

Study Basic Needs Before Buying Linens

HOUSES are not the only ones who will be putting in a stock of household linens. Homemakers who have been keeping house for ten years may well find that their stocks need replenishing.

Buying linens these days needs thought, care, study and some background of knowledge. As in anything, you do not buy by price alone. You do not even buy by size alone. You must know something about such things as thread count, absorbency, machine stitches per inch, and all sorts of things which you may never have considered.

Before considering these aspects of buying, check your supplies against what is deemed a minimum practical wardrobe for each bed. This includes six sheets, three pillowcases per pillow, two mattress pads, one winter bedspread, one summer bedspread, one summer blanket and winter blankets according to the climate.

Good Linens Contribute To Well Being

If you've ever slept on a bed in which the sheet barely covered the surface, you'll know the importance of intelligent selection. Sheets not only protect the mattress, but they contribute to comfort and well-being.

Although spoken of as linens, few women have sheets of actual linen. Cotton is used most frequently because it wears and launders well and absorbs moisture readily.

Read labels carefully

It's estimated that good cotton sheets will wear through several hundred launderings. Whether the sheet is muslin or percale is not the question, since each has different weights and qualities.

Most women choose good quality percale for their "best"; for everyday wear, a good quality muslin is the accepted buy.

Consult Labels

When Buying Sheets

There's important information on labels, for women who want the most value when buying sheets and pillowcases. Generally speaking, the higher the thread count, the higher the quality and price of the sheet.

Threads per square inch means the total number of threads lengthwise and crosswise. You'll find some sheets rated at 180, and some low as 112.

To buy linens intelligently, the yarn count is low and weight high, note the amount of sizing. If

it is 10 per cent or more, you have a poor quality sheet.

The breaking strength of a sheet will tell you how long the sheet will wear. When the count is low the wear is less than when the count is high.

Select a sheet of the proper size for the bed. A standard double bed requires a sheet 81 by 108 inches in size. It should not be less than 99 inches long to satisfactorily cover the bed.

Single beds require a 65-inch wide sheet while three-quarter beds need a 72-inch width.

Look for adequate hems on sheets as well as pillowcases to give best wear.

White has been the generally accepted color for sheets for a long time. However, luscious pastels are now obtainable, if you want them. The colored sheets with matching cases are usually available only in the higher priced muslins and percales.

Ex-Presidents Could Be Used

Might Hold Senate Advisory Position

WASHINGTON.—Herbert Hoover believes that former Presidents might well hold advisory seats in the senate, although he himself wishes no such office.

His view on the suggestion that Presidents retire into senatorial memberships were reported in an interview. It answers one question not included in the exhaustive report by the commission on organization of the executive branch of the government, which Mr. Hoover heads.

"I don't think it would do any harm," the former President said. "I think it would do good. I don't want to go there at my time of life, but I think, as an addition to the efficiencies of the government, it would be greatly worth-while for the future. Any former President carries a lot of seasoned experience which would aid the legislative side. It would be a good thing to do."

"Could that be done with our Constitution?" he was asked.

"I understand that it could be done by statutory law," Mr. Hoover went on, "provided the former President had no vote. He could have the privilege of debate, office assistants and a salary."

In questions and answers devoted to the Hoover commission's report, Mr. Hoover said that the program worked out by some 200 prominent private individuals on his "task forces" and a paid staff of another 300 persons indicated eventual savings of about \$4,000,000 annually. Personally he said he thought the savings certainly would exceed \$3,000,000,000 and might touch \$5,000,000,000.

At the same time, he stated firmly that the suggested reorganization would not contribute to centralization of control in the Presidency.

"We are here considering administrative authority, not political power," he said. "It puts him (the President) in authority as definite as the president of a corporation as the president of a board of directors, which is the congress. This is a thoroughly American concept."

Inside Story

INSIDE STORY on the house slash of some 15 per cent from the appropriation for European recovery administration funds runs something like this: The administration has been told by the department of commerce and the committee on economic advisors to the President that the national income in 1950 will be definitely lower than now—some say 18 billion dollars lower than 1949. But some Democratic leaders declare that the budgets for domestic appropriations have been squeezed until there is little water left in them, so it will be impossible to slash domestic expenditures which, after all, amount to a very small percentage of the total overall federal budget. The story is that these leaders say that it will be politically more advantageous to pass the domestic appropriation measures as is than to cut them in the election year of 1950.

But, on the other hand, a realistic group in the house and senate, cognizant of the imminent drop in national income, declare that a cut in federal expenditures is absolutely essential if a tax increase is to be avoided, and it should be avoided.

