Studies Shows Travels Of Fish

An indolent white bass, with a penchant for being caught by wome anglers has speeded the lake Texoma research program.

According to Aquatic Biologist Ed Bonn, stationed at Denison, the fish was netted and tagged December 29 last year. It was caught by Mrs. Howard Shires of Pottsboro on March 18 in precisely the same spot it had been released.

Mrs. Shires, after recording the tag data for a report to Biologist Bonn, turned the fish loose. On April 17th it was caught again in the same place, this time by Mrs. J. F. Roberts of Pottsboro, who threw the specimen back after making notes on its tag number, location of the catch and so forth.

All of the three fish were caught on minnows. Most of the 13 tagged fish caught to date showed little movement but one Number 1099, which was tagged and released January 24 and caught March 15 had covered twelve miles.

Tahoka Co-op Gets Loan

A loan of \$1,700,000 to the Lynteger Electric Cooperative of Tahoka has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration. R. E. A. informed Sen. Tom Connally this week. The money will be used to build 150 miles of new line to bring service to 200 new consumers and to make other system improvements.

The co-op operates in nine counties, Lynn, Terry, Garza, Hockley, Borden, Martin, Gaines, Dawson and Yoakum.

**Heart Disease Is A Big Killer**

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox has forecast the death this year of some 30,000 Texans due to heart and blood vessel disease. Twenty thousand will be men, and at least half the total figure both men and women will be less than 70 years old.

The problem of worn out hearts thickened blood vessels, and kidney disorders is an old one, he asserted, but said the longer length of average life isn't the whole reason for the great number of heart disease deaths.

To prove that point he quoted these figures: Of the 30,000 Texans that cardiovascular (heart and blood vessel) disease will kill in 1952, about 15,000 will be less than 70 years old, 700 will be in their 30's, 2,000 will be in their 40's, 4,500 in their 50's and at least 7,000 in their 60's.

Since 1941, the male death rate has exceeded the female rate by something like 70 percent, the health officer said. For those 75 and over the risk of death from heart disease is a fourth again as great for men as it is for women. These ever increasing deaths to heart, kidney, and blood vessel disorders have been observed for the last 20 or 40 years.

"If a statewide heart program is to develop," he declared, "it will be necessary that there be provided a professional coordinating committee that will counsel on program procedures and give necessary directions on essential medical services."

He credited the American Heart Association with "successfully influencing" fund appropriations, and for formulating a heart control program for the nation.

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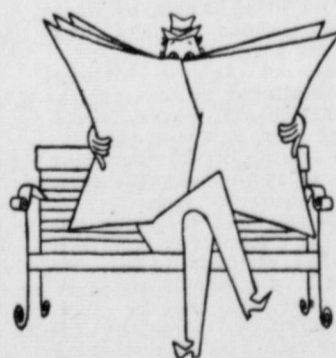

Aid For Disabled Veterans Cited

More than 30,000 disabled veterans who have to wear orthopedic braces because of disabilities suffered in service may now get emergency repairs to those braces without prior Veterans Administration approval VA announces today.

These veterans are suffering from a variety of disabilities including paralysis of arms and legs from spinal cord injuries, gun shot wounds, unattended fractures, and polio. VA Regional Offices already have begun to issue a new "Prosthetic Service Card-Orthopedic Braces" to each eligible veteran, entitling him to new services. In the West Texas Region, served by the Lubbock Regional Office of the VA, there are approximately 450 disabled veterans who wear orthopedic braces and will be eligible for the issuance of this new card, according to Robert W. Sisson, Manager.

Sea Horses At Rockport

The Marine Laboratory operated by Texas Game and Fish Commission at Rockport, has an unusually good supply of sea horses for the foment, according to Chief Marine Biologist Jack Baughman.

Fifteen of the odd shaped species were taken in two hauls of the shell dredge in these bay off Rockport.

The largest of these was only six inches long. Those taken off the Florida coast oftentimes reach 12 inches.

For what it is worth sea horses relish daphnia. When fed in their tanks, they snap their jaws very audibly over the delicacy.

Marine Biologist Howard T. Lee noted that the sea horse fish and the cowfish also don't look alike. The horsefish is a stringy looking thing with a long tail. The cowfish is shaped fuch like a crappie and has a hard shell.

Liming Acid Soils Is Must for Good Legumes

If your alfalfa fields show yellow streaks where growth is sparse and gangy, the cause is probably a shortage of lime in the soil.

The light, bare streaks on the alfalfa field near Evansville, Wisconsin, shown in the above photograph, were due to soil acidity that hadn't been corrected by liming. The spreader truck had lapped too wide when the field was being limed and some areas didn't get any.

The thick alfalfa growth came from parts of the field that were limed.

Agronomists emphasize that liming acid soils is a "must" if you want to get efficient results from the fertilizer you add. Acid won't produce good legume yields, they say, even if plenty of fertilizer is used. They point out that the entire alfalfa field was fertilized with 400 pounds per acre of 0-20-20.



Note the thick and light alfalfa growth in the above picture caused by uneven application of lime.

Liming helped the fertilizer increase alfalfa hay yields 4 1/2 times and the protein yields by 5 1/2 times.

Hay yields on the limed soil averaged 5,100 pounds per acre, compared with 1,400 pounds on the acid soil. Alfalfa hay from the limed soil had a 14.5 per cent protein content, with a total yield of 886 pounds per acre; from the unlimed soil the hay had an 11.5 per cent protein content, with a total protein yield of 161 pounds per acre.

advice to the county judge, Commissioner's Court, and other officials. It includes private practice of civil criminal law, as well as 15 months of actual experience as county judge.

