HOW TO MAKE DAD HAPPY AT CHRISTMAS

- 1 can of pie cherries, well drained
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1-2 pint whipping cream
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- Juice of 2 lemons

Mix the cherries, cond. milk, whipped cream, and pecans. Then add the lemon juice slowly as you stir. Pour into 9 inch baked pie shell. That's all — no cooking. The pie will cut better if served about 8 hours later — if you can wait.

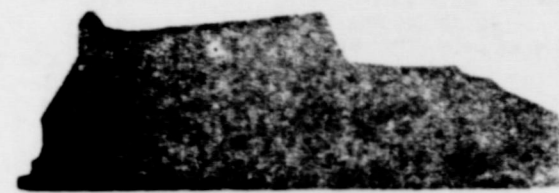

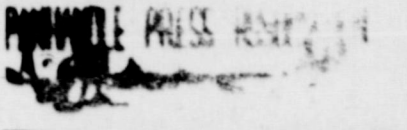

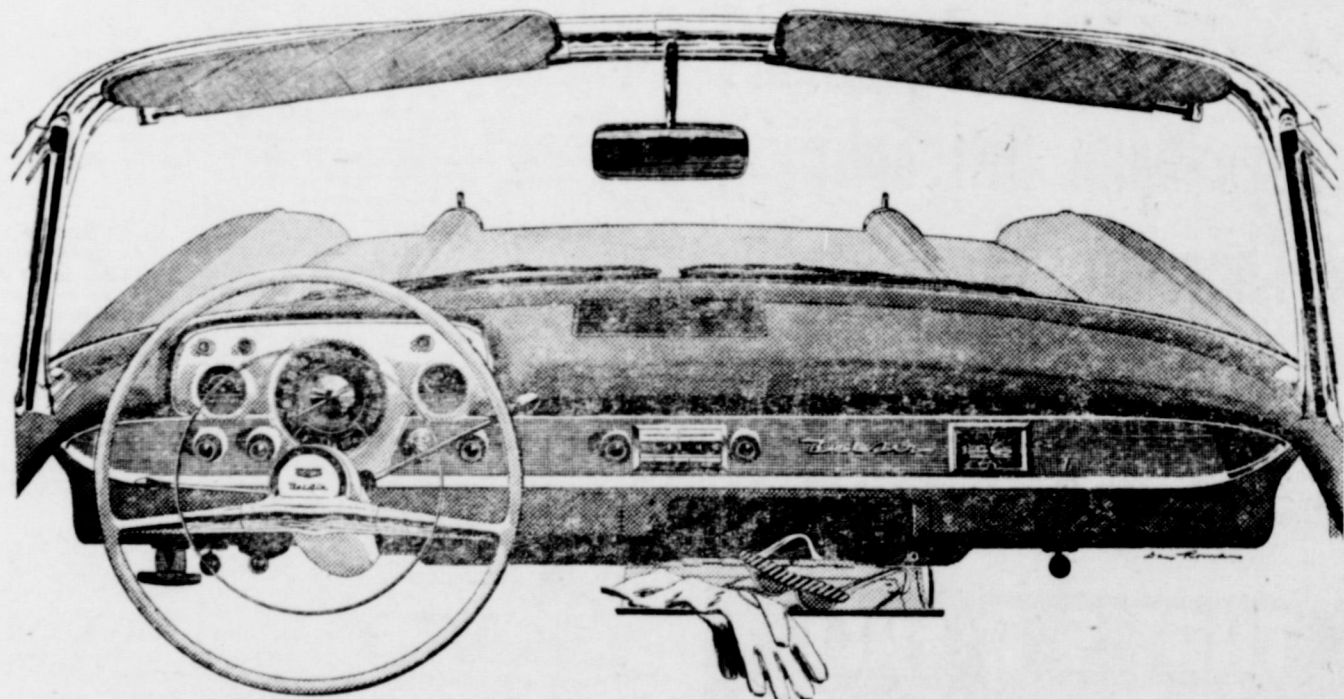

MAHON ASKS LOAN BILL LIGHT SPOT COTTON

Lubbock — Rep. George Mahon has wired Secretary Benson to immediately set in plans which will guarantee loans on light spot cotton for 1957 crop year.

This action followed a meeting of representatives from about 30 West Texas counties on November 28th. At the meeting a resolution was unanimously passed upon the request of Agriculture to provide specific loan on light spot cotton to the government loan program.

Attending the meeting were representatives of the Pinala Growers Assn., Farm Bureau, Farmers Union, Oil and Producers groups were also present.

In his message to Secretary Benson, Mr. Mahon pointed out the nation's cotton growers using millions of dollars annually to grow a special light spot cotton. Mahon said that over a period of time he had found with other light spot cotton growers in seeking a special loan on spot cotton. This year such a loan was authorized by the House in a measure introduced in a House bill which was held in committee in Texas in October of 1955. The Department of Agriculture was requested for \$25 million to provide for a special light spot cotton for the 1956 crop.