So, although the administration is not going to consent publicly, the slashes in ECA funds will be permitted to go through on the theory that lower prices in the offing may make up for some of the cuts and that there will be less reverberations from the electorate than if domestic appropriations were pared.

With Senate Majority Leader Scott Lucas committed to keeping congress in session until the "major" points in President Truman's legislative program "are disposed of," the makings of a full-scaled row are shaping up.

Already the administration has shelved some of its "must" bills in order to get to the Taft-Hartley repeal measure, an admittedly red-hot subject. Congressional leaders agreed it would be three weeks before this issue came to a showdown. That would mean the labor question might not be settled until around July 1. With a majority of legislators already on record as favoring adjournment early in August, Senator Lucas may find his hands full in keeping the lawmakers beyond that time, despite the status of the President's revised "must" program at that time.

An obvious indication of the powder-keg potentials in congress is the administration's willingness to put aside consideration of the North Atlantic pact in the senate, so the labor bill could have the right-of-way. In law-making assemblages where the administration has the whip-hand, delays such as that on major questions are not necessary. If the votes are there, then the measures proposed can be passed. Where there is uncertainty and one side or the other must make the best of a bad deal, compromise is the only way. . . .

'Bum' Is No Slander to Tenant

Is it Slander to Call A Man a "Bum"

An apartment house tenant had a strong dislike for several of the other occupants. As time went by, all of them moved out except one. When he met this last holdout in the back yard one day, the tenant exclaimed: "You are the last of the bum tenants in this building!"

the bum tenants in this building!" The other man sued for damages, saying that he had been slandered by being described as a "bum." However, the court denied his claim. The judge said that, so long as no tangible harm was done, the word "bum" wasn't such a serious accusation after all!

May All Children be Forced To Go to Public Schools?

A state law was passed requiring all students between the ages of 8 and 16 to attend public schools. A private school promptly filed a test case, claiming that such a law was unconstitutional. The state officials explained that they wished to give the same kind of education to all children. However, the court held the law unconstitutional, violating "the liberty of parents to direct the upbringing and education of their children." The judge said the state had no power "to standardize its children by forcing them to accept instruction from public school teachers only."

After a Convict Serves His Sentence, May He be Forced to Leave the Vicinity?

A convicted criminal served his term in the state penitentiary and was duly discharged. He soon found a job in a gas station near the prison. One day, he was arrested again. It seems there was a state law requiring discharged convicts to leave the county within 24 hours after their release. However, at the trial, the court held the law unconstitutional and ordered the man freed. The judge said it was unfair to impose this additional restraint on a man "after he has paid his debt to society."

If a Cat Kills a Canary, Must The Cat's Owner Pay Damages?

A woman's cat took a strong dislike to a singing canary, kept in the parlor of the house next door. One evening the cat slipped into the



neighbor's house, stole into the parlor, and silenced the canary forever. The neighbor sued the woman for damages, claiming that she must pay for the evil deed done by her pet. However, the court ruled that the woman was not responsible. The judge pointed out that this was an ordinary, peaceful cat, with no special tendency to be vicious. He added that a cat's owner should not be blamed just because the animal occasionally may revert to his "wild nature."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 122

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for reelection proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the County seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law.

wise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year, in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on September 24 1949 at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the County seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3 The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 123

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, by adding a new Section to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949 and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment au-

thorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

Hygiene in the garden is as important to vegetables as cleanliness in the home. Many diseases of vegetables are carried over on the stems, roots, or leaves of the plants which have spent themselves in spring production. Such plants should be dug up and not cut off at ground level.

After cleaning and cloth proofing your clothes, you can store them in trunks, chests or pasteboard boxes, first lined with paper. Be sure the containers are airtight. After placing the garments in the boxes, lay a piece of tissue paper over the top and sprinkle about 4 ounces of paradichlorobenzene crystals on the tissue.



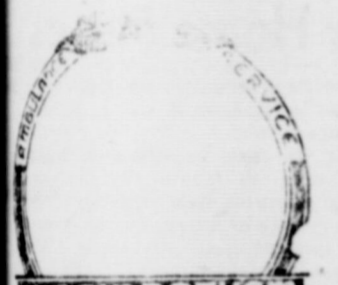

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36
proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the state of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section to be designated as Section 60 reading as follows:
"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide for) the following:
"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and
"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving

the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:
"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."
Sec. 2 That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:
"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and
"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Casey Keeps Faith With His Team

There was a moment late last March down in St. Petersburg, when Casey Stengel was staring moodily into space.

He had sensed the fact that Joe DiMaggio would be out indefinitely—perhaps for a summer. Lindell and Berra were both limping. Charlie Keller was swinging without his old power. Yankee prospects were about as dark as the mouth of a railroad tunnel.

