THIS WHEN IN AUSTIN

With numerous tax bills piled up in the legislature, there are predictions by many Capitol observers that any decision on tax proposals may take place in a special session.

Most of the tax bills under study fall into one of two major categories: those that advocate gross receipts taxes and the bills that aim to spread the tax load on a selective sales tax system, a method of taxation already well established in Texas.

Leading proponent of the gross receipts taxes is Rep. W. T. Oliver of Fort Worth. He has introduced a series of bills which would levy gross receipts taxes on hotels, motels and room houses, on newspapers, radio and TV and outdoor advertising, on air transportation of passengers. He has, in addition, offered a series of occupation levies on oil well servicing, on phonograph records and on soft drink syrups.

Principal items under consideration by selective sales tax bills fall in the fields of tobacco products, liquor, beer, automobiles. A number of bills have been introduced on these subjects.

Time is running out on taxation plans. Friday, March 13th, was the halfway mark of the 120 day legislative session and bills introduced after that date must have approval of four fifths of the House.

A solution to the tax problem is not in sight yet. There are indications, say legislators, that the ultimate tax proposal adopted might likely be a combination of the Seeligson general sales tax program and Gov. Daniel's proposed program.

Pool Contract Is Let

Amarillo Firm Gets Bid

The Texas Blue Lake Swimming Pool Co. of Amarillo was low bidder on the new community swimming pool here with a bid of \$29,000. The next low bidder was \$3,000 higher. The city will build the bath house, pool apron and fence at an estimated cost of \$5,000 more. The pool contractor has 45 working days to build the pool.

The pool will be complete with filters, pumps, tanks and will have a tile rim. The pool will be filled once a year and then water added to maintain proper level. The pool will be lighted underwater for safety during late use and will have racing lanes on the bottom of pool. It will be 30 ft wide at deep end and 40 ft wide at shallow end and 52 ft. long.

Bids are being advertised this week for letting contracts on the new community house and the new fire hall. Estimated cost of each is \$10,000. The community house will be near the pool in the new city park and the fire hall on lots west of present fire hall.

Plans are being made for our annual cleanup and paint up week which will open next month, Mayor Forbes said.

