the first year of life have dropped from more than 71 per thousand to less than 30 deaths per thousand

During the same period, maternal deaths and stillbirths have been reduced from 6.9 per thousand to less than 0.5 so far this year.

Current indications are that death rates will continue to improve as increased health standards become more commonplace thruout Texas. Making Texans health - conscious is the king sized job of many divisions within the State Health Department. A division concerned, not so much with life and death, but nevertheless with a highly important aspect of Texas health, is the division of Mental Health.

They are responsible for the mental health program of preven-tion in Texas. Primary focus of the program is on community mental health services, and have been in operation for nine years.


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

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### No Skeeters Pester Ormond Beach, Fla., After Experiments •

ORMOND BEACH, Fla.-There are no mosquitos left in this small village, reports Dr. Morton C. Kahn, Cornell university medical college professor.

Last spring, the insects were so thick in town that the residents dared venture outside only when it was necessary. Mayor Leo Foley heard of Dr. Kahn's experiments and invited the professor to help Ormond Beach rid itself of mosquitos. Dr. Kahn promised to experiment

Dr. Kahn took his assistants, Dr. William Offenhauser Jr., Dr. Daniel Alvarez and Edward Berg, all of the department of public health of the medical college, and his equipment. The equipment, on which Dr. Kahn has been working for 14 years, consists of a record ing device, a phonograph and loudspeaker, and an electrically charged grill.

In Ormond Beach the scientists captured specimens of aedes taeniorhychus, bothering Ormond Beach by day, and aedes sollicitans, bothering the village by night. They recorded the lowpitched love cry of a female of each insect. Then they set up the grill in front of the loudspeaker and turned the electricity on. Mosquitos were lured from miles around, and they perished on the grill as they plunged headlong intothe loudspeaker.

Earlier tests indicated that the siren voice of the female mosquito lured only males to their deaths. Dr. Kahn said. The new tests indicated that females also were lured by female mosquito voice re-

Coffee 'Sneak' Becomes 'Break' in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES—The first municipal recognition of man's inalienable right to drink a cup of coffee during working hours on the bosses' time is working out fine for both the City of Los Angeles and its 15,000 employees, according to Samuel Leask, Jr., administrative officer.

Los Angeles became the first U.S. city to legalize coffee breaks for municipal workers when it passed an ordinance authorizing employees to take 15 minutes each morning and afternoon at no loss of pay on time to themselves. Previously, city workers had been permitted to take such breaks but the time was deducted from their lunch periods when—and if—employees reported it.

According to Leask, replacement of the coffee "sneak" with the regulated coffee break has been a decided "plus" operation for the city.

city.

"The purpose of making the coffee breaks legal and regulated was to increase work output and thus promote efficiency and economy in the conduct of city business," he said. "After several months of observation, it certainly seems to be working out that way.

"Just like the coffee break in offices and factories, our city rest periods have ended time-wasting sneak outs' and other abuses which were costly to taxpayers."

"He did catch it," replied the youngster, "but it got away."

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
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
