

Origin Of Peace Rose Told

The 1946 Study Club would like to share with its friends and neighbors the FABULOUS STORY OF THE VERY LOVELY PEACE ROSE. Most legends are as old but here is a new legend - one created in our own lifetime.

The facts are so very amazing that they sound like fiction. The story begins in France in 1935. The object of Francis Meiland was to create a hardy copper-colored rose with robust and decorative foliage. There was nothing at this time about this little seedling to attract special attention except in October 1936 the eyes of the buds had produced the desired foliage.

In 1939, still unnamed, these eyes had produced huge and lovely blooms and was the sensation of the season. Some of the budwood had been sent to firms in Germany and Italy and when war broke out in September, these firms had named this rose "Gloria Dei" and "Gloia".

Meiland named it "Mme. A Meiland". Budwood was smuggled out of France in the diplomatic pouch of the American consul in Lyons, France, and finally reached the Conrad Pyle Nursery in Pennsylvania on the day that Germany threatened to sink any United States ship that entered the war zone.

Because this was such a lovely rose, a name was sought for it in America. After suggestions had come from all over these United States, the judges chose a name and decided to christen it the day of the Pasadena Rose Show.

The amazing part of the story is that, although the date was chosen in advance, this rose was christened "PEACE" on the day Berlin fell. Because the delegates of the United Nations Conference meeting in San Francisco were seeking a means of maintaining peace in the world, the American Rose Society decided to let the "Peace" rose make its first public appearance there.

The date was set and rose growers worked hard to get the right stages of bloom. On this set date, a date set well in advance, the head delegate from each country found a "Peace" rose in his hotel room presented by the American Rose Society. That day, friends, was the great V. E. DAY.

Then, to continue this story, there were dates chosen to announce the All-American winners. That year the Peace rose was the only winner and the day that was chosen long in advance to announce the winner was the GREAT DAY the world knows as V. J. DAY.

And in 1951 the American Rose Association presented the Gold Medal to the Peace Rose, the first to win it, and the date, chosen long in advance, was the day the treaty was signed with Japan.

So the lovely Peace Rose, is truly American and represents all that she stands for. We, as members of the 1946 Study Club, are hoping that you are planning to plant this lovely rose in your yard regardless where you might live.

Three years of research on rust resistant small grain varieties by Texas A. and M. NEGRO WILL DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Bennie Lee McIntyre, a 19 year old Negro who was found guilty on May 19, 1961 for raping a young white lady, has been sentenced to die Dec. 21 by District Judge Trust Smith in Lynn County District Court. When found guilty of rape, McIntyre received a death penalty verdict. The Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the district court verdict in March of this year and the U. S. STATE WILL SUPERVISE RADIO ACTIVE MATERIALS

Austin - Early in January Gov. Price Daniel and Dr. Glenn Seaborg of the Atomic Energy Commission will meet in the Senate Chamber at the Texas Capitol where each will sign an important legal document. The document will be a formal contract between the Federal Government and the State of Texas. And it will be full of legal words and phrases usually found in such contracts.

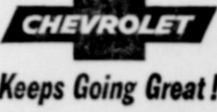
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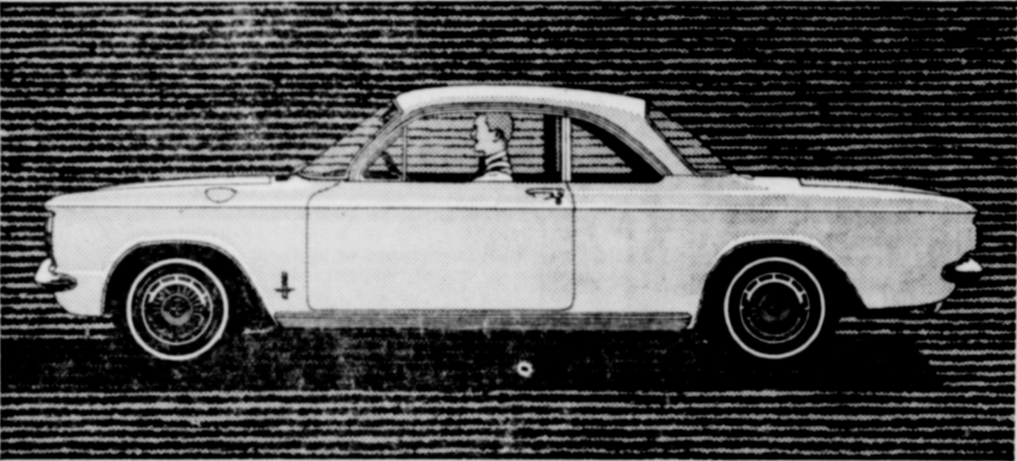


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**SILENT KILLER FEATURES WINTER SEASON**

Austin— Each winter brings its toll of deaths from carbon monoxide, the killer gas loosed wherever fuel is used to power cars, cook meals or to dull the chill edge of weather. It claimed the lives of 42 Texans last year, and will undoubtedly strike again and again at the unwary this winter just as it did recently in the small North Texas garage.

The temperature was in the high 30's and a brisk north wind was blowing when the head mechanic reported for work that morning. Char and cemented every corner of the open shop and had seeped into the concrete floor. No wonder the mechanic's helper pulled closed the sliding door when he came in a few minutes later. That single act was the instrument of one death and one near-death from carbon monoxide that built up in the unventilated garage.

The State Health Department engineers report that carbon monoxide is a very real occupational hazard among garagemen this time of year. Why was not the North Texas garage equipped with a vent pipe leading to the outside to which the exhaust of idling cars could be attached? The question can't be answered. It is a fact that this very sensible practice is common in northern garages, but rare in Texas despite the extremes in weather.

Carbon monoxide does its damage with lightning speed. A car running for five minutes in a garage 20x30x10 will release enough carbon dioxide to cause serious physical effects.

Any fuel containing carbon can produce carbon dioxide. This is true of solid fuels such as coal or charcoal or wood. It is true of liquid fuels as oil, gasoline and kerosene. It is true of gaseous fuels as natural and manufactured gas.

Unvented space heaters in homes are particularly hazardous. They work well when the room is properly ventilated but in closed rooms they quickly burn up the oxygen which in turn permits a build up of the lethal gas.

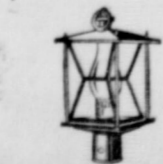
