Civic Leader Claimed Rites Read For Mr. Noble

James Mack Noble, a prominent local civic leader for over 30 years, died at his home here at 9:45 a. m. last Thursday. He was 62 and was reared west of Tahoka at West Point.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Saturday at First Methodist Church here with Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor of the O'Donnell First Methodist Church and Rev. Troy Dale, pastor of the O'Donnell First Baptist Church officiating. Interment followed in the local cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mr. Noble, carrier for route 3, arrived for work Thursday morning as usual and at about nine he went out to his car and laid down. His fellow workers noticed a bit later that he was ill, and took him to his home. His wife called a Lamesa ambulance to take him to the hospital but he slipped away about the time the ambulance arrived, apparently from a massive heart attack.

Mack had been a resident here since 1923. He was a bank employee and later was in the automobile business as the Ford dealer. In the mid 30's he became the postmaster and transferred to rural carrier about 5 or so years ago.

At the time of his home-going, Mr. Noble was district deputy of the Grand Lodge, Masonic lodge and past Worshipful Master. He was a charter member of the O'Donnell Rotary Club and a former president and director of that group. He currently was Chairman of the Board of the First National Bank and was a veteran of World War I.

Blessed with a keen mind, he took thoughtful interest in local area and state political affairs. One of his hobbies was his annual deer hunt and he was planning to make the hunt again this year to Wyoming. In fairly good health to the end, Mack enjoyed visiting with people— not just with a small group. He was a man easy to meet and was a blessing to new comers.

Although of an "out-going" personality, he was still very quiet in voice tone and had the ability to lead folks to talk on their subject.

Survivors include the wife, Margaret, two sons, J. M. Jr. of Louisville, Eddie of San Francisco, Calif., three brothers, Terry of Tahoka, Levi of Post and Robert of Brownfield.

A man of the people, his friends responded with love and concern.

Pallbearers included the honorary group of postal employees, Mason, Rotary members and bank officials and employees.

Active pallbearers were Glen Gibson, John and Sam Saleh, Hugh Lott, Wayland Taylor, Clyde Winans, Jimmy Forbes and Mitchell Williams of Tahoka.

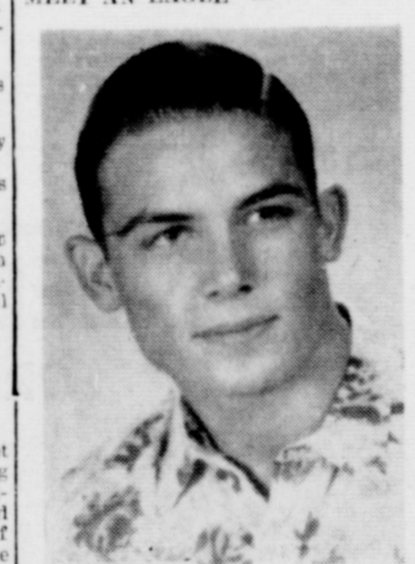

STROKES ARE "ACCIDENTS"

Austin—More than 9,000 Texas men and women were fatally stricken last year by strokes. That is one of the most ominous words in the language today. What does it really mean?

The medical term is cerebral vascular accident, because it is caused by cerebral vascular disease. The body's cerebral vascular system is the brain's network of blood vessels. Thus cerebral vascular disease refers to diseases of vessels in the brain. Brain cells require a good blood supply in order to work properly—more so than most other body cells. When something happens to that blood supply, the brain itself is impaired.

That something could be a hemorrhage, thrombus, embolus, compression or a spasm. Each one of those key words is a major cause of strokes.

A hemorrhage (bleeding) is the result of a break in a brain artery which allows blood to escape and damage surrounding tissue. Another name for strokes of this type is "apoplexy".

A thrombus is caused by a clot of blood forming in a brain artery, stopping the flow of blood to the part of the brain it supplies. But when a clot is formed in a diseased heart or elsewhere in the body and pumped to the brain to plug an artery, it is called an embolus.

IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS—THE CAMP STOVE

Nancy and her husband, along with several other couples, were going on a week end camping trip to a nearby lake. Before leaving Nancy bought a small camp stove to cook the fish they planned to catch.

The first time that Nancy tried to use the stove, the gasoline container which was a component of the stove exploded. Nancy sustained severe injuries, and she sued the manufacturer of the stove.

At the trial there was testimony that the gasoline container was defective in that there was not sufficient overlap of the edges of the cap and the body of the container, and that such defect was the cause of the explosion. The manufacturer claimed that the explosion was caused by improper use of the stove. He also stated that even if there was a defect in Nancy's stove, it was an obvious defect and that she was negligent in not discovering it.

Can Nancy win her lawsuit? Yes, said the court. The stove as offered to the public was, by reason of its negligent construction, inherently dangerous. The manufacturer knew or ought to have known of the defective condition of the article it placed on the market for general use. It places no hardship on manufacturers of such articles to change them with knowledge of their own methods of manufacturing and of the defects in such methods if they exist.

School Bond Issue Carries 145-109

In moderate voting Saturday the taxpayers of the O'Donnell School District approved the issuance of \$195,000 in bonds to build a new Junior High Building and classrooms and remodel the present Junior High School. The vote was 145 to 109—a much closer vote than observers expected.

Supt. John Criner said building would begin first on the ten new classrooms and by late spring the old Junior High would be remodeled. Bids are expected to be advertised within the month and construction may begin as early as November. Next years taxes will go up 14 percent, that is from \$1.75 to \$2 per 100 on valuation.

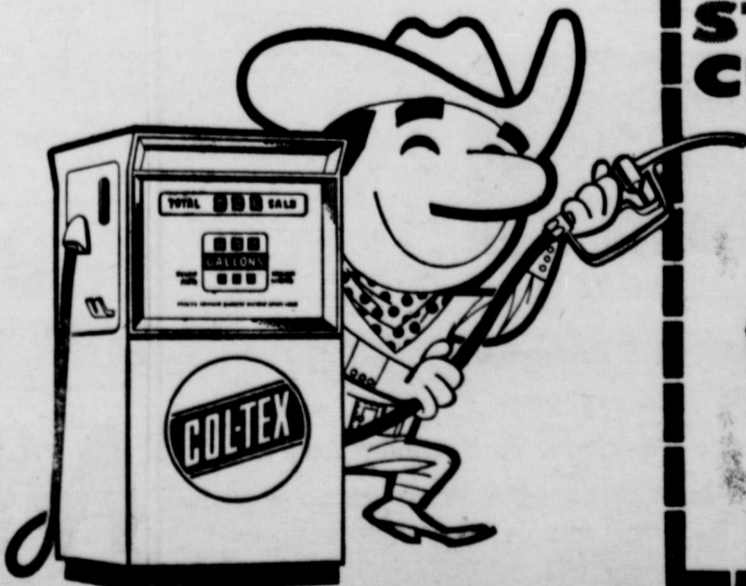
