## Producers To Vote On Cotton Research Dec. 5-9

### Vote On Cotton Act

Dec. 5th thru 9th cotton producers will vote by mail on the proposal to allot one dollar per bale in the Cotton Research and Promotion Act. All area farmers organizations are backing this proposal and urge producers to give a favorable nod. The best opinion of farm groups is that only thru chemistry can natural cotton fiber outsell man-made fibers. The life of cotton is at stake, farm men tell the Index. As the cotton economy goes down so will go business on the Plains.

The proposal must carry by a simple majority if a majority of the vote is that of cotton producers. Area Farm Bureaus are backing the proposal but at the recent state meet of the Bureau, other chapters voted against recommendation.

The Index has been carrying ads explaining the plight of cotton and two ads appear in this addition.

The proposal is expected to receive a heavy majority over this area.

## Citizens Reminded 29 Days Left to Mail

We of the Post Office Dept. would like to remind our area residents that there are only 29 mailing days before Christmas.

While that may seem like a long time to most people, it is frighteningly short to those of us in the Postal Service. Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has predicted that well over 8 billion pieces of mail must be delivered between now and Christmas eve, a new record.

"We are asking everyone to start thinking about their Christmas shopping and mailing now."

If all the holiday mail were to hit the postal system at one time it is obvious that we would have difficulty delivering every piece of mail on time. Mailing early and spreading the mail flow out along the entire pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time for the year.

Your cooperation along with others in the past years has made it possible that virtually every piece of holiday mail was delivered before Christmas day. With this year's volume increase we are hoping to see that fine cooperative spirit again.