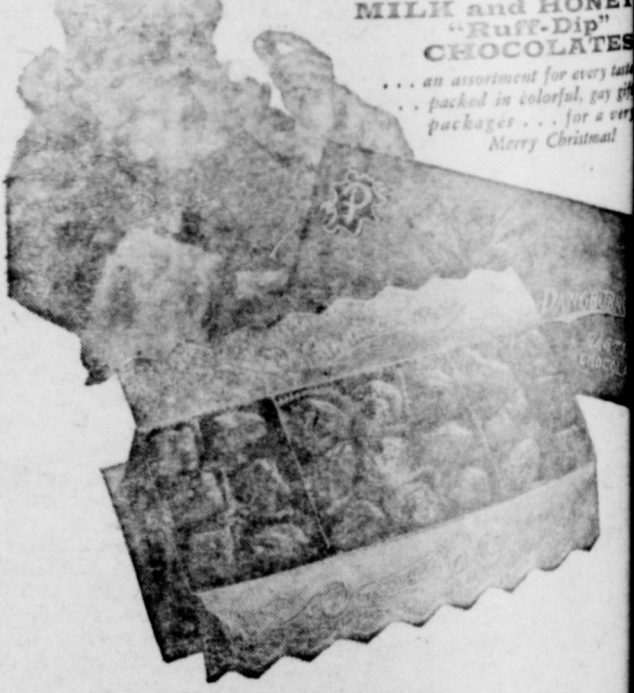
Mr. Mahon expressed belief the United front which has been presented by all farm groups should make a great deal of campaign for a government loan on light spot cotton for 1957.

The Scheme Of Redemption

The New Testament plainly teaches, both by command and example, that a person must: (1) hear the gospel, (2) believe the gospel, (3) repent of his sins, (4) confess his faith in Jesus Lord, and (5) be baptized for the remission of his past sins in order to become a Christian. These acts of faith and obedience to be performed in this sequence if they are to be acceptable to God. This is the "Scheme of Redemption."

A person cannot believe the gospel until he has heard the gospel; therefore the first requisite in becoming a Christian is that of hearing the gospel. "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard..." (Romans 10:13,14)

A person who has heard the gospel must decide for himself whether or not the gospel is true. If he believes that it is true, then has faith. "So belief cometh of hearing, and hearing by the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17) "Some attempt to disparage the definition of faith by calling it a "historical faith" and a "saving faith." A saving faith, they say, is a faith that commits to Christ and trusts in him completely for salvation. However, the definition of faith in the Bible is the "result" of faith rather than faith itself. That faith is belief, or historical faith, is plainly set forth in Hebrews 11:6 where the words faith and belief are used synonymously.

A person who has heard and believed the gospel is then called upon to repent. If he is not led to repentance by his belief in the gospel, he does not have saving faith, but he is like the ruler of the synagogue who believed on Jesus, but would not confess his belief. (cf. John 12:42,43.) This type of faith is described as "weak" faith or "little" faith. A person who has saving faith, what the Scriptures call a "great" faith, or a "strong" faith, the person who manifests this faith by doing the will of God. The need to exhort a person with this type of faith to repent of his past sins because repentance is as certain to follow his faith as the day follows the night. (This discussion of the "Scheme of Redemption" will be concluded in the next edition.)

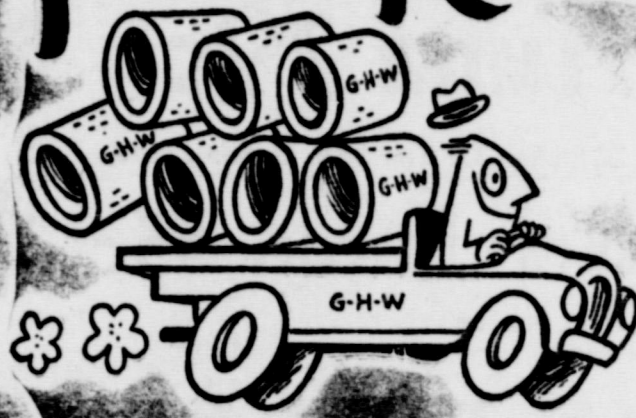

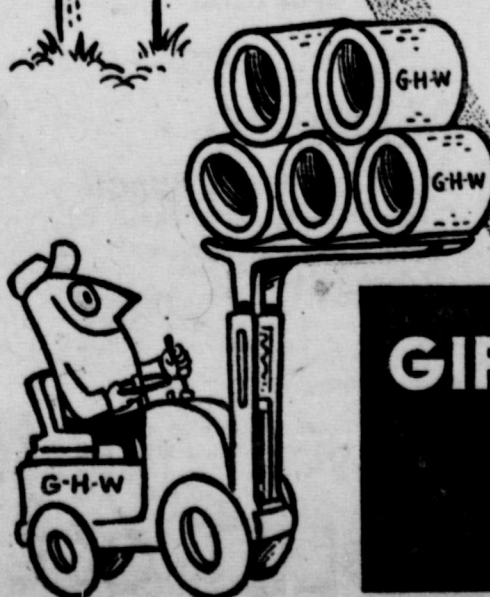

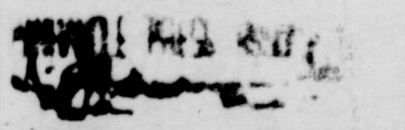