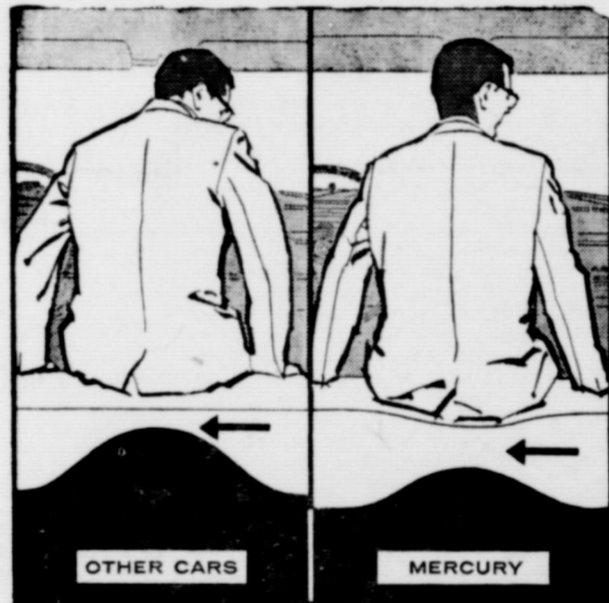

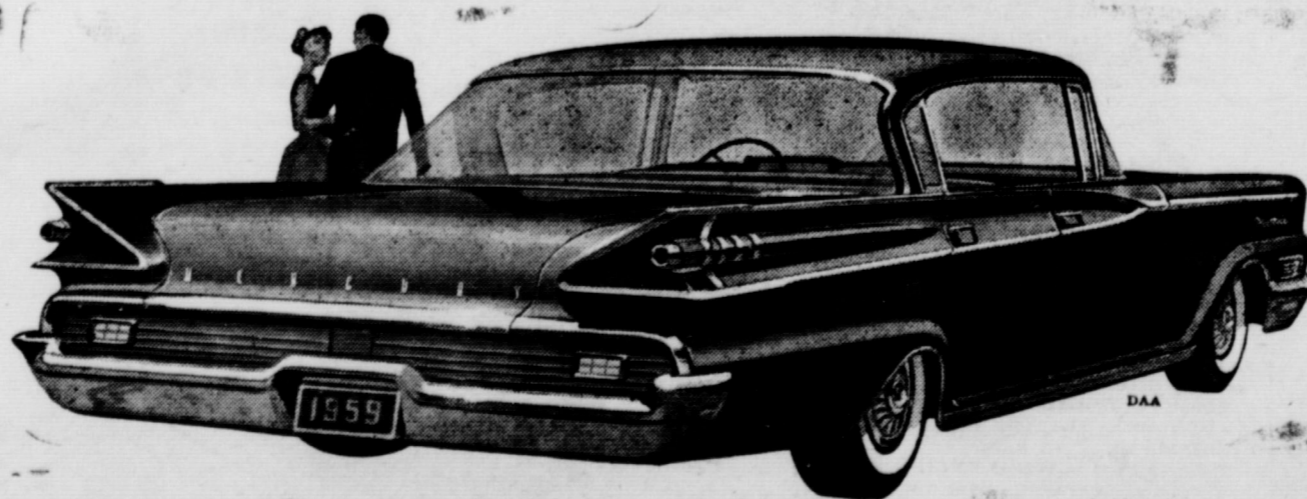

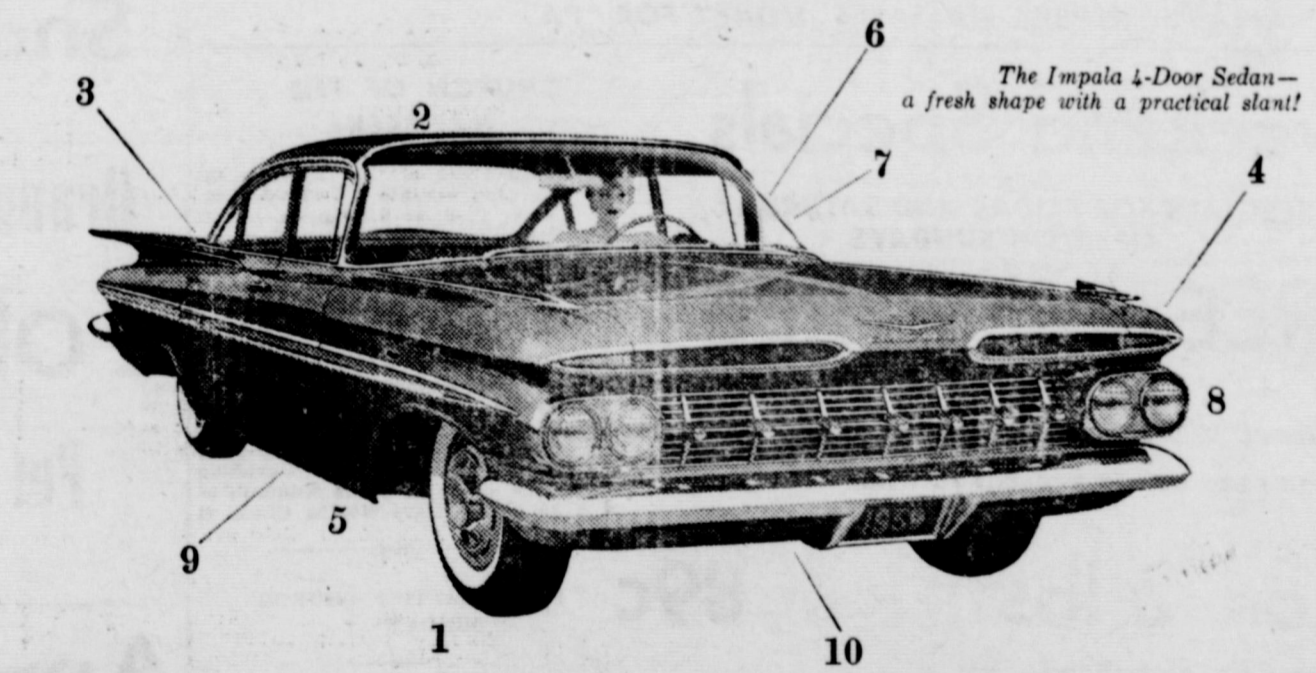
