Lynn County Taxes Cut 12-1-2 Per Cent

Announcement was made this week from the Commissioners' Court that Lynn county taxes will be cut ten cents on the hundred dollars valuation, or according to the rate, twelve and one-half per cent.

This has been made possible by an intensive efficiency and economy program during the past few years, resulting in the accumulation of a surplus of \$6,000 in the General Fund, \$10,000 in the Court and Jail Fund, and \$3,000 in the Jury Fund.

Index readers will recall that some nine years ago, property valuations were cut \$1.50 per acre. The above reduction is over and above that of 1931.

Perhaps we are prejudiced, but we feel that the present Commissionery Court is to be highly commended indeed, and that every effort should be toward furthering the program of county government now in force. Congratulations and hearty thanks to the Court.

Electric Lines Are Considered

Lynette Electric Cooperative, Inc., serving seven counties with 650 miles of high line, has authority from Rural Electrical administration to set up a third section of 200 miles of high line to serve parts of Lynn, Pennington, and Garrettsville counties, a statement from the office of Superintendent, says.

The concern is now serving communities in Lynn, Terry, Garza, Hockley, Martin, Dawson and Borden counties, the latter three having recently been energized.

Under the proposed set-up, it will be possible for the cooperative to build high lines to serve not less than three persons to a mile, or a minimum income of \$7.50 a month per mile, according to Edward P. Price, consulting engineer.

Oklahoma City, Aug. 12.—Vice President Charles E. Beard announced Monday that Braniff Airways, Inc., net passenger revenue for July was \$153,065.06, compared with \$80,062.81 for the same month last year.

Duck Season Given 15 Days Extension

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes today lengthened the duck hunting season by 15 days because of large increases in the number of those game birds.

The order, extending the season from 45 to 60 days, also included geese, coot and duck snipes. How-

ever, it provided shorter seasons on woodcock and reduced the bag limit on geese, mourning dove and whitewinged dove.

In the Northern zone the hunting season will be Oct. 1 to Nov. 29; in the Intermediate zone Oct. 16 to Dec. 14; and in the Southern zone Nov. 2 to Dec. 31. All rates are inclusive.

The Intermediate zone this year includes New Mexico, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma.

The Southern zone includes Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas and Arizona.

Daily shooting hours for waterfowl and coot hunters will be from sunrise until 4 p. m. instead of from seven a. m. to four p. m. Jack snipes may be taken from sunrise to sunset.

The daily bag limit on geese, reduced last year from five to four, has been lowered to three. The bag limit on ducks remains at ten a day.

The number of waterfowl that may be possessed at any time is \$1.

limited to two days' bag, but new rule this year makes it possible to possess the legal limit for days after the close of the season instead of 10 days.

The daily bag limit on coot and on jack snipes is 15.

Special protection is afforded cyasbacks, redheads, buffleheads and ruddy ducks by limiting numbers of any one of these species that may be included in the bag to three and providing that more than three of this entire group may be taken in one day.

A closed season throughout United States and Alaska is continued on wood ducks, bow geese, swan.

Hunters may use bow and arrow or shotguns not larger than gauge. The three-shell limit on repeating shotguns is continued.

All persons over 16 must carry an unexpired federal migratory bird hunting stamp. These duck stamps may be purchased at postoffices for \$1.
