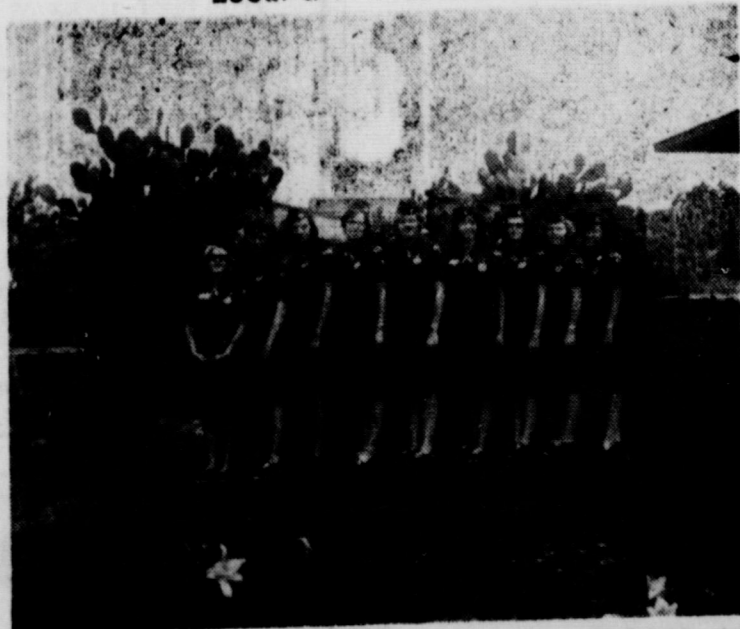

Farm Road Nears Completion

Mrs. Beatrice McLaurin, Commissioner of Precinct 3, Lynn County, said this week that paving of four miles of farm to market road running west of the former Samroo station at junction of Highway 87 should be completed within the week. The paving contract was let to W. W. Thomson of Denver City for \$23,000. The usual cost would have been in the range of \$50,000 but Mrs McLaurin used her employees and equipment in spare time to build the road bed at very little additional cost to the Lynn County. Estimated total cost of the road is \$30,000 -- a saving of roughly \$20,000. The money is being paid from Precinct 3 funds that Mrs McLaurin had accumulated over many years. Because the road splits L. R. and Dawson Counties, it was difficult to interest either county as a unit in the project. To the west the road will junction with the well known road.

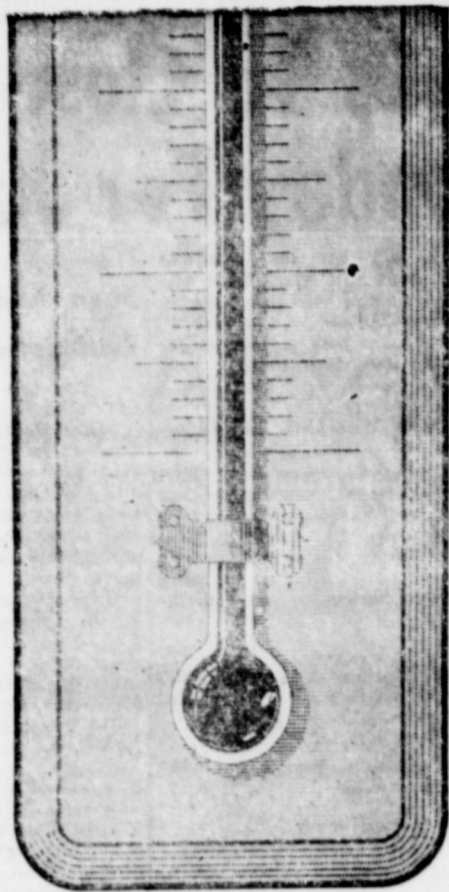

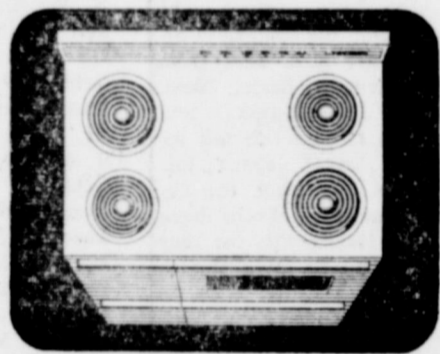

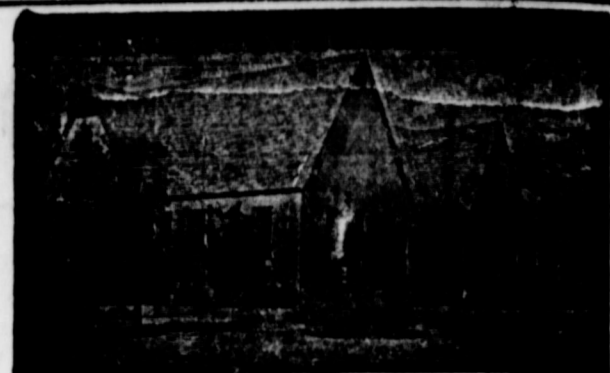

IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

LOCAL RULES . . .
Under our dual system of government, to sets of law . . . state and federal . . . may govern what we do.
State laws have traditionally governed certain fields: for example the law of wills, estates, and transfers of property upon death. Each state has its own rules on death transfers, how to make wills, and what happens when a person dies without a will.
But the federal government has some power in this field, especially when federal money went to the decedent or when it involved a national policy.
In a dispute between the United States and a State over a decedent's estate, the U.S. Supreme Court set forth some of the federal powers: A war veteran died in a veterans hospital without a will or heirs. He had some personal property. Under the state law property escheated to the state. Under federal law his property goes to the U.S.
The U.S. Supreme Court handed the estate to the U.S. under its war powers. When patients die without wills all their property goes to keep up veterans' hospitals and recreation programs.
Other veterans' laws have cut in to the states property laws. Federal laws govern G.I. insurance. They

cut off community property rights even though premiums came from community funds.
As a rule people who live in federal enclaves within a state must obey state laws. Thus Texas law governs civilians on military and scientific areas, or workers on a property, marriage and divorce. In the case of crimes, there may sometimes be concurrent jurisdiction.
But the federal government may pass laws to avoid conflict between state laws and a national policy.

