This Week In Austin BY PRESTON SMITH

Is it possible for the 55th Leg-islature to get by without a revenue measure :

That's the big question created when two important sources of state revenue were considered earlier this year.

These are the proposals to in crease state college and university tuition approximately 50 per cent and to transfer for current use one percent from the current school fund. This latter proposal would provide approximately \$6 1-2 million during the biennium for the available school fund, thus reducing the necessity for appropriation from the general fund.

Both these very important sorces of state revenue, still awaiting ap-proval of the Legislature, are re-garded as the "keys" to the question whether revenue measures will be necessary this year.

Resting in the Senate for some time is the tuition bill, sponsored in the House by Murray Watson of Mart. The bill to appropriate the money from the permanent school fund, by Rep. Louis Dugas Jr., of Orange, is just coming out of the House

The two measures account for approximately \$18 million of the revenue the appropriation drafters have considered as " anticipated " income.



Reseach showed that protection against aphids, thrips, spider mites and leaf miners was obtained for periods of 4 to 6 weeks and that the seed treatment will replace the first two early season spray applic-ations. It was not effective against overwintered bolweevils.

Extension dairy husbandmen say Extension darry husbahdmen say it is not too early to start a fly control program. Good dainage around the dairy barns and hauling manure to the fields on a regular basis are two practices which will oliminate fly heading habitate eliminate fly breeding habitats.


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
