Mrs. Vaughn "talked" Jewell awake and in turn the other children. Soon in a loud voice Mrs. Vaughn said get the gun and blast the west window.

Next morning there were signs of two men, burned matches, general vandalism of the barn, the calves were with the cows and the ranch was in a general mess. Sound like today—it was over 60 years ago on a wild land with "Indians" passing thru to New

Jewell Jennings nee Vaughn was born in Coke County in 1898 the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Vaughn. Her parents moved here in 1900 and filed on a homestead just east of the present Levi Gray place.

When Jewell enrolled in the first grade O'Donnell had a two room school and two teachers. She recalls the teachers as Brown Bishop and Miss Schooler. Later Jewell attended a "finishing school" (much like our junior college) in New Mexico. The original school was used until about 1920 with some additions.

Jewell was wed to Mr. Jennings in 1920. Among her classmates in school were Bertie and Jewel Doak, Bunk Russell, the Austin girls, Lorene and Shorty Wright. One of the early merchants was the father of our late Uncle Wiley Phillips.

It was late in the fall of 1903 when a history making "blue Norther" hit here. Jewell's father saw the cloud in late afternoon and had his wife and children to "protect" the precious drinking

water from freezing. By morning the country was in deep freeze with temperature far below zero. A Mr. Slaughter owner most of the deeded ranch land and his cattle were piled six feet high along the drift fences.
