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

Dieting usually isn't fun. In the final analysis it gets down to plain will power. You just have to want to lose weight enough to give up tempting high

calorie foods. But instead of dieting - just change your attitude toward food and stay eternally slim!

You can do this by substituting high nutrient - low calorie fresh fruits and vegetables for the high calorie foods you normally eat.

Taste is relative. If you like sweet foods, you will crave increasing sweetness in order to find satisfaction. If you decrease your need for sweetness, ar apple or orange can taste as sweet as a gooey sundae. You can do this by deliberately substituting a nutritious fresh fruit when you get a yen for a highcalorie block buster.

If you are very much overweight, you should consult a doctor before dieting. If, like most of us, you are just suffering from a little winter puffiness, you ought to be able to fit into those summer suits or dresses by starting proper eating now. Simply increase your consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables, and cut down on the notorious weight-building foods.



The likelyhood of the Court's rul ing being effective for the school year 1954-55 here is remote as the Court has yet to hear problems in court set for next October. Mr. Mor-ris and the local trustees indicated they would wait for a ruling by the

State Board of Education.

Having lived so many years in deep east and south Texas, we can picture the upheaval in schools like Giddings, Calvert, Caldwell, Hearne Bremond, etc. where the Negro school population is very large

The white South's real aim in past segregation has been to keep from sliding into a position of being a minority race in a sea of "blacks" and keep a bluff on the Negro for political and economic

advantages. We doubt if there are Southern Negroes of responsibility in Texas who welcome this decis-ion as one of IMMEDIATE execution . . . rather he would see his race grow into added responsibility ... which it is doing. . . rapidly. The big push of the Negro's climb up the democratic ladder in America has come from smarty-pants Yankee Negroes and politicians (some in Texas) who covet the ica has c Yankee

very large potential Negro vote.

As in any general sampling of population, there are to be found a few bad specimens. A good American will not measure the many Negroes by the few who are a discredit to the many.

We like Negroes. As a child we had for many years a Negro man of advanced age as a personal nurse. Uncle Dan was a playmate, dad and mother rolled into one. Since then some of our BEST friends have been Negroes . . . the lovable Southern variety. They are far more loyal generous. unselfish and religious than many races the white people "accept." They are splendid cooks, good athletes, good students and one of the most musical races on earth. They have some ways that you may not under-stand such as "borrowing" what is not theirs and they seldom bother with marriage or divorce -or at least a generation ago. Something of the old South will be gone with the wind when

Negro is equal . . and doesn't be-long to a white family . . . as a child belongs to the family circle. Such is progress . . . but we are too old now to approve with our heart ... our mind tells us the decision is just, however. If we were a Négro like Uncle Dan ... we would weep ... for equality has replaced LOVE.
