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

"If you sell your 1940 cotton loan equity, be sure to get all it's worth," was the advice Fred M. McGinty. chairman of the Lynn county AAA committee, issued to cotton producers today.

"The relatively high domestic demand for cotton resulting from the defense program and the recent substantial increase in the price of spot cotton have made it possible for cotton producers to dispose of their 1940 cotton equities at substantial profits," the chairman de-

Reports have reached the county office, however, that certain abuses have developed in the disposal of the equities, particularly in the use of Commodity Credit Corporation Form R, which is provided by the CCC to be used to record the transfer of the producer's interest in the loan to the buyer.