“So far as running the team is concerned,” Casey said, “nothing can happen. I can’t be any big bust with my three coaches—Bill Dickey, Frank Crosetti and Jim Turner. Here are three great fellows who know their stuff. I know they are all for me. I’ve never seen three men work harder. They are the first on the field and they are the last to leave.”

Then Casey smiled. “It means a lot to any manager to have the help of such men,” he said. “They don’t make mistakes. I might—but they won’t.”

The fact is that Casey has made fewer mistakes than any manager I know this season. He has had his team hustling and working overtime. He has picked the right rookies. He has lost the tang his tongue once knew. He has been sympathetic in place of sarcastic. He hasn’t tried to be funny at any man’s expense. He has been a member of his own squad, not an outsider.

Stengel has done a fine job. And as he says, he has had the services of one of the best coaching staffs baseball has ever known.

Bill Dickey would be a helpful, soothing influence on any squad. Bill knows what it’s all about and his advice is a big help. Frank Crosetti is one of the gamest infielders the Yankees ever had. He was always a hustling ball player. He has been a big help. So has Jim Turner, a 20-game winner with the old Boston Braves. Turner has turned in his full share.

So Stengel was right in pinning a wild laurel blossom on each of his aids. It was a nice move by Stengel, a move other managers might not care to make.

Casey has known enough team grief to sink two or three managers. But he has never shown any sign of losing faith in a club that has been the best in the league so far.

Yankees Sans DiMaggio

A day or two ago, I ran across a smart minor leaguer from other days. We began talking about the Yankees without DiMaggio. “This reminds me,” he said, “of something that happened when I was playing ball. We had finished the season before in fourth place. But at the start of the next season we lost our only star. He had a broken leg and was out. So all the papers plastered us down in last place.”

“So we got together. We talked things over. We finally decided that even though this lost player was good, he wasn’t the entire club. We decided to go out and prove it. We fought and hustled harder than we ever did before. We moved into first place. The papers all said we wouldn’t be there long—not with our star missing. That made us hustle all the harder. I can tell you this—if we’d had our star, we wouldn’t have finished third. As it was, we won the pennant.”

The old ballplayer continued to ramble on. “There’s a good chance the Yankee ball club, sneakingly anyway, had gotten tired of hearing that Joe DiMaggio was the entire ball club. After all, there were Raschi, Porterfield, Byrne, Reynolds and others—there were Kayboski and Phillips at first—there were Coleman, Stirnweiss, Rizutto, Brown and Johnson.”

“There was and is a fellow named Tommy Henrich—close to DiMaggio in everything—there were Lindell, and Berra, Woodling and Bauer—not even a Cobb or a Ruth could have been the entire ball club with all these fellows on hand. Most of them are first-class ball players. They must have felt the inside urge to show they could also play some baseball.”

“Here’s another thing. As good as Joe DiMaggio and Tommy Henrich together are—they were not as important as the pitchers. Connie Mack once told me that the pitchers were 70 per cent of any ball club. With or without DiMaggio, the Yankees had a fine pitching staff.”

HOUSEHOLD MEMOS by Lynn Chambers

Plan Colorful Menus, Easily Prepared Food For Holiday Occasions

HOLIDAYS are often hard on a mother because there is not only the whole family home for all meals, but also guests which may number several. Consequently, the lady of the house is so busy with food preparation and consequent clean-up activities that she never has a holiday at all.

If you’re planning to celebrate Independence Day at home, use some of these simple suggestions for meals. The colors and other suggestions are in keeping with the theme of the day, but the food is kept simple by day-before preparation, and by very easy last-minute undertaking.

Weather permitting, serve supper outdoors, and save getting formal about the service as is usually the custom in the dining room. You may use colorful paper plates and napkins, too, thus eliminating much of the dish washing that always comes after eating.

HERE’S an easily prepared menu which may be started the day before:

- Tomato Onion Pie
- Celery Curls
- Carrot Sticks
- Black Olives
- Tutti Frutti Salad
- Ice Cream Cookies Lemonade

How to do: Prepare celery and carrots the day before and refrigerate. Place olives to chill. Prepare salad and place in freezing trays. Make cookies and make or buy the ice cream. An hour or so before dinner, prepare the tomato onion pie, and while it bakes, set the table on garden or porch.

