### Remember These Facts When Planting Fall Gardens

Fall Gardens

Cabbage and lettuce seed should
be started in a small plant bed in a
protected spot. In three of four
weeks the plants will be large enough
for transplanting to the permanent
location in the garden.

Lice are often troublesome in fall
gardens but they can be practically
avoided by planting Swiss chard and
the Shogoin or lice-proof type
to bug damage.

Tiny worms which attack young
cabbage plants can be killed by the
following spray mixture theroughly
tested by the U. S. Department of
Agriculture: 1:2 pound of Paris
green and 1 pound of potash fish oil
soap to 16 gallons of water. This
spray can be applied to almost all
leafy vegetables that insects are
feeding upon and will effect a safe
control. There is not enough polson
in the mixture to cause any demange
the bugs.

The potatoes should remain in the water just long enough to become thoroughly wet. One quart of ethylene chlorhydrin in eight gallons of water is sufficient to treat ten bushels of Irish potatoes.
