"This makes my fifth year to keep a record on my chickens," said Mrs. Thos. J. Williams recently. "I have enjoyed keeping this daily record and have made good money each year. I cleared more than \$300 last year with 200 chickens.

"This year I am expecting to do better. For I culled my flock the first of February and gave all my chickens worm medicine. I certainly have a fine flock of 240 hens and am getting around 125 eggs daily.

"I have 420 baby chicks and am planning to get that many more as soon as those are a little older.

"It has not only paid me to keep a record of my demonstration flock of Barred Plymouth Rock chickens, but I have also received much pleasure in being able to help share the expense of my family," Mrs. Williams concluded.

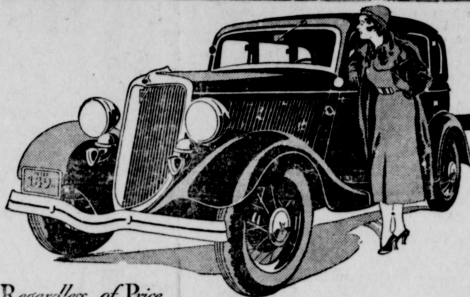
