> NUMBER OF FARMS IN COUNTY **ON INCREASE, CENSUS SHOWS**

Final statistics for 4925 released to the public last week by the United States Bureau of Census show that in that year Lynn county had 757 individual farms, a gain of 83 over the census figures of 1920 when 674 farms were listed and a gain of 556 over 1910 when there were 201 farms. In other words, there was a gain of over 376 per cent in number

of farms during the 15 years. Of the 757 farms in the county, all were operated by white men, the census failing to list a single colored farmer in the county. A total of 385 farms were operated by the owners themselves, 17 by part ownshow that the number of tenants on



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



Owin to the responsibility that the Thurberia weevil may be harbored y wild cotton plants, the interstate novement of these plants, known as Thurberia, from any point in Arizona, is prohibited.

The revision of the pink bollworm quarantine covers eleven counties of outhwestern Texas, seven counties of southwestern Neew Meexico, and three counties of southwestern Arizona. The requirements are similar to those governing the movement of cotton from the Thurberia weevil infested areas in Arizona, except that seed cotton, cottonseed and cottonseed hulls, while prohibited movement to outside points, may, under certain conditions, be moved interstate under permit between regulated areas in the three states concerned.

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
