tell if cancer is present. Any suspicious symptom should always be examined by the family physician. But often, by the time any symptoms of cancer show up, it is too late. Treatment of

advanced cancer is difficult.

The only insurance against this silent growth is a reguar, at least yearly, physical examination.

Moisture in seed cotton from humidity may not be seen or felt, but it is there. And it limits the kind of job the ginner can do. Excess moisture in cotton usually results in the loss of grade and quality and can cost the grower as much as \$10 a bale, Mechanical pickers should never be operated until the cotton moisture is down to a reasonable should

-000-The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council passes on this word of caution to those driving in the dry areas of Texas. -- Do not throw lighted matches or cigarettes onto ways. Fires are a real threat to the State's range forage.

SHORT COURSES BENEFIT EATING ESTABLISHMENTS

Over 15 million meals will be served in 20,000 Texas eating establishments this week. If you are average you'll eat at least two of them. You could go into the vast majority of those restaurants and cafeterias and be assured of getting a wholesome meal -- totally oblivious of the fact that you are eating food cooked and served by complete strangers.

How can this be, esperially since some 26 different diseases can be spread by improperly handled food? Included in the list are such scourages as trichinosis, the deadly botulism, strep infections and sal-mone losis (food poisoning). There are many reasons of course

but among the main ones are the three day short courses in sanitation conducted by the State Depart-ment of Health for persons engaged in food preparation and service.

He points out that lots of grain will soon be going in farm storage structures and suggests the bins be given a thorough cleaning and an application of a good residual spray before any grain is stored. Local county agents can supply details on the insecticides







If all children were given through eye examination prior to entering school for the first time and if all visual defects were cor-rected or placed under treatment at that time, a major step in the prevention of blindness in childhood would be taken. One of every four school children are said to need some form of eye care. But a single examionaion is not enough. A child grows quickly. His eyes, like every other body organ are constantly changing. Sometimes the change is for the worse. At least half of all cases of blindness occurring from year to year could be prevented through use of the sight - saving knowledge at hand. For example, some 300,000 industrial eye injuries occrr each year. The mere use of goggles would cut the figure dramatically. As for disease-caused blindness modern surgical methods now restore or improve vision in 19 of 20
