Mrs. E. B. M. Cook's problem wasn't automation. It was the lack of it.

Mrs. Cook is in charge of bioogics production at the Texas State Department of Health, which annually distributes some 300,000 sealed vials of smallpox vaccine and 30h,000 separtely sealed smallpox vaccine needles. Filling and sealing uesed to be done by hand, but those tedious, time consuming days are gone forever. A machine to do the job was

not available commercially, so Mrs. Cook explained her problem to two of the department's shop staff, Grover Kenyon and Pete Ezba. A few days ago they delivered their brain child -- a device which in one hour duplicates the work of three people working eight hours a day for two days. Using a jet stream of air it fills and seals 9. 000 capillary tsbes per hour, all automatically.

Estimated cost of the machine if it could be purchased commercially: \$3,000. Cost to the department: About \$400 plus labor. -0-

This year is already shaping up as a bad one for measles, but state health officials aren't surprised. A survey of the state's measles pattern for the past 20 years shows the disease usually is up one year and down the next.

This is slated to be the "up' year, since 1959 was comparatively mild with only 37,000 cases report-ed for the entire 12 months. For the week ending Feb. 20 the State Health Department tallied an ag-gragate of 1.664 cases. bringing the 1960 total to date to 11,708 compared with less than 5,000 cases for the same period last year.


