Mountain Memorial Work

Atlanta, Georgie Feb. 10 .- Holling N. Randolph, President of the Stone Mountain Memorial, on Saturday issued the following progress report to

"Since December 10, when work was resumed, twenty thousand cubic from the precipice of Stone Mountain. The granite removed was from the neck, shoulder and flank of "Old Traveler," General Lee's horse. This part of the carving has therefore been advanced at a most gratifying rate."

"This is an average of about four hundred cubic feet per day since the work was resumed about 50 day: ago. The cost per cubic foot has been substantially less than it ever was in the previous oprations, ac cording to the report of the Association engineers."

"Plans have been perfected to enarge the working force on the mountain in the next thirty days or thereabouts, so that by March the carving perations should be going in full blast. The carving will be pushed forward with the utmost possible rapidity until the central group is finished."

"Mr. Lukeman believes the central group can be carved inside of two years. He and Mr. Roberts, chairnan of the Board of Consulting Engineers, have worked out plans for movable working platforms embracing practically the entire carving area, so that operations can be conducted on a maximum scale."

"As previously announced, the Association has raised in cash and good pledges an amount sufficient to carve the central group, thus definitely assuring the first unit of the project."

AT A SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS HELD ON THE 28th DAY OF JANUARY, A. D. 1926 THE ORDINANCE FOLLOWING WAS PASSED:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of O'Donnell;

BELIEF IN WITCHES BY NO MEANS GONE

Still Strong in Parts of Rural England.

In remote corners of England to which the rallroad does not run, and where visitors are few, the belief in witchcraft still lingers, in spite of parson and schoolmaster, says a writer in ondon paper, who continues:

Walking down what is called a "green lane" only a few days ago I passed a little Elizabethan cottage, thatched and weather-boarded, and saw over the front door a hazel wand, Curlosity led me past the corner of the field on which the cottage stands. and there, sure enough, on the back door was another hazel wand.

On the plea of wishing to buy some of the gooseberries that were growing on the bushes, I entered into conversation with the old man who owns the cottage, and asked him frankly who was troubling bim. I pointed to the hazel wand over the back door as though I took its efficacy for granted, and he told me that he had had some trouble with the local "Wise Woman." One of his pigs had sickened as a result, and to save himself from further trouble he had put up the wands, because no wise woman can pass beyond

In another village I know well a woman who earned a good bit of money by the sale of herb medicines, sent her daughter to service in Wales, and this daughter came back with one of the old-fashioned hats of the country that women used to wear. By the ald of the hat and a red cloak, her mother thrives, for she has sharp features, and the costume strikes terror, or at least respect, into the hearts of the country folk.

A point to be remembered is that many of the "wise women" have a valuable knowledge of the virtues of certain herbs. I know of one who has repeatedly cured the worst symptoms of whooping cough by giving mothers of affliced children a thin slice of garlic to wear between their foot and their sole. 
