**August Banner Month  
For Chevrolet Dealers**

August went into the records as another banner month for Chevrolet, according to an announcement made today by Vaughn Chevrolet Company. Combined sales of cars and trucks were 95,905 units, the second largest August figure in Chevrolet's history. Truck sales, reported at 22,248, were the highest ever made in August, and the second highest ever made in any month. An additional highlight of the dealers' sales performance in August was their sale of 185,197 used cars, nearly 20,000 units more than they sold in August 1935. Used car stocks nationally decreased 2,527 units in the last 10 days of the month, and as this month opened were more than 7,800 units lower than at the same date last year.

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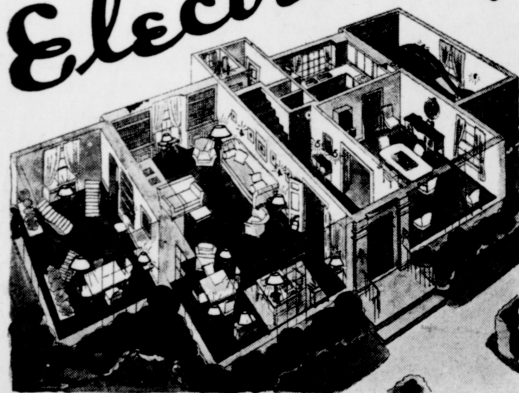
