Plaintiffs in the suit filed against Emmett L. Galloway, doing business as Galloway Casing & Pulling Co., are the survivors of Roy Lee Goin; his wife and their children, Leah Mosely of Baird and Gary Goin of Waco.

The survivors of Michael Ronolin Warren, 26, Abilene Christian College senior and Bible teacher at Abilene Christian High School, filed suit for \$500,000 the week after the explosion.

Clyde Fire Dept. Raises \$7,000 At Auction

CLYDE — Over \$7,000 was taken in during the all-day fund raising activities for the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department last Saturday.

Continental Telephone Expanding Central Office



BAIRD — Construction site of the Continental Telephone Company exchange building, to expand the present Central Office Building. Completion date for the building is June 1st, and should be in service by Aug. 14th.

BAIRD — Continental Telephone Company of Texas is in the process of a construction project in the Baird Exchange. This project will expand the present Central Office Building 360 sq. ft. and install 200 new lines and 100 new telephone numbers. Six additional fire reporting circuits will be installed for expansion of existing fire reporting system. The completion date for the building is June 1st, and should be in service by August 1st.

Stan McCormick, Facilities Supervisor, stated the existing Central Office is engineered for normal operation with 75 percent capacity and is 99 percent full. This overload has created some of the problems customers in Baird have been experiencing, on completion of the expansion it will relieve existing telephone overload problems.

If you should experience a "no dial tone condition" you should hang up and try again later. "Flicking the hookswitch" does nothing but tie up additional equipment in the office causing additional "no dial tone" for other customers.

The telephone company has similar construction programs underway in Cross Plains, Rising Star and Clyde.

LEGAL NOTICE

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tabo, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

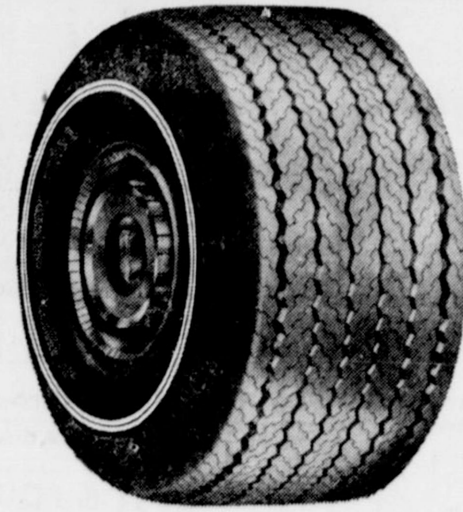

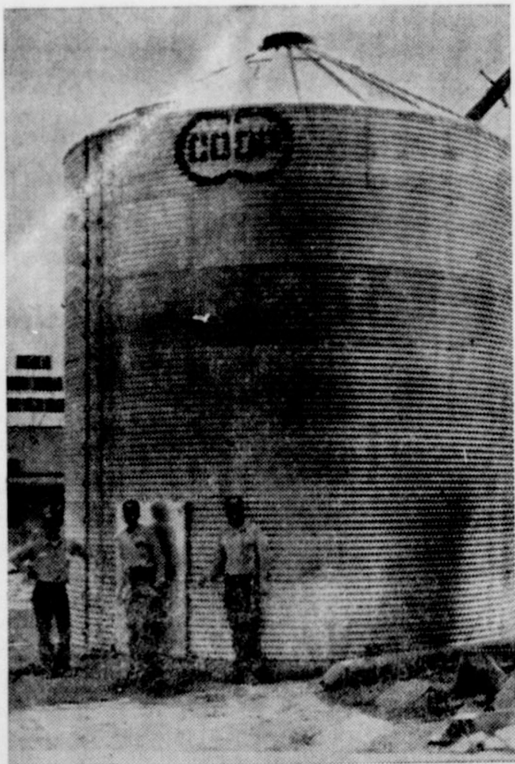

Clyde Varsity Ties For 3rd At Anson

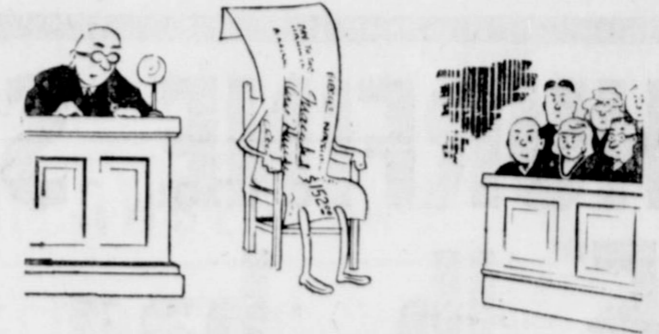
CLYDE — The Varsity track team tied for 3rd place at the Anson meet last Saturday with 53 1/2 points.

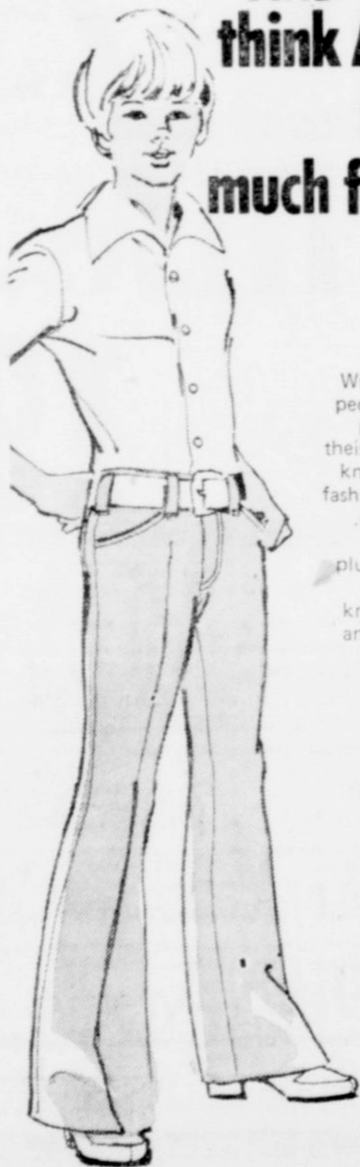