You may recall that in 1940, the voters chose me county judge from a field of four candidates. Only 11 months of my term was completed before Pearl Harbor which resulted in my resignation four months later to be inducted into the Army. While I enjoyed serving as county judge that war-shorened first term, this is the first election since my Army discharge that I have believed the circumstances were right to ask for that office again.

I am grateful to the voters for having chosen me for county office in three elections, two as attorney and one as judge. Should you choose me again in my duty as chairman of the Commissioners Court, as trial judge, and in all of the various duties of the office, I will endeavor to see that you benefit in more efficient service from the experience I have gained by serving you in the past.

Beef Cattle Numbers Lag Behind Population Trend

Beef cattle numbers in the United States have increased during the past three years. The increases: In 1949, 2.5 per cent; 1950, 9 per cent; 1951, 13 per cent. The 52.3 million head on hand January 1 this year are 26 per cent above the number reported on January 1, 1949 and an all time high. These figures include all cattle except those considered milk cows.

However, building to this total resulted in a marked decrease of animals for slaughter, thus increasing beef supplies. Other things being equal, lower prices would be expected to result.

It appears likely that in 1952 and for a number of years ahead, increased numbers of cattle are likely to go to slaughter, thus increasing beef supplies. Other things being equal, lower prices would be expected to result.

Human population in the country is currently increasing at the rate of about 2 per cent per year—a rate substantially below the rate of increase in cattle numbers.

Cattlemen may find themselves vulnerable from three standpoints in the next year or so: (1) Any weakening demand resulting from a downward change in consumer income; (2) drought range conditions which would cause widespread herd liquidations; or (3) a shortage of feed concentrates which would limit demand for range animals.

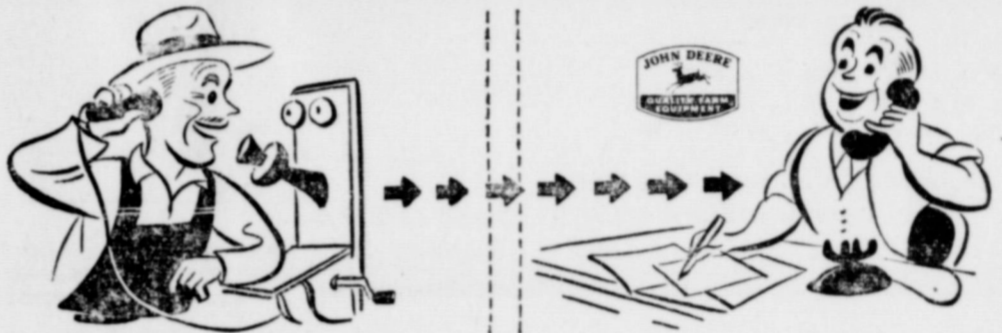

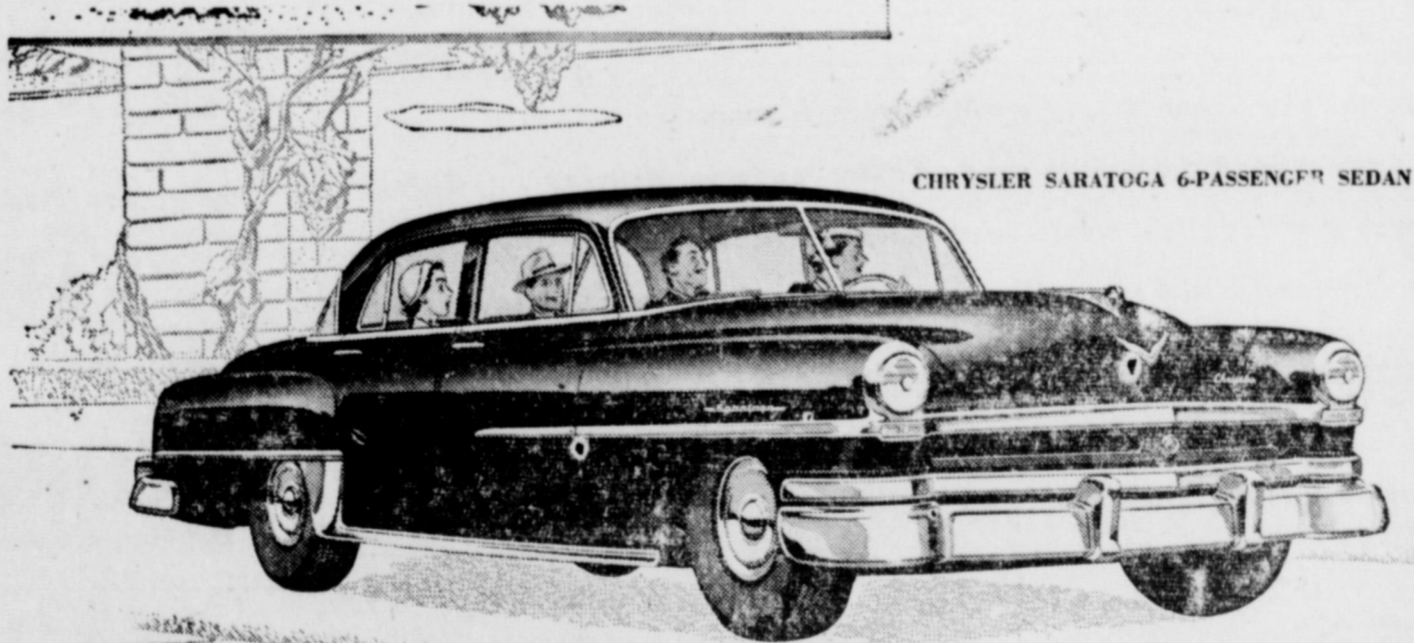