- Tomato Onion Pie (Serves 4-6)
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cups crisp cracker crumbs
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup melted butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cups thinly sliced onion
- 2 tablespoons butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cups canned tomato sauce
- 3 eggs, slightly beaten
- $\frac{1}{2}$ pound sharp American cheese
- 1 teaspoon salt
- $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon pepper

Mix crumbs and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter. Press into nine-inch pie plate to form crust. Bake in a moderate oven (350°) for ten minutes. Fry onions in two tablespoons butter until lightly browned. Bring canned tomato sauce to a boil. Remove from heat and add cheese. Stir well. Add eggs slowly to tomato mixture.

Add salt and pepper. Pour over onions which have been placed in the crumb crust and bake in slow (325°) oven about 45 minutes or until set.

- Tutti Frutti Salad (Serves 6)
- $\frac{1}{2}$ Cup shredded coconut
- 1 cup maraschino cherries, halved
- 2 oranges, sectioned and diced
- 1 cup crushed pineapple, drained
- 2 bananas, diced
- 1 cup whipping cream
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise

Toss together coconut and fruits. Chill and fold in cream which has been whipped. Fold in mayonnaise. Freeze until firm in refrigerator trays. Serve on lettuce cups.



For a porch supper on the Fourth of July you can plan this “patriotic” onion pie which fits into the color scheme of things with its rich red color. The pie has a crumb crust and a filling of canned tomato sauce, onions and cheese.

If you want to serve barbecued frankfurters for a garden supper, these may be used in the following simple menu:

- Barbecued Frankfurters
- Picnic Salad
- Corn on the Cob
- Butter
- Mustard
- Relish
- Fresh Fruit or Berries
- Cookies
- Beverage

Bake the frankfurters in an oven with the sauce, or place them in a skillet so they can be cooked with the sauce on an outside grill. The menu requires little other preparation except for the salad.

- Barbecued Frankfurters (Makes 6 rolls)
- 6 frankfurters
- 6 rolls
- 1 tablespoon butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped onion
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper
- 4 teaspoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon mustard
- 4 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon tabasco sauce
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup catsup
- 3 tablespoons vinegar

Melt butter, add onion and cook until clear. Add dry seasonings, sauces, catsup and vinegar. Cut a three-inch slit in each frankfurter and place them in a baking dish, slit side up. Pour sauce over them and bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 20 minutes. Place in split, toasted, buttered rolls. Garnish with green onions, if desired. Serve extra sauce separately, if desired.

- Picnic Salad (Serves 6)
- 4 cups cubed, cooked potatoes
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped green onion
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup diced celery
- 1 teaspoon salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper
- 6 hard-boiled eggs, sliced
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise
- 2 cups grated carrot

Combine potatoes, onions, celery and seasonings. Add eggs and mayonnaise. Toss lightly with carrots, chill and serve with greens.

- Orange Sugar Tarts (Makes 5 dozen)
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or substitute
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup bran
- 3 cups sifted flour
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons baking powder
- $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup orange juice
- 2 teaspoons grated orange rind

Blend butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat well. Add bran and blend. Sift flour together with baking powder and salt; add to first mixture alternately with orange juice. Stir in orange rind. Chill. Roll out dough to $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch thickness, working with a small amount at a time and keeping the remainder chilled. Cut into star shapes with floured cutter; sprinkle with colored sugar and bake on a greased baking sheet in a moderately hot (375°) oven about 10 minutes.

IT IS MERELY A TIN CAN, HAVING BOTH ENDS REMOVED AND A U-SHAPED PIECE OF FLAT IRON RIVETED TO THE UPPER END FOR A HANDLE. SHARPEN THE LOWER EDGE OF THE CAN WITH A FILE SO THAT IT CAN BE PUSHED INTO THE GROUND EASILY.

HOLES AND INDENTATIONS IN LINOLEUMS ARE REPAIRED EASILY BY JUST FILLING THEM WITH A MIXTURE OF FINELY CHOPPED CORK AND LIQUID GLUE, WHICH IS SMOOTHED VERY CAREFULLY AND GIVEN TWO COATS OF CLEAR VARNISH WHEN DRY.

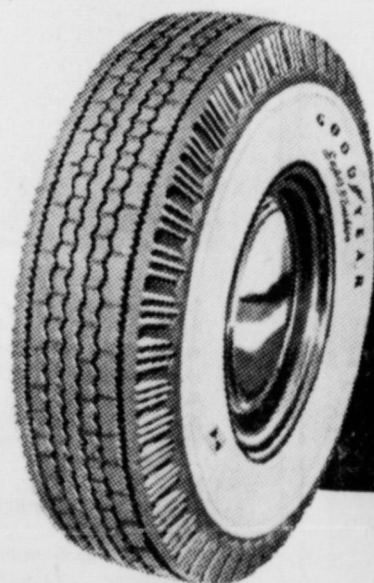
