TAHOKA, Texas, Dec. 12 (Spl.)—Following their return from Austin, where they went the first of the week to interview members of the state highway commission, members of the commissioners court of Lynn county began procuring rights of way Thursday morning for the highway designated a few months ago extending from Tahoka through Wilson to the Lubbock county line near Slaton.

Rights-of-way are also being procured for the highway extending west from O'Donnell to a point where it crosses the Lynn-Dawson line near Welch. This work was begun some time ago and a number of rights-of-way deeds for this stretch of highway have been procured already.

The court hopes to be able to procure the entire right-of-way for each of these new highways before the first of January.

Judge P. W. Goad and Commissioners Waldo McLaurin, Tom Hale, Sam Holland, and George Small made the trip to Austin Monday and returned Wednesday. They met in regular session here Monday morning and decided to interview the highway commission before taking any steps preparatory to the hard-surfacing of these highways in Lynn county.

They were encouraged by the highway commission to procure the rights-of-way at once with a view to voting bonds a little later for the paving of these highways and possibly other roads in the county. The Commission gave them absolutely no encouragement, however, to expect to procure funds from the State any time soon for the paving of these highways, as the demands upon the State already are many times as great as the available or prospective funds can meet.

Skeleton Of "Indian" Is Unearthed Here

A skeleton, believed to be that of an Indian, was unearthed near here Monday. The bones were found underneath a cliff and were in a good state of preservation.

Ben Moore, local newspaper correspondent; H. Gilley, district Boy Scout executive and others uncovered the bones after the skull had been found shortly before by three boys in search of a Christmas tree.

It is believed by Moore that the burial was made about 50 years ago.

Christmas Mail Suggestions Given

Since the Christmas mailing season is practically underway, we think it a fitting time to pass a few suggestions to our patrons which will help them mail their parcels and cards with utmost confidence and safety that they will be delivered safely and quickly. If these suggestions are carried out by the patrons of this office and of the public at large, it will not only result in more expedient delivery of parcels and cards but will also save the P. O. Dept. the time that it ordinarily has to spend in dealing with parcels and cards that are improperly addressed or improperly wrapped. In preparing your Christmas parcels, please:

Wrap them securely in strong paper and tie with plenty of good string.

Address them plainly on one side only.

Do not seal them with gummed paper, Christmas seals, etc., because that will make them subject to first class rate (which is 3 cents for each ounce).

Do not send breakable gifts unless they are wrapped so well that you can literally "jump up and down" on them without damaging them. Parcels are handled so many times and come into contact with so many heavy sacks of mail that unless they are wrapped and packed so that they can really "take it," they will undoubtedly be broken.

Mail them early, and thus keep them out of the Christmas rush that reaches its peak about two days before Christmas.

In regard to Christmas cards, which are usually mailed at the third class rate of postage (unsealed, 1 1/2 cents for each two ounces), let us suggest that they be mailed at the first class, or letter, rate of postage (3 cents per ounce or fraction of an ounce) this year for the following reasons:

Farmers Approve Triple-A Program

TAHOKA, Texas, Dec. 12 (Spl.)—The Triple-A program submitted to the cotton farmers of the South was approved by a vote of more than 12 to 1 according to incomplete returns published Monday. The vote as tabulated at that time was 761,117 for the proposal and 61,408 against it.

By no means was a full vote cast. This was due largely, no doubt, to the general belief that the proposal would be approved overwhelmingly and many did not take the trouble to go to the polls. It may be that quite a considerable percent of the farmers did not vote because they did not fully approve the program. At any rate, possibly not more than a million farmers went to the polls whereas about 2,250,000 were eligible to vote.

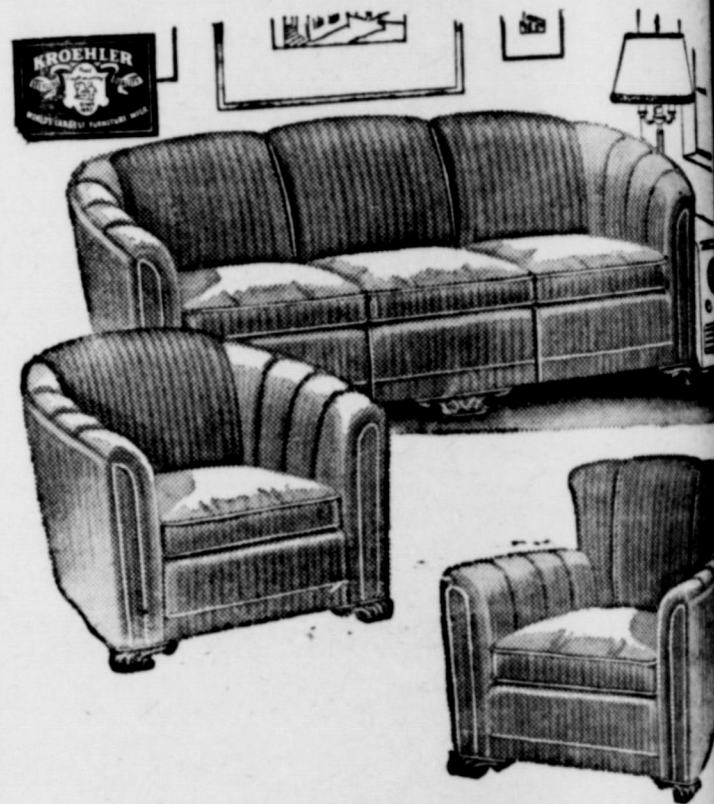
