OUCK DODGES SHOTGUN

16 YEARS, KILLED LAST YEAR Some ducks are smarter than ome duck hunters!

One of the smartest ducks that ever dodged a load of shotgun pellets finally met its fate in the vicinity of St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada.

The computers at the Migratory Bird Populations Center, Laurel, Maryland, have furnished Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife biologists with proof that this duck, a female redhead, had dodged the shotguns of Canadian and United States hunters for sixteen years before being downed last