CELEBRATE JULY 4th AT LONGHORN CAVERN

Holiday visitors to the Highland Lakes area may shake off the Fourth of July heat amidst the chill 64 degree weather of Texas Longhorn Cavern, and one of the big drawing cards for this occasion is the Liberty Bell, a strange dome-like depression formed by nature.
Other depressions have pitted the ceiling of the cavern Dome Room, but none is as deep or well-shaped as the Liberty Bell formation.
The cavern is unique among the great caves of the world because of the variety of its formations; the result of thousands of years of water movement through the diverse Texas rock structure in which it was cut. The vast chambers are all different, although each has some distinguishing features.
The postoffice department requires that no one park between the two fire hoses located in the back alley behind the postoffice. ACCENT ON HEALTH

There are no plagues, shrubs or trees on the moon, as far as we know today.
On planet Earth, however, vegetation helps sustain life. But some plants, trees or shrubs are potential killers of man.
Some part of the ornamental plants or flowers in your yard may contain deadly poison. Many poisonous plants are so common and seemingly innocuous you don't suspect their toxic qualities.
Who would suspect that the beautiful oleander bush, grown indoors and outdoors all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant, similar to the drug digitalis? So powerful is this poison that a single leaf of an oleander can kill a child. Many people have died merely from eating steaks spiced on oleander twigs and roast-d over a fire.
The pretty mountain laurel plant was used by the Delaware Indians to make a suicide potion. The popular Christmas flower - the poinsettia - is full of an acrid, burning juice, so lethal that a child who consumes one leaf of the plant might die. The berries of mistletoe proved deadly to adults who brewed what they thought was a "medicinal tea."
It's easy to be deceived by plants. One part may be edible while another is poisonous. For example, twigs of cherry trees release cyanide when eaten. Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known.
Even two of our most popular vegetables, the potato and tomato, come from plants related to the deadly nightshade. Although fresh tomato fruits and potato tubers are harmless, the foliage of both plants contain alkaloid poisons capable of causing digestive upset and nervous disorder.
Most dangerous in your vegetable garden is rhubarb. Its stalk, commonly used in baking and cooking, is not toxic. The leaf blade, however, contains oxalic acid which crystallizes in the kidneys, causing severe damage.
Also beware of laurels, azaleas, water hemlocks and buttercups because of their poison content. Both foliage and acorns from oak trees

Ten killers are at large in Texas. These killers aren't bandits or criminals - they are the ten leading causes of Texans' deaths.
The ten killers account for a giant share of 82,692 Texans who died in 1963.
The latest statistics released by the State Health Department categorize, profile and dissect the leading killers.
This is how they stack up on paper.
Heart disease took the lion's share . . . one out of every three deaths in the State. National statistics also show the same leading cause of death.
Apoplexy - or stroke, is classified as the third most deadly, with 11 percent of the death total.
Accidents, as the fourth leading killer, claimed 5,999 lives, or seven percent of the total. Death due to accidental cause takes the largest percentage of lives for the age groups between one and 45.
Disease of early infancy, fifth in sequence, takes its toll . . . of course below the one year marker.
Pneumonia ranks sixth in the lineup of killers claiming five percent of the deaths.
General arteriosclerosis, diabetes mellitus and congenital malformations are the seventh, eighth and ninth cause of death, respectively.
Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death. It first ranked tenth in

- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup milk

Combine melted butter, brown sugar and 1/2 cup biscuit mix until crumbly. Set aside. Combine raisins with remaining 1/2 cup biscuit mix, cinnamon and sugar. Add lightly beaten egg and milk. Stir to blend. Spread half of batter in greased 8-inch round baking dish. Sprinkle half of crumbly mixture evenly over batter. Repeat layers. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 35 minutes. Cut into wedges and serve hot. Makes 1 (8-inch) cake.

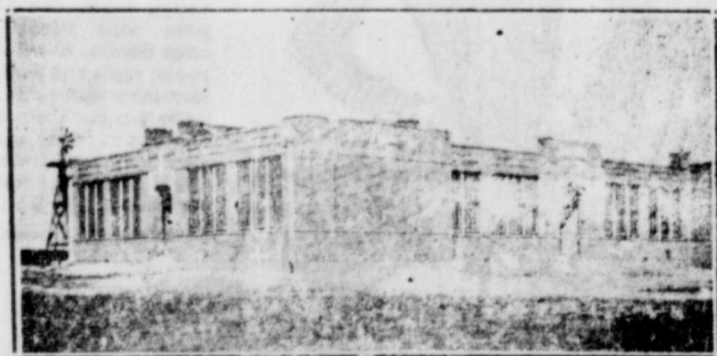
