As yet no officers have been elected, but it is generally understood that Mrs. P. H. Northcross will act as secretary and treasurer, the lady having had much experience in this line of work.

The object of the association is to furnish protection to all its members and to promote cooperation for the purpose of creating a business like and fair system of and for handling credits and to eliminate existing trade evils which are detrimental to the merchants and to the buying public, and to furnish credit rating on individuals for mutual protection of its members and to keep in operation a reliable credit rating system in charge of a salaried secretary.

It is sincerely believed that an accompanying effect of the association will be to encourage thrift, industry and prompt business methods and for these reasons it will prove a splendid public benefit. It should minimize merchant's losses and thus tend to economy.

W. M. Lackey Passes Away

After an illness of about ten days W. M. Lackey died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. M. Tallant Thursday, November 5, at 6:55 o'clock. Had he lived until December 2, Grandpa Lackey would have been 102 years of age. The funeral services were held at the Baptist church Friday afternoon, Rev. W. K. Horn preaching the funeral sermon, burial followed at the O'Donnell cemetery.

Mr. Lackey was born in Springfield, Mo., December 2nd, 1823. Later his parents moved to St. Louis when that city was only a small town. His father fought on the battlefields seven years with George Washington and died at the age of 105 years. William Lackey first married in Sevier county, Arkansas, when he was sixteen years of age to Miss Melissa Steward and to this union was born one child, who is now 84 years old and lives in California. About two years after this marriage, the wife died and a year later he married Miss Susan Bird in Yell county, Arkansas, six children being born to this union. After the death of this wife, Mr. Lackey married Miss Mary Norris of Hunt county, eleven children being

born to this union. His fourth marriage was to Miss Ida Sage in Hopkins county, and to this union five children were born. The last Mrs. Lackey died about four years ago in Pueblo, Colo., and since that time he has been making his home with his children, coming here about three months ago to visit.

Mr. Lackey fought in the Civil war under General Price and had a bright memory as to the happenings of the stormy period. He had been a member of the Missionary Baptist church for 62 years. Until stricken with his last illness, he attended church regularly and took an interest in all things pertaining to church work.

Six of his children, E. A. Lackey, J. E. Lackey, C. W. Lackey, and Mrs. L. W. Mosley, Mrs. A. F. Sealy and Mrs. J. M. Tallant were present at the time of his death.

Health and Home

PROPER FOOD FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

The age during which children are attending school may aptly be called "The Dangerous Age." It is the period of rapid growth and every care should be taken to insure the child of a normal and healthy body. The idea of eating only fit and wholesome foods should be early impressed on the younger members of every family in order to protect them against later ill health and its accompanying unhappiness. If the utmost care is not taken in the diet that is used by children, cases of food poisoning, indigestion and kindred ailments may result.

And milk, being the chief item in the diets of most children, should be carefully guarded. It is, because of its nature, prone to infection if exposed to germs and may soon become unfit for use. Wherever there is the slightest reason for doubt as to its purity and food value, steps should be taken to insure the sterility and the fitness of milk intended for consumption by children. Many mothers have adopted the excellent practice of using milk that is absolutely pure and sterile and free from any germs or bacteria. The most satisfactory, as well as the safest milk used in preparing food for the growing child is evaporated milk.

It is sterile, and therefore safe. It is more digestible than market milk. Its uniformity, convenience and cost are qualities that recommend it.

The following dishes are well suited to the needs of the growing child; they are easily digested and very nourishing:

Caramel Custard.

1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water
 1/2 cup sugar (caramelized) with 2 tbsp. sugar
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Scald the diluted milk. Caramelize the sugar and add to milk to dissolve. Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, salt, and flavoring and combine with scalded milk. Pour into custard cups and set in a pan of hot water and cook in a moderate oven. When done, a knife blade run in the center will come out clean.

1 pint raw fish cut in 1-inch dice
 3 small potatoes sliced
 2 onions chopped fine
 3 cups boiling water
 1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water

Turkish Sumptuary Laws

The Constantinople vilayet council was recently asked by the ministry of the interior to draw up a sumptuary law forbidding legal prodigality. A commission, which has worked hard on the project, has now devised a number of minute restrictions on the marriages of the well-to-do. Under the rules proposed a bridegroom will give his bride a ring not exceeding 20 Turkish pounds in value, about \$10 and no other wedding present. As for the bride, she may not bring to her new household more than two dresses in all, and her contribution to the furnishings may be no more than for one room.

Weddings must pass off without nuptial banquets, only sweets and innocuous sirups being offered to the guests. The wedding procession must not parade more than five carriages or motor cars. As for banquets to celebrate the births of children, they also are forbidden.

These regulations, which have not yet been adopted, would have taken the wind out of a Stamboul Turk who not very long ago, shocked the respectable street with a parade of 40 carriages and who opened 100 cases of champagne for his guests.

Dictionary in Demand

The spelling bee in which Republican woman voters competed at the Oak Lane Review club on Tuesday was but a more elaborate event than many which nowadays test the fair orthographers at afternoon parties, says the Philadelphia Bulletin. Cross-word brain twisters necessitate many a resort to the dictionary and success in the game, whether for personal satisfaction or in trying for prizes, requires cultivation of the gentle art of correct spelling. Whatever the impelling cause, the benefit derived from improved orthography is very desirable.

Oldsters profited by the rigorous oral drill in spelling which was prominent in the simplified schooling of other days. Whatever the theory of modern methods, the results in modern manuscripts do not do it credit. There is too much boggling over words that enter into the ordinary vocabulary, too much spelling according to the letter-writer's own taste and fancy. Hopi and Apache Dolls

The bureau of American ethnology says that the dolls of the Hopi Indians are never made of clay, but are manufactured from the subterranean branch of the cottonwood tree. They are not necessarily rain gods, although the need of rain is so omnipresent and these images are copies of certain idols which appear on rain altars, that they are sometimes called rain gods. They are, however, not gods, but dolls, and are made by the parents and given to the children as playthings. The dolls of the Apache, as well as certain other tribes, are often made of adobe, and are probably used in much the same way as the Hopi dolls.
